NEW JAIL SITE

MAY BE SETTLED

Ninth and Davis Streets

SAVED FROM SCARE

Ethel Johnson is Nearly

Drowned in Struggle With Olaf Pearson.

Of the deeds of heroism performed by those who helped their drowning companions from the steamer Columbia, none is more genuinely impressive than the rescue of Effie Gordon and Olaf Pearson by 12-year-old Ethel Johnson.

All the more remarkable was the rescue because at the time the little heroine was using her utmost endeavors to keep her schoolbag afloat above water, she was clasped about the neck by Olaf Pearson, who had plunged overboard without a life-preserver. Today he, too, owes his life to the child who fought desperately with her double burden until all three were landed safely on a raft.

Ethel Johnson is a good swimmer. To the credit of the child's perseverance and courage is due the successful culmination of her heroic rescue of her companions.

The Johnson family became separated soon after the crash came. Ethel Johnson had strapped on a life-preserver and reached the upper deck alone. She waited a few minutes in the hopes of finding her mother or brother, then plunged overboard.

Striking feet foremost she sank to a great depth, and while still many feet in the water she felt the body of another person rising to the surface with her. Her companion was 12-year-old Effie Gordon.

No sooner had the two reached the surface when Ethel recognized the friend with whom she had been a classmate one of the San Francisco public schools. She grasped her nearly exhausted friend about the neck and encouraged Effie to make service.

The battle of the child heroines was crowned with success some time afterwards when she managed by a last desperate effort to reach a life raft upon which all three were taken.

Passengers on board the Elmer said yesterday that Mrs. Gordon, from whom Effie became separated, reached San Pedro in safety, but that when the latter began to sink the unfortunate woman was drowned in the collision with the steamer.

The struggle for the lives of the two had hardly begun when Pearson, after plunging overboard, rose to the surface and held out his hands and grasped the life-preserver strapped about Ethel.

"I told him to let go, that he would drag us all to the bottom," she said in relating in an unconcerned way the details of her heroic rescue. "But he told me he had no life-preserver on, and so I did the best I could to keep both of them from drowning."
