## DOUBLE COLOR BRUSH

Valuable in Making Washes—Carries Large Volume of Color.

Artists and wielders of the brush will instantly recognize the advantages of the double brush shown in the illustration below, the invention of a New Jersey man. Having two brushes on the one handle to work with, more work can be naturally be accomplished by the operator. In applying plain washes over a large surface the two brushes can be manipulated with as much ease as one, the large volume of color carried by the brushes insuring the wash being more even in color, as the entire surface can be covered before one part dries. When the latter is the case it is almost im-



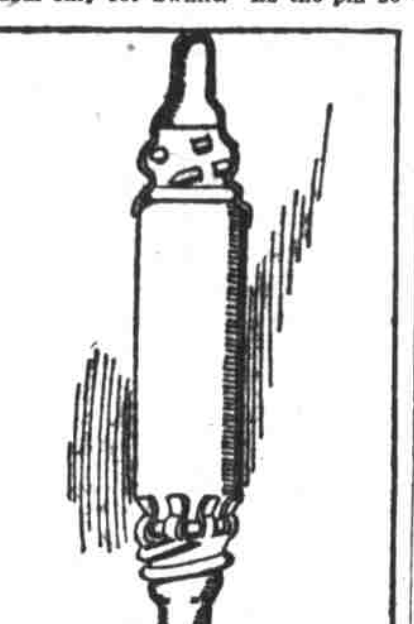
DOUBLE BRUSH.

possible to get the color to lie evenly. Two colors can also be carried on the brushes and the artist, by dabbing, terially assist the artist where two colors are being applied practically at the same time.

NOVELTY ROLLING PINS

Holds Ice Water to Keep Pin Cool and Prevent Dough Sticking.

The housewife and baker knows that it is practically impossible to prevent dough sticking to the rolling pin when preparing the mixture for baking. To prevent the dough sticking a little dry flour is sprinkled over the dough before applying the rolling pin. This is suc-cessful only for awhile. As the pin be-



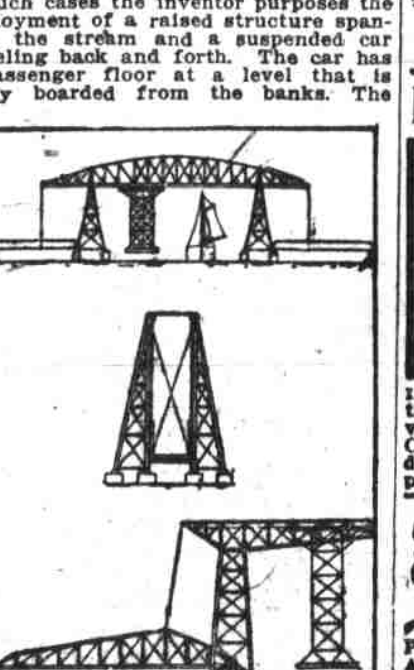
DOUGH CANNOT STICK TO PIN.

comes warm, caused by friction, the more the dough is liable to stick. If the rolling pin can be kept cool the dough will not adhere. A Washington man has devised a scheme whereby the rolling pin can be kept cool and the dough thus prevented from sticking. He employs a hollow rolling pin, having an interior chamber for the reception of a cooling medium. At each end are detachable handles, providing an opening in the chamber for the introduction of the cooling medium, as shown in the illustration. The cooling medium would preferably be ice water, which could be readily retained at a low temperature for a long time.

AERIAL FERRY

Suspended Car Which Travels on an Overhead Span.

A recent invention of a Wisconsin man is an aerial ferry, which was de-signed to be used to span streams, in-lets and other locations where, owing to various conditions, a bridge is not feasible. Such is often the case where the requirements of navigation forbid a bridge under a certain height, while, on the other hand, the nature of the banks on either side made a lofty bridge unapproachable and thus impracticable. In such cases the inventor proposes the employment of a raised structure span-ning the stream and a suspended car traveling back and forth. The car has a passenger floor at a level that is easily boarded from the banks. The



TRAVELS ALONG SPAN.

