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## GAMBLERS TO RECEIVE NO QUARTER

Reform Forces Prepared to Wage Strong Campaign Whether Refuge Is Sought in Vancouver or Elsewhere.

"This War is to the Finish," Declares Dr. Tufts—Contention Is That Majority of People Are Back of Those Fighting for Right.

No quarter is to be given the gamblers by the reform forces and if the gamblers seek refuge in Vancouver or any other place near Portland, the war against them will be carried into Washington or wherever they may seek to operate their games, according to G. L. Tufts of the International Reform bureau. District Attorney Hedges' order in the fifth district closes all the towns in Oregon within any near distance of Portland. The principal town affected by the order is Astoria, though at Scappoose and Rainier games have been running. Others besides District Attorney Hedges are determined that gambling shall be stopped.

**War to Finish.**  
"This war is to the finish," said Dr. Tufts, "because the majority of the people are back of it. It is not intended to take the work out of the hands of the county officials, but to hold them to a strict account for the performance of the work for which the people have hired them and are paying their salaries. The day of reckoning will come next June. And if the report be true that the gamblers propose to establish themselves at Vancouver, it will be the business and pleasure of the bureau forces to follow them to that part of our field of labor where gamblers have been maintained, one of which robs its patrons \$2,000,000 daily.

It was only a month ago that the movement which has taken the Milwaukee club was launched. On Sunday, July 7, by invitation of Rev. F. M. Fisher, pastor of the Evangelical church of Milwaukee, Dr. Tufts addressed a large audience upon the evils of their gambling institution and how to abate them, thus opening the battle at short range. A committee was appointed to take definite action.

**General Cooperation.**  
The plan of the campaign was to secure general cooperation of all the moral and religious forces of the county to urge upon the district attorney and sheriff that they do their duty against this unlawful nuisance. To this end a drumhead consultation was held a few days later at Gladstone Park between Mr. Tufts and four of the members of Oregon City, all of whom agreed to bring the matter before their congregations on a specified Sunday and take action in harmony with that of the Milwaukee churches. The Journal came to their aid and at a brief but vigorous campaign the club was closed.

"The Journal as well as those fearless pastors," declared Mr. Tufts today, "deserve a high meed of praise from every law-abiding citizen. Not only so, but this periodical, which is the chief exponent of public morals in this part of the state, should receive the patronage of all who desire clean government and the protection of society, for persons are unable to explain his phenomena and articles, lest for business in behalf of the people and live on thanks any more than a public school."

## GIRL'S HEAD CUT FROM BODY

Member Severed by Glass in Frightful Berlin Wreck and Hurlled Fifty Feet Away From Track—Fifty Persons Lose Their Lives, Among Them Americans.

Berlin, Aug. 7.—In a frightful wreck between an express and freight train which occurred at Tremsan this morning, in which 50 persons lost their lives, among them several Americans, the ground was strewn for rods with the limbs and mangled remains of bodies. Fifty feet from the track, covered with blood and dirt, the features of a young girl were found by members of the wrecking crew. The head had been severed from the body by a pane of glass which flew away from the wreckage. The body itself has not been recovered. It lies beneath the cars which are piled on top of each other. Count Keiserlink is among those badly injured. He was caught in the debris and it was with difficulty that he was removed from beneath the overturned cars.

At noon today 20 bodies had been removed from the wreckage, which is half cleared away, but an accurate list of the dead and injured is unobtainable owing to the confusion.

## BOURNE OUT FOR FULTON AS SENATOR

Gumshoe Campaign Being Made for Incumbent's Re-election by His Associate—Hopes to Control Patronage Thereby.

Binger Hermann Also Finds a Friend in Junior Senator on Account of His Loan Made to Accused Congressman.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)  
Washington, D. C., Aug. 7.—Senator Jonathan Bourne, while not mentioning the matter from the housetops, is the avowed supporter of Senator Fulton's aspirations to succeed himself, and is conducting a gumshoe campaign to assist the latter. If Bourne's quiet tips to Oregon people who visit the national capital have the desired effect, the people of the Beaver state will sanction Senator Fulton's return to the senate.

The junior senator from Oregon is using all the persuasive powers of his political acumen to swing his constituents into line for Fulton and there is not an Oregonian who pays his respects to Senator Bourne who is not advised in a quiet and friendly way that Fulton should be elected again.

**Reason For Support.**  
There are those mean enough to hint that Bourne is secretly aiding Fulton, who is not popular at the White House so that he, Bourne, alone will control federal patronage for Oregon through his assiduously cultivated friendship with the president.

