The officials knew that most of the citizens would be strongly opposed to any trouble which would result in the bridge being closed at that time and are thought to be taking advantage of this to get as much out of the city as nossible. It is said that they have unofficially offered to accept a rmall reduction of from \$250 to \$300, and it is believed that if they will treble or even double this amount a majority of the council can be induced to vote for the acceptance of the bridge.

President Makes Deposit NEW CORPORATIONS Which Assures Opening of Monmouth Institution.

Salem, Or., Aug. 23 .- President Resseler of the Monmouth normal school deposited the sum of \$3,000 with the executive committee of the board of normal school regents to be used in conducting the school during the first half of the school year. This is an ab-

half of the school year. This is an absolute assurance that the school will be continued and a meeting of the beard of regents will be held in the near future for the purpose of electing a faculty, the election held by the last board of regents being held to be void.

In the resolutions passed by the board of regents at their last meeting it was decided that the people interested in the continuance of the schools should be required to deposit with the executive committee sufficient money to meet the expenses of the school during the first half of the school year, the amount to be raised by absolute donations. This was yesterday compiled with in the case of the Monmouth school, so all difficulty in obtaining permission to run it as at an end. The school will receive at least \$2,000 from tuition fees and with the meney on hand at the present time sufficient money is already in view to conduct the school during the entire year. The sum was raised by contributions from the citizens of the town of
