

WAR WILL SHAKE EUROPE IF POWERS SNUB KAISER

Attitude of England and Continent to Emperor's Proposals Vital Matter.

GERMAN RULER MAKES FIRST PEACE CRUSADE

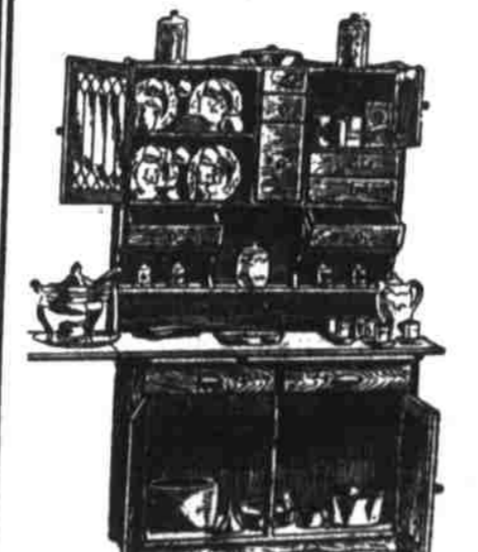
Is Desirous of Joining General Crusade to Prevent Future Conflicts, But Other Nations Are Still Suspicious of His Sincerity.

London, Aug. 2.—The permanent peace of Europe depends far more on the attitude of England and the continent toward the recent friendly proposals of Kaiser William than any number of Hague conferences.
This is the opinion expressed today by an ambassador of one of the great powers to the representative of the United States. His name for obvious reasons cannot be used.
Continuing, he said the emperor is making the first peace crusade of his reign. On this depends his power to free Germany from the isolation net the rest of Europe has thrown about the emperor's empire. The emperor realizes at least how his country has lost diplomatic prestige through the ententes between nations which leave Germany out. England, France, Spain and Italy have eliminated the possibility of war among themselves

as far as human foresight can do it. Japan's treaties with England and France have placed a terrible barrier in the way of diplomatic possibility. Even Russia is joining the international peace movement by her new entente with England.
The emperor sees he cannot hold out against the opinion of Europe. Hence his desire to join the peace movement.
"But before reaching this conclusion he made two attempts to once more dazzle Europe as its war lord, although this is not generally known. He asked the Dutch government to pass a German fleet of torpedo boats through the Meuse river for the purpose of showing Europe that Germany could use the rivers of another country as though they were his own. The Holland refused.
"Then he sought a strong defensive and offensive alliance with Denmark. Owing to the configuration of the country, Denmark, by the judicious placing of mines, he can control the Baltic sea. Had the Danes agreed the Baltic would have become a German lake. But remembering how Prussia was robbed of Schleswig-Holstein, they refused.
"In seeking peace the emperor is learning how to save his reputation for wanting trouble is against him. Suspicious of his sudden change, France and England told the German ruler that he cannot be admitted into the peace circle until he gives evidence of his sincerity. They believe the emperor is sincere and that these assurances will be forthcoming within a year or two at the most. Once Germany joins the peace movement earnestly, limitation of armaments and complete compulsory arbitration come within the range of practical politics. It is to be expected, therefore, that before another Hague conference assembles, the European chancelleries will have assured their work.
"But if France and England should refuse indefinitely the emperor's peace overtures it would be a calamity. The emperor would be driven to a corner and the inevitable result could mean only one thing—an European war."

