Metlakahtla is almost the only, and is the best and grandest example of the complete practical success of Christian missionary work among American Indiana. The year 1967 is the fiftieth anniversary of the beginning of Mr. Duncan's missionary work, and the twenteth anniversary of the removal of the Metlakahtlans from Old Metlakahtlanear Fort Simpson in British Columbia to the present location on Annette Island in Alaska. It was on December 22, 1866, that Mr. Duncan left Flymouth, England, in the English corvette Satellite, Il guna Captain Prevest. The passage from England to the then infant town of Victoria, British Columbia, occupied 137 days, the vessel reaching Victoria on June 27, 1857. Stops were made at many South American ports and at one Peruvian port the Satellite inarrowly escaped an engagement with a Peruvian warship over the question of protection of some refuges. Mr. Duncan relates that he was impressed into service and the ship and crew made all ready for battle when the Peruvian came up in the night and halled them. The expected battle turned out to be only a verbal one.

Alaska was under military rule for 10 years following its purchase by the United States, but civil government has superseded military and the Fort has been dropped from the name. It is now just Wrangel. It is quite an Indian and tetem pole town and will prove very interesting to The Journal tourists.

Steamers cannot always land at Treadwell wharf. Juneau is the capital of Alaska and probably the largest town in southeastern Alaska. The time spent here can be employed very satisfactorily visiting the curle stores. Chief Joseph's house, and the new court house.

Haines is at the head of Chilkoot inlet. It was the site of the principal village of the Chilkat Indians before the advent of white men. The first white settlement was a Presbyterian mission and the town was at first called Haines Mission. The United States government has located an important army post at Haines, known as Fort William H. Seward. The post is a very substantial and important one.

Skagway is an Indian word meaning wind or windy. Like all primitive peoples Indian names are significant. At Skagway you are in north latitude about 58 degrees and 25 minutes and at the end of your northbound steamer voyage. Here connection is made with the White Pass & Yukon Route railroad for White Horse, British Columbia, at the head of steamer navigation on the Yukon river, whence river steamers operate to Dawson, Fairbanks, St. Michael, etc. The steamer generally stops at Skagway long snough to allow passengers time to make a trip by rail from Skagway to the international boundary at the summit of the coast range of mountains, a distance of 21 miles. The White Pass & Yukon Route makes special rate of 35 per capita for this round trip, and will run a special train for 50 or more fares. By special train for 50 or more fares. fares.