At the same time Senator Bourne has been favoring Congressman Hermann ever since he came to Washington. He deprecated the trial here and was close to being called a witness during the trial. This resulted from Bourne's connection with the raising of money on certain lands negotiated by the Hermann-Walsh-Mitchell interests for loans, Bourne having supplied money asked for with the land as security.

**Is Helping Hermann.**  
It has been claimed that Senator Bourne wanted to quash the Hermann case, if possible, and that he has exerted himself to that end, at least he has always shown himself in entire sympathy with the former commissioner of the general land office.

Senator Bourne was much annoyed recently when the story was published in Portland intimating that the department of justice was not acting in good faith in investigating the land grants of the Southern Pacific railroad company. The senator has been cultivating the good graces of the department ever since coming to Washington and the story apparently did not meet with his favor.

## WEST AND SOUTH WILL SUPPORT BRYAN

## ARMY OF BEARS INVADERS A TOWN

Michigan Hamlet Receives Visit From Denizens of Dense Forests.

Standish, Mich., Aug. 7.—Driven to lowlands by forest fires, a small army of bears invaded this town, forcing a suspension of business for several hours and terrorizing the population. The visit was made just as the forest opened for business and laborers were on their way to the factories. The invasion was headed by a remarkably large specimen, a mother bear, followed by two cubs. They chose the principal street of the town for the entry and when they had driven all the people under cover were bold enough to stop in front of a grocery store and breakfast from a basket of turnips.

This advance guard was followed by the main army of four good-sized animals, but they refused to stop, racing through the business section in double quick time. When the inhabitants had recovered from their astonishment a big hunt was organized, and in two hours three of the invaders were brought back as game.

## PINKERTON WEDS UMATILLA MAID

Romance of Haywood Trial—Groom Is Bodyguard of Detective McParland.

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 7.—A romance upon which the recent Haywood trial has a bearing was consummated in this city yesterday, when Mr. Charles Siringo and Mrs. Grace Kelley were married by County Judge Gilliland. The groom is a member of the Pinkerton detective force and has been with that organization for many years. During the Haywood trial he was detailed as a body guard for James McParland, who secured Orchard's confession, and he was known as the cowboy detective. The bride was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Deering, of the North Juniper country in Umatilla county.

Charles A. Siringo, the groom, has been in the Pinkerton service for twenty-one years, and during that time has been through some thrilling events. During the early days of his work as a sleuth he was connected with the task of finding the parties who participated in the famous Haymarket riot in Chicago. But most of his experience has been in the west, much of it being among the coal miners of Idaho and other states wherein the Western Federation of Miners was active. According to his story it was his evidence that convicted George A. Pettibone, and seventeen other miners of blowing up the Frisco mine in the Coeur d'Alenes in 1892. When that crime was committed Pettibone, now on the executive committee of the Western Federation, was accused of having taken the lead in blowing up the mill, and he served two years in the Detroit, Mich., penitentiary for the same. At the time of the trial he was the financial secretary of the Gem Mining Union, and Siringo was serving as the corresponding secretary of the same organization.

From here Mr. and Mrs. Siringo will go to Denver, where he has been living, but they will make their future home in Santa Fe, New Mexico, where Mr. Siringo owns some property.

## WIRELESS TOWER ON CREST

United Telegraph Company Plans to Build Big Station in Portland, Connecting With Tacoma, Seattle, San Diego and Several Other Coast Cities.

Within the next 10 days the United Wireless Telegraph company will begin the construction of a wireless telegraph station in Portland. A. V. Ragsdale, the Portland manager of the company, is negotiating for a site for the plant, with the probability that a lot on Council Crest will be selected, although it may be found more desirable to install the plant on top of one of the tallest buildings in the downtown business district. C. B. Cooper, the chief engineer of the company, with headquarters in Denver, is in Portland for the purpose of constructing the plant and installing the delicate machinery. Mr. Cooper has just returned from Astoria, where a wireless station is under construction.

Sites for plants have been selected in both Seattle and Tacoma and the machinery is on the ground for installing both stations. Mr. Cooper says that with the completion of the plants at Seattle, Portland and Astoria it will be possible to communicate by wireless telegraph from Seattle to San Diego. He further says that the United Wireless company has made arrangements to put in stations all the way from Nome, Alaska, to the city of Panama.

## ALABAMA PREPARES TO FIGHT RAILROADS

Montgomery, Ala., Aug. 7.—The house today adopted a resolution strongly backing Governor Comer in his fight against railroads. The resolution virtually asks the executive to tell the House what he wants, and the same will be granted. There is still an acute possibility that it may be necessary to recall the militia, unless strained relations between roads and state officials are terminated. If the Southern road takes off local trains, as the retraction order requires, riots will follow. To add to the present trouble, is the threat of the railroad employes, fired from the squabbling, to strike.