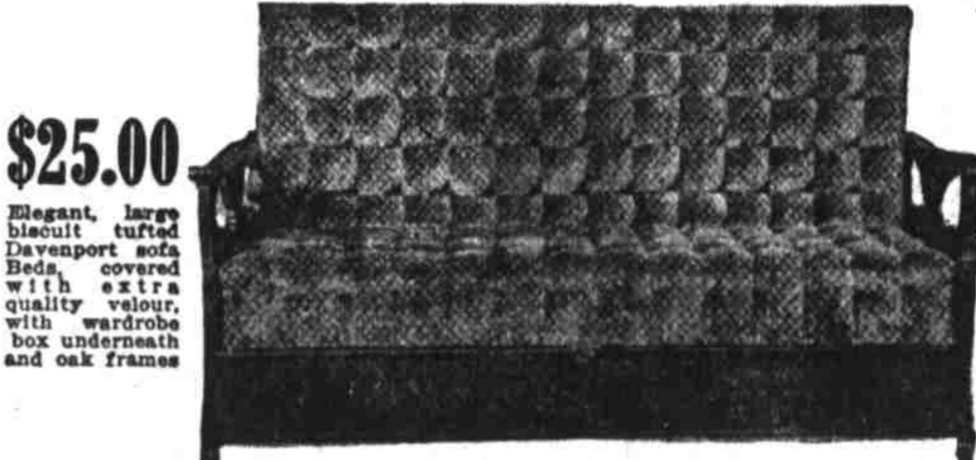

OPPOSITION TO LAND POLICIES

Coming Congress to Witness Struggle Between Administration and Opponents.

ROOSEVELT PICTURED AS LAND OPPRESSOR

Policy Necessitated by Huge Frauds and Efforts of Syndicates to Obtain Control of Vast Tracts of Timber Land.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)
Washington, Aug. 2.—More surely than ever before the coming session of the congress will witness another struggle between the administration and its opponents over the public land policies. After the adjournment last spring, for a time, it was thought that a truce might be arranged, and the land law revision be accomplished in a spirit of earnest weighing of the issues involved and the giving and taking by both sides. Recent events point to the opposite as the inevitable.
The Denver land convention, called at the instance of the Colorado legislature—the one which elected Simon Guggenheim United States senator—was composed of about 5-6 delegates from Colorado and Wyoming, and 1-2 from other states. In a measure this convention antagonized the administration's land policies, albeit not so ferociously as was expected. The east now is being industriously told through the anti-Roosevelt newspapers that the Denver meeting was "a pro-populist" and that it was the clarion call to arms against their oppressor in land administration—President Roosevelt.
The administration claims that the land policies of the administration were forced by two conditions: Extensive frauds in the acquisition of the public domain, and the absorption by large syndicates of vast areas of the timber and coal and oil lands of the west and southwest. Heroic measures were necessary when the land campaign began. Necessarily some innocent persons suffered. Millions of acres of land could not be handled here in detail in a day. "Blanket orders," which appear to give some writers much distress, could not be avoided. As rapidly as possible the government is investigating the merits of land cases and clearing the lists of those against which no dishonesty is discovered.

SAVAGES DEFEATS SULTAN'S TROOP

Government Soldiers Worst-Ed in Fierce Battle With Mountain Tribes.

REINFORCEMENTS ARE HURRIED TO FRONT

Spain Orders Cruiser to Casa Blanca—Spanish Papers Protest Against Country's War Policy—Six French Warships Made Ready for Service.

Paris, Aug. 2.—Reports received here from Tangier state that the government forces have met with defeat at the hands of mountain tribesmen. Reports from Tetuan to Tangier are to the effect that General Bagdadi, chief of the sultan's army, who is in command of the troops marching into the mountains, were attacked last night by mountain tribesmen. Fierce fighting followed and the sultan's troops were defeated. Among the killed were several Caid.
General Bagdadi had his leg broken. The tribesmen fought like demons and with great recklessness. Reinforcements are now on the way to join General Bagdadi's command. The report that the servants of the British consular agent at Elksor have been assassinated by tribesmen has not been confirmed.
Troops Ordered to Front.
There has been pillage of a bank at Casa Blanca, as was reported in some of the papers. Dispatches from Algiers say that orders have been given that two batteries of the British artillery, a battalion of sharpshooters and a squadron of light cavalry, in all 800 men, proceed at once to Oran to sail for Morocco. The warships are now at Toulon for service in Morocco.
Dispatches from Madrid say Spain, which is declaring a military state of emergency in Morocco, has ordered the cruiser Don Alvaro de Bazan from Las Palmas to Casa Blanca and directed the commander of the cruiser Don Maria de Molina to be ready to sail at a moment's notice. The cruiser Infanta Isabella is at Toulon.
Spanish Papers Oppose Warfare.
As the outcome of the slaughter of Europeans in Casa Blanca Wednesday last, France and Spain are planning a joint program of operations in Morocco. Several of the leading Spanish papers oppose the sending of Spanish troops to Casa Blanca, the impartial, for instance, declares Spain's best interests will be served by the preservation of good relations between the tribes and by not becoming involved in the rivalries of France, Germany and Great Britain.
A Liberal says that Spain's only duty is to exact reparation in the form of indemnity for the assassination of Spanish subjects. However, exchanges between the cabinets at Paris and Madrid are proceeding actively. Pending final agreement the government announces that "energetic measures, in conformity with the spirit of the Algeiras conference, and in concert with Spain, will be taken."
The government, it is believed, desires the immediate inauguration of the police force at eight Moroccan ports, as provided for in the Algeiras agreement, this measure to be secured by a naval demonstration along the entire Moroccan coast.
Within the week should Spain agree, the gates of Casa Blanca will be guarded by Spanish and French troops. Then a demonstration will be made and a demand made for the responsible for the murder of Europeans, and work on harbor improvements resumed with adequate provision. The pasha of Casa Blanca will be deposed for permitting the massacre.

