CONFISCATE ALL SLOT MACHINES

Deputy Sheriffs Make Successful Cleanup in St. Johns Saloons.

Acting under orders from their superior, Chief Deputy Sheriff Probst and Deputies Kelly and Sweeney visited St. Johns yesterday and confiscated slot machines in saloons in that city. Some time ago Sheriff Stevens was informed that the machines had been reinstated at St. Johns and sent deputies to investigate. Saloonmen received knowledge of the impending visit, however, and when the deputies arrived the machines were not being used.

Six machines were taken by the sheriff yesterday, three of which were in one saloon and the other three in different places. They were not being used nor had been in use since the warning given by the sheriff a week or so ago when the sheriffs made the previous visit. But it is supposed in St. Johns that the sheriff believed the machines still on duty in the barrooms constituted too much of a temptation to be harmless.

It is well known saloons in St. Johns have been hard pushed to gather in comfortable profits as was the custom before the Sunday closing law. Just what action will result from the raid has not been intimated from the sheriff's office.

City Attorney's Opinion Is Asked on Right to Revoke Traction Franchise.

GAS COMPANY REQUEST ENTIRELY TOO HOGGISH

Willamette Iron & Steel Works Officially Notifies Council that Streets in Vicinity of Plant Are Almost Impassable—Other Matters.

City Attorney Kavanaugh will render an opinion as to whether or not city council has the right to revoke the franchise given the Oregon Traction company to operate a streetcar system in Portland as requested by Mayor Lane. Mayor Lane wants to give a new franchise to the company, which has since been absorbed by the United Railways company, in which the rights of the city will be better protected. In the council street committee meeting yesterday the communication requesting the revocation of the streetcar franchise was read. The councilman Vaughan insisted that the council had no right to take any action toward this end. The franchise of the streetcar company expired April 6 of this year.

A petition of the Portland Gas company to erect gas light poles in the city was not recommended for passage for the reason that no revocable clause was contained in the request.

A letter from President William H. Corbett of the Willamette Iron and Steel Works, called attention of council to the almost impassable condition of streets in the vicinity of the plant at the foot of Seventeenth street. He said that Seventeenth street should be extended and improved so that better fire protection might be offered the valuable industries located in that portion of the city. Councilman Concoman will look into the matter.

Councilman Rushlight reported to the council that he had found the streetcar tracks so crowded with cars that it was almost impossible to get through. A mass of documentary and oral evidence will have to be examined before the engineers will be prepared to make a recommendation to the interior department.
