Russian Ruler of Vagrants Gives Sumptuous Banquet in Cemetery.

HAS FINE COTTAGE AND MANY SERVANTS

Story of Under World Feast at Chicago Spurs Czar's Subjects to Like Effort-Vodka Flows but Rowdies Are Absent.

(Journal Special Service.)

St. Petersburg, Aug. 10.—From far-off Chicago there came to the capital of all the Russias the tale of the great banquet to American tramps and beggars. No doubt the galety and magnificence of Dr. Reitman's spread to hobos was much distorted when the story reached the ears of Russian beggara Yet it made an impression, and especially on Ivan Stepanoff, the king of Russian beggars. Ivan the other day celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary celebrated the twenty-lifth anniversary of his sovereignty.

This king of the underworld was most anxious to celebrate the event in an up-to-date manner, and so the moment he heard of the Chicago feast he decided that he would follow suit and give a gorgeous banquet.

Those familiar with Russia and Russian life know that one of the features

Those familiar with Russia and Russian life know that one of the features of the land is the army of beggars. There is he charity organization society to bother and the police are friendly so friendly in fact that there is probability that the beggars either pay a goodly percentage or buy outright from the police their numerous stands in the streets of the cities.

Looks Like an Official. Looks Like an Official.

Ivan Stepanoff is a man of 60—a tall, well-built man with white hair and beard, having more the appearance of a well-to-do artisan or minor official than a beggar. Yet be has piled his "trade" for a good 35 years and always at the same stand, the largest and most fashionable cemetery of St. Petersburg situated in the suburbs of Kolomna. Here he is one of the most noted figures, dressed in picturesque rags. He has a soft voice, an engaging manner and with visitors and sightseers as well as mourners he is a success in seliciting alms for himself, his "poor" wife and "starving" children. alms for himself, his "poor" wife and "starving" children.

As a matter of fact, which the police but not the public is aware of, his wife wears valuable furs and diamonds; one of his daughters is married to a merchant who with her received a large "dot" and his two sons are students at the Lycee and may shortly gain well-paid positions in the official services.

The police but not the public also know that the very handsome villa enclosed by a large and well-kept garden, situated in the Kolomna suburb, is Stepanoff's home and that he built it himself.

Seggar Eas Servants.

Beggar Mas Servants, The menage is a luxurious one and the beggar has his servants and his trotters just as if he were a noble or a

wealthy merchant.
So much for the king of beggars. For his anniversary he decided to follow the idea of the Chicago banquet yet even on a grander scale. He caused invitations to be sent broadcast to the beggars, tramps and miscellaneous hoboes of St. Petersburg. The banquet hall was the cemetery, the home of his exploits.

plotts.

The police, strange to say, raised no objections to the jubilee in the grave-yard. They allowed the caterer's wargons to unload huge piles of eatables and great baskets filled to the brim with bottles of strong vodka. They allowed the guests, the queerest assemblage in the city, to gather to the number of a round thousand and furthermore they raised no objections to the graves and gravestones being used as tables. On each gravestone was laid a sumptuous repast with its proper complement of liquid refreshment. A dozen or more of the strange guests gathered round each grave, depending on its size and there feasted. Ivan himself presided at one of the central graves, a great mausoleum, the family vault of a prince. During the feast he also visited and drank his toast at others of the tombs.

No Zowdies in the Growd.

No Bowdies in the Crowd. This strange seene continued from noon throughout the evening until came the time for the cemetery to be closed for the night. There was no unseemily noise. Each party of junketers had its own merriment but although the vodka was pientiful, there were no drunkards and no rowdles in the crowd. Ivan Stepanoff announced early in the day with much colat, that in view of the festivities, he would abstain from importuning strangers for alms for that of the festivities, he would abstain from importuning strangers for alms for that day, the first day in \$5 years in which he had not attended to his business.

Toward closing time Stepanoff marsfalled his guests in small parties and conducted them to the gates. From there they vanished into their various holes.

It is estimated that the celebration cost the king of beggars fully \$500. But he is plying his trade more vigorously than ever and may soon make up this.

Although this is the first beggars' banquet in Russia there are now likely to be others. Chicago has evidently sowed a seed which promises to be