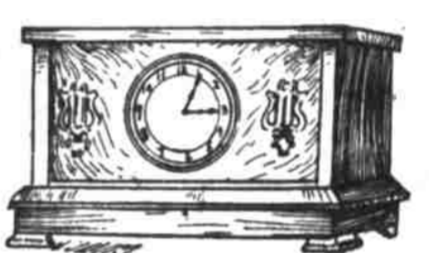

FEAR SECOND MASSACRE.

Fanatical Moors Infest Seaport and Holy War Is Imminent.

Tangier, Aug. 2.—Rabat, one of the most important seaport towns of Morocco, with a population of 35,000, over 10,000 of whom are white persons, is believed to have been infested by fanatical Moors, intent on carrying out the plans for a holy war. It is feared the massacres of Casa Blanca will be repeated there. The report comes from unusually reliable sources and says all persons are in danger of massacre. Along the coast, it is said the natives are in a wild state of excitement.
DESECRATE CEMETERY.
Rebellious Moors Open Graves and Shamefully Mistreat Bodies.

Madrid, Aug. 2.—The European cemetery in Rabat has been desecrated by the rebellious Moors responsible for the massacres there early this week. It is believed that the bodies of the dead were opened and the bones of the dead shamefully treated.
Three Spanish warships have been dispatched to Morocco, and the whole fleet is ready at Cadix to sail at a moment's notice in case of emergency.

RAILROAD WAR IS THREATENED

The Bitter Feeling Against Southern Road May Have Disastrous Results.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 2.—The intense feeling of hostility recently manifested against the Southern Railway by the officials of North Carolina and the announcement that Alabama has cancelled the company's charter to do business in that state have created a feeling of grave apprehension in the minds of high government officials for the south's welfare.
Governor Glenn of North Carolina is being held responsible for a crusade that threatens trouble, if not disaster. Although the federal authorities recognize the desirability of having just railroad rates established they deplore the fierce antagonism apparent between state and railroad authorities.
It is feared here that if Virginia declares a federal injunction now in force a bitter and widespread conflict will ensue.

PLAN NEW RULE FOR PORTUGUESE

House of Lords to Be Succeeded by an Elective Branch.

Lisbon, Portugal, Aug. 2.—Out of the hostilities agitation against the absolute home rule established by King Carlos, it is probable there will come one great reform—the abolition of the Portuguese house of lords. An elective upper house, modeled after the United States senate, will probably succeed the noble body.
The hereditary upper house has been able to defeat all of King Carlos' attempts to equalize taxes and place a larger burden on the rich. It has also blocked all measures favored by the government. Premier France has recommended the substitution of the elective upper house and King Carlos is known to be favorably inclined towards the innovation. Carlos believes such a move would prove so popular that senators favorable to the government would be returned.
Despite the opposition aroused by the attempt of Carlos and France to rule without opposition the reform measures carried out by the premier are winning respect and confidence. He began his administration by throwing out all corrupt officials. Men of his own liking who will carry out his policy have been installed.
