

HERMANN WENDT BACK IN HIS PRISON STRIPES

Well-Laid Plans Met With Better Plans Laid by Officers.

DISCOVERED BY LIGHT GLINTING FROM SAW

Meant to Raft Himself Off McNeil's Island and Had Tools to Make Raft, but Patrol Gave Him No Show—No Resistance.

Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 12.—Hermann Wendt, the convict who escaped from the United States penitentiary at McNeil's Island Friday noon, was captured at 8 a. m. yesterday, after being out for a few hours of two days. He had not got off the island and was taken into custody on the bluffs of the western shore, where the island is separated from the mainland by a narrow passage. Guard Smith of the penitentiary and H. Relf of Seattle, game warden of King county, made the capture. Wendt made no resistance and took his recapture with equanimity. He was taken to the penitentiary and placed in a dark cell.

Wendt seemed to have fared much better during his days of freedom this time than when he escaped a few months ago. From all appearances he had suffered but little from hunger, having foregone to good purpose in abandoned cabins and old logging camps on the island. Orchards in bearing and rye, garden truck also furnished subsistence.

Found Old Suit of Clothes.

When captured Wendt had changed his stripes for a suit of old clothing he had found in a cabin a mile and a half from the penitentiary half an hour after he had fled from the prison yard Friday. The man went about his escape in a methodical manner and in another half hour had clear of the island. When taken, he was wearing a crosscut suit, an axe, a hammer and two knives. With these it was his intention to construct a raft with which to escape to the mainland.

When the hunt began for Wendt Friday at noon he was traced to the cabin where he changed his clothing. Leaving his striped suit at the cabin with a note tucked in it to the warden of the penitentiary telling him that he (Wendt) had a good suit of clothes now and could keep warm, Wendt made straight

across the island to the beach opposite Long Branch.

Guard Got There First.

Arriving on the bluffs overlooking the narrow channel separating the island from the mainland he found a guard from the prison had got there ahead of him and was patrolling The Narrows in a rowboat. Then turning back into the forest he signalled across the island to a point opposite Anderson Island. There he climbed down the bluff, but it seems he was scouted quickly back to cover. He walked along the bluff in the shelter of the woods, according to his trail, for nearly half a mile, and then went back into the bluff cover and was lost. All day Saturday he lay in shelter somewhere near the center of the island, and was not seen nor was any trace of him found by the two score men who were ransacking every conceivable place. It is supposed that along toward dusk Saturday he again went back to the bluffs overlooking The Narrows. Cabins are scattered through the forest of the island and in some of these he got bedclothing and passed the night in an abandoned shack half a mile from the point where he was taken.

Light Glinted on Saw.

At daylight yesterday Chief Deputy Marshal Crosby, who had charge of the men in the field, left the penitentiary accompanied by Guard Alvion Smith and Special Deputy Relf and Wise. They followed the road across the island to The Narrows. On approaching the water they separated, Smith and Relf going in one direction and Crosby and Wise taking another road, in order to cover more territory. As Relf and Smith were following a road through the forest, they were attracted by the gleam of light on steel through the trees ahead of them. At the same time they saw Wendt. He was coming in their direction, staring on his forehead was the saw they had seen. Stepping into the brush they waited until the convict was almost opposite them in the line.

Smith then stepped out of the brush and covering Wendt with his rifle, said: "What are you going to do, Wendt—go into the logging business?"

Wendt made no resistance and walked meekly back to the penitentiary. Beyond looking a little thinner no change was noticed in his appearance.

The searchers returned from the island yesterday afternoon. The bloodhounds of Bob Hodge of Black Diamond were unable to track Wendt. Hodge remained out all Saturday night with his dogs vainly trying to follow the trail, but the tracks last found of Wendt were more than a day old and a slight rain had fallen to kill the scent.

The search for Wendt has been the most ably prosecuted any ever made for an escaped prisoner on the island. Three launches from the penitentiary and two revenue cutters with searching lights were patrolling the waters around the island, in addition to many rowboats strung between the island and the mainland. The land hunt was also well organized and energetic.

CHARGE GROSS FRAUD IN ELECTION RETURNS

Factions of International Union to Fight Out Differences in Toronto.

