WOULD EXCEED PORTAGE ROAD DENVER FRANCHISE

Purpose Is to Meet Open River Transportation at The Dalles.

BENEFITS REALIZED BY ALL SHIPPERS

Producers and Merchants Satisfied Improved Roadway Will Prove a Great Factor in Reducing Freight Rates With Loading Facilities.

A movement started last spring among business men of The Dalles to secure extension of the Collio portage road to The Dalles, there to meet open river transportation and convenient loading facilities, has been quietly renewed with greater vigor than ever. Producers and merchants in that region realize, since the demonstration has been made by the road under existing difficulties, that it will prove to be of immense benefit if it can be extended to The Dalles wharves.

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Freight Rates Reduced. Instances continue to multiply in the eastern states to show the great benefits of water transportation in regulating freight rates and repressing the greed of transportation companies that operate on the theory that they are entitled to appropriate an ever-increasing share of the prosperity of the producer in addition to the legitimate growth of transportation profits.

Interesting experiment in the possibility of developing water transportation in competition with that by rail is being tried by the merchants of Kansas City, Missouri. Freight rates on Chicago rates are made to the Mississippi river. Another rate basis is in force between these points and cities on the Missouri. Under this arrangement a Kansas City wholesale firm paying \$50,000, for instance, for freight from New York, found that the long haul, from New York to St. Louis, cost \$25,000 of this while the short haul from St. Louis to Kansas City cost \$25,000.

So widespread was the dissatisfaction that a large number of business men combined to organize the Kansas City Transportation & Steamship company as a cooperative enterprise. The company in the river trade between Kansas City and St. Louis, a distance of about 400 miles. As the navigation of the Missouri had long ago been abandoned it was necessary to acquire boats, and two were bought at a cost of \$40,000. It was believed possible to operate the boats with sufficient economy to make possible an average reduction of about one third in the freight rates charged by the railways.

Boats Up at Night. As snags have been allowed to accumulate in the channel and the river is not lighted, it is necessary for the boats to tie up at night. Even with that state of things, however, it has been possible to make the up-river trip in six days and the down trip in four—which is faster time than the railways in their congested condition frequently make with freight shipments.

The Transportation & Steamship company has enough money available to pay for two more boats, and it has the plan as the river trade develops to put more steamers in service, with the idea of forcing the railways to meet the water competition.

COURTS NULLIFIED PORTLAND STOCKHOLDERS FIND THEMSELVES LOADED WITH WORTHLESS SHARES.

The Empire Contracting company of Portland, formed here for the purpose of securing a franchise for the Home Telephone company in the city of Denver, was disbanded in March at a meeting in this city and as yet but very few of the stockholders know anything of the disbandment. P. H. Slow was president of the company. Willy, vice-president and B. C. Ely, secretary. The news became known a couple of days ago through inquiries made by a stockholder in the company who was making an effort to ascertain the status of the Denver franchise and who found that the courts of Colorado had nullified the franchise on a technicality some time ago.

The Empire Contracting company was formed in Portland with a capitalization of \$50,000. Prior to its formation Mr. Slow went to Denver at the time the franchise was secured, and he held there a year ago and investigated the conditions in that city. Returning he worked up and incorporated the contracting company. The company then applied for a franchise for the Automatic Home Telephone in Denver, U. S. Grant, Jr. of San Diego, California, making the application.

As soon as the application was made a bitter war was begun by the Bell telephone people and the campaign to bring the franchise before the people cost the Home company, or the Contracting company, \$125,000 before the election was over.

The Bell company brought an injunction suit in the circuit court and it was carried through past the supreme court of the state into the United States District court where the Home company lost the franchise being declared illegal. Soon after this decision was rendered the Contracting company disbanded.