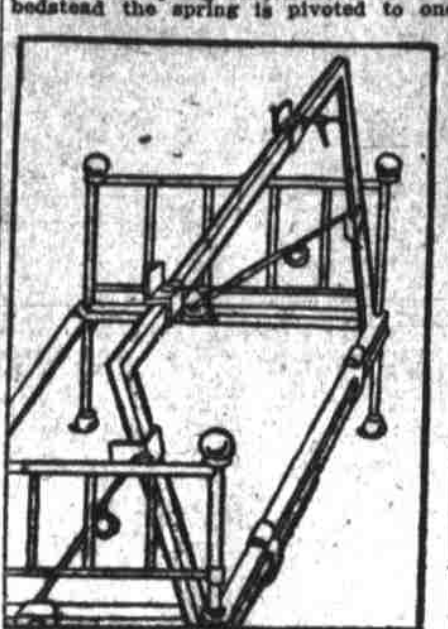
serial or raised span is anchored upon cantilever structure adjacent to each bank of the stream. The method em-ployed to transport the traveling car is not mentioned, being a part of the operation easily overcome.

TILTING BED SPRING

Makes Cleaning of Bedstead and Car-pet Beneath Bed Easy.

One of the most disagreeable tasks encountered by the housewife is the cleaning of the bedstead. This is equal-ly true whether the bed be of wood or iron. She knows that the beds must

be thoroughly and carefully gone over to prevent the gathering of undesirable insects, and to do this it is essential that every corner and crack be given attention. She finds it especially hard work to lift the heavy spring. A Chicago man has endeavored to make this part of the work easy by designing the tilting bed spring shown here. In this bedstead the spring is pivoted to one



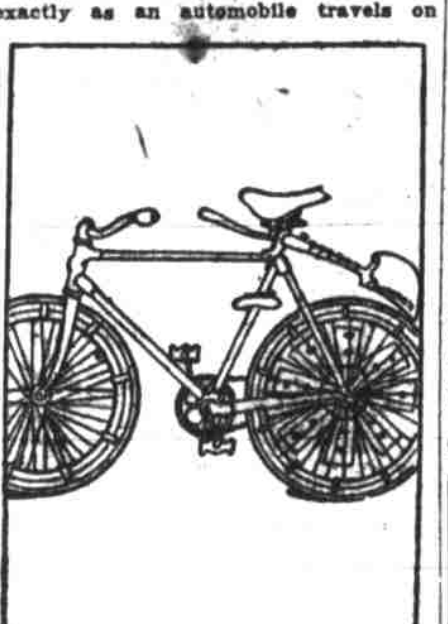
SPRING TILTS ON FRAME.

side of the frame and is connected at both ends with spring clamps. When the bed spring is raised the clamps hold it in a raised position, so that the entire overhauling of the bedstead becomes an easy matter. An additional advantage lies in the fact that the floor beneath the bedstead can also be easily cleaned without the necessity of push-ing the bed to all parts of the room to get at it.

WATER BICYCLE

Unique Machine Which is Propelled on Water Like Wheel on Land.

Among recent inventions is a water-mobility, which travels on the water exactly as an automobile travels on

land. This is what probably induced a New York man to devise a water bi-cycle which will travel on water as easily as a bicycle travels on land. As shown in the illustration, it closely re-sembles a bicycle, being provided with attachments for balancing and suspend-ing it in the water. The bicycle is ren-dered buoyant by attachments on both wheels. In addition several propellers in the form of propellers are secured to the back wheel, the latter being operated by the usual paddles, which constitute the driving mechanism. In the rear of the seat-post is the rudder, which is op-erated by a handle close to the handle-bars. This machine should provide ample sport for those who love the water, besides being interesting and unique to spectators.