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 12.—The factional contest for control of the Boot and Shoe Workers' International union, which has been on ever since the referendum vote for officers was taken last year, is to be fought out at the special convention of the organization which opened in this city today. Thomas B. Hickey, of Brockton, Massachusetts, and Charles F. Murray, of Lynn, aspirants for the positions of general president and vice-president of the organization, are here for the purpose of preferring charges against the present general officers. These officers are President John P. Tobin of Brockton, Vice-President Collins Lovely of St. Louis, and Secretary-Treasurer Charles L. Baine of Boston. It is alleged by the complainants that President Tobin and his associates tampered with the ballots, falsified the local union returns and otherwise used fraudulent methods in securing their election.

FRISCO SYSTEM TO ISSUE NEW STOCK

New York, Aug. 12.—Stockholders of the Frisco system are to meet to ratify the proposed issue of \$115,000,000 15 and 30-year gold bonds and an increase of \$100,000,000 in common stock. The larger part of the issue is to be used for refunding purposes, and only \$10,000,000 of the bonds is to be used in the sale of new stock. It is stated that no part of the new stock will be issued until its authorization has been asked to comply with the Missouri laws.

COMEDIAN HAS OPENED SALOON

Aubrey Fitzgerald Tends Bar When Out of an Engagement on Stage.

London, Aug. 10.—Among the other things imported into London and now forming an integral part of that city's life is the American bar. And the very latest American bar has been set up in Rupert street, over the famous Prince Rupert cafe, by that well-known English comedian, Aubrey Fitzgerald. American players in New York, Boston and Philadelphia, who follow theatrical matters closely, will remember Fitzgerald for his excellent work in the American production of "Veronique," a popular British musical comedy which had anything but a happy career in the United States.

Aubrey Fitzgerald has established his

American bar as a buttress against hard time. Despite the fact that he is a real good comedian—funny man—a drug on the market at the present time—theatrical engagements are few and far between. It is to fill in the time between engagements with an employment that will add golden shakles to his depleted coffers that he has opened his little bar.

A man so well-known in a profession which numbers within its ranks so many hearty devotees of the flowing bowl and the wine that is red, was assured of success in name, however wide they may be of the mark in ingredients and as whole, they make a specialty of such mysterious mixtures as "atomant ticklers" and "corps revivers." These they label American, but the writer at least never heard of them during a score of years' residence under the wings of the screaming, screeching eagle.

But Fitzgerald's American bar is not of that color. It has its free lunch, but a very limited one, true to the English tradition of never giving anything for nothing.

It has its row of small tables and chairs where the patrons can take their "refreshments" sitting down, and it was the patrons of Fitzgerald's that they, mixing an hour of gossip with a ten-minute drink.

MORGAN PURCHASES QUEEN'S MANUSCRIPT

Paris, Aug. 12.—Fierpont Morgan has added yet another wonder to his already magnificent collection of works of art. He has recently acquired the original manuscript of the famous "Contes" of Queen Marguerite of Navarre.

This work has for years been sought by collectors, but was lost and could never be traced by them. In the eighteenth century it was catalogued among the books of the Comtesse de Verneuil. Then it disappeared suddenly, and it was in vain that the collectors hunted for it. The manuscript has a beautiful binding, in Moorish style, and has many beautiful illuminations in gold.

Aids to Good Housekeeping.

Three Good Cements.—For wood, metal or earthenware: Mix litharge with glycerin to the consistency of thick cream, or use thin putty. It must have time to harden—always a week—and will stand the action of either hot or cold water, as well as intense heat.

Transparent paste—Grind rice until as fine as flour; wet it with cold water; add boiling water, and boil till cooked as thick as paste; when cool add a little alum or oil of cloves to prevent moulding. Keep in a cool place, but don't allow it to freeze.

Waterproof glue, for repairing marble or porcelain, is made by mixing plain white glue and milk. Unlaked lime and the white of egg makes a good cement for ordinary use, as does also plaster of paris blended to a cream with the white of egg.

When buying Bananas.—When you are buying bananas, never purchase long, thin ones unless you want fruit which will pucker your mouth. No matter how well ripened these thin bananas are, they will always be found both sour and acid. This is because the

bunch containing them was packed too soon. The banana grows faster at first in length. When it has reached its full development in that direction it suddenly begins to swell, and in a few days will double its girth.

It is at the end of this time that the banana is ripened naturally, and the effort of the banana importer is to have the fruit picked at the last moment, and yet before the last ripening has progressed even enough to tinge the bright green of the fruit with yellow. A difference of 14 hours on the trees at this time will make a difference in the weight of the fruit, perhaps 35 per cent, and all the difference in its final flavor, between a puckery sour and the sweetness and smoothness which are characteristic of the ripe fruit.
