Wheat Is Still Green. (Journal Special Service.) Spokane, Wash., Aug. 13.—From all parts of the north the reports are that the crop in the north is not damaged. The rains have ceased and the sun is rapidly drying the grain, so that it is expected to be in the hands of the farmer in a day or two. Some places the grain will shatter, but as a general rule there has not been sufficient rain to injure the crop to any notable extent.
