## **COURTS NULLIFIED** PORTAGE ROAD DENVERFRANCHISE

Themselves Loaded With Wortlhess Shares.

The Empire Contracting company of Portland, formed here for the purpose of securing a franchise for the Home Telephone company in the city of Denver, was disbanded in March at a meetver, was disbanded in March at a meeting in this city and as yet but very few of the stockholders know anything of the disbandment. F. H. Stow was president of the company, L. J. Wilde, vice-president and B. C. Ely, secretary. The news became known a couple of days ago through inquiries made by a stockholder in the company who was making an effort to ascertain the status of the Denver franchise and who found that the courts of Colorado had nullified the franchise on a technicality

As soon as the application was made a bitter war was begun by the Bell telephone people and the campaign to bring the franchise before the people cost the Home company, or the Contracting company, \$125,000 before the election was over.




