

MONDAY'S SALES REACH HIGH MARK

Beauty-Transfers Are Nearly Double Usual Amount First Day of Week.

The beauty market, as indicated by the transfers daily filed for record, continues to show a gratifying and healthy improvement. As a rule, Monday's transfers are the lowest of the week, frequently falling below \$25,000. However, the total value of yesterday's transfers nearly doubled that sum, amounting to \$48,000.

Practically all the transfers filed for record yesterday were for sales of residence property, and with one exception the considerations named were for sums less than \$5,000.

Lujo Hoch has purchased two houses and lots fronting Skidmore street, between Mississippi and Albina avenues. The property belonged to Oliver F. Hussey and was sold for \$5,000.

G. W. Frest sold yesterday to Johnna Casper a house and lot on Gantenbein street, between Shaver and Mason, for \$3,350.

Earl Governor T. T. Geer has purchased from W. A. Shaw a quarter block on East Eighth street, between Mason and Shaw, for \$4,000. The property is improved with a modern two-story cottage on a fractional lot at the southwest corner of Foss and McMillen streets. Albina, has been purchased by Timothy Donovan from W. A. Kinney, for \$3,500. The lot has an area of 120 by 120 feet and is occupied by a frame residence.

Miss Mary Frances Isom, librarian of the Portland public library, has purchased from M. L. Kline a 50-foot lot on Overton street, between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets, for \$3,150.

LUMBERMEN FEAR WORSE SHORTAGE

Great Northern Helps Some, But Bulk of Business With Northern Pacific, Which Is Hopeless.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Seattle, Aug. 27.—Not more than half the number of cars wanted by the lumber and shingle shippers are furnished by the Hill lines, and the millmen claim the situation is likely to grow worse during the coming month. Efforts made by the Great Northern to bring supplies from Montana and eastern points into this territory are accepted by millmen as an indication that the car shortage on that road will be merely temporary. It is expected that enough rolling stock will be supplied next month by the Great Northern to handle all shipments of timber products offered and clean up business before October 1, when the advance in lumber and shingle rates becomes effective.

The Northern Pacific serves more lumber and shingle mills than all other roads in the state combined. The Northern Pacific has not been able for two years to supply all the cars needed, and with the present car shortage the movement there has been a gradual falling off in the car supply. It is claimed by millmen that it is now impossible to get cars enough to make shipments wholly within the state. It is claimed shipments have been offered on the Great Northern to the Great Northern Northern Pacific for forwarding to Seattle, and that the cars could not be procured to handle the shipments.

EARL GREY FORMALLY OPENS CANADA FAIR

(Journal Special Service.) Toronto, Ont., Aug. 27.—Earl Grey, assisted by a number of other notables, officiated this afternoon at the formal opening of the annual Canadian National exhibition. The exhibition, which will continue till September 9, features a wide variety of exhibits and special attractions. Nearly half a million dollars' worth of new buildings were erected during the past year and these are well filled with choice displays of art works, manufactures and agricultural products. A high-class program of races and other special attractions has been arranged for the two weeks.

SECRETARY GARFIELD RETURNS TO CAPITAL

Washington, Aug. 27.—After having travelled 11,000 miles seeking information for the conduct of his department, Secretary Garfield has returned to Washington. His secretary trip embraced visits to 11 states and four territories.

From the Husband's Side.

Mother and homemaker, are you fretting a little because there seem to be so many things needed in the home, winter not so far ahead, but the wood supply must be provided for and new clothes bought for the children, and so little to do it with?

Just a word with you before you let the worry creep into the corners of your mouth and a line of discontent pucker your brow. Most of us realize who are keeping house how large the monthly bills are, and how high all necessities are in price, yet it may be that we do not properly connect the fact with the husband's income.

Don't—and this is the whole text and substance of today's talk—don't blame the husband; it is not his fault that the 15 he gives you cannot be made to do the work of 20. Do you recall sometimes in the little heart musings the old home, where everything was abundant, where mother was always sunny and happy and nobody seemed to bother about the money?

But those were different times. House rents are higher than they were 15 years ago; meat is higher, butter and eggs are higher all the year round, vegetables and fruit are higher, milk is higher. Living in the same manner as even 10 years ago in the same town, we are paying about half as much again. Wages have not advanced proportionally. The work of all this has its various explanations.

I am not a statistician, not political economist enough to throw any new light on the subject from that standpoint. This, however, it seems to me, partly explains the situation in Portland. The city has grown tremendously in the past few years, while the surrounding country has not kept pace. Much larger amounts of foodstuffs are demanded and consumed in the city, and as there is not the competition in growing which would keep matters equal, prices have gone up.

We have jumped from a village to a city, but truck farms and dairies and poultry farms have not sprung up with the same quickness throughout the country.

So the husband, toiling away as hard as he may, at the height of his life, finds it increasingly harder to get ahead. There will perhaps come a reaction soon; every one hopes that dairying and poultry farming will become large industries in Oregon within the next few years.

The best we can do at present is to hold on and don't worry and don't nag, wives and homemakers. It will not help the situation at all and it will wear on the nerves and make him unhappy. If he is the kind of a man that he ought to be, he is willing to accede to little economies that you find are necessary. You will cheerfully help you to manage the income so that it will go as far as possible. When the mother's income is regular, it will do marvelous things in the right hands, and if economies come hard to you, must put more brain matter into the housekeeping and see to it that only the necessities are purchased.

Foolish, frisky things must be dispensed with. The wife who finds the husband's salary altogether too small and is sure that she has stopped all the leaks may be able by a little thought to find some way of aiding, though that should seldom be necessary.

The woman who does her own housework and attends to her children and their sewing is doing her full part in helping, and the husband knows it. But, again, don't worry and don't remember the old story of the mining camp, where a conspicuous sign was hung over the little meadon on the first attempt at Sunday services—"Don't shoot the organist; he's doing the best he can."

Tiniest Living Baby.

The incubator baby establishment at Dreamland, Coney Island, has received what is believed to be the smallest living baby ever born. It is a girl and was born to Mrs. George Brown of New York. The child weighed only 19 ounces and 15 grams. The height of the baby is 11 inches, its arms are three inches long, and from temple to temple the measurement is two inches. Both hands and feet will go at one time through the mother's wedding ring. A 10-cent piece hides her hands. A half dollar piece hides her face.

A 28-ounce baby was born last month in Providence and placed in an incubator over the baby. Previous to these two cases 24 ounces was considered as close to the limit where a newly born baby's life was worth fighting for.

Magpie Roses.

Among the newest flowers in Paris are the magpie roses. These are usually huge roses of white silk gauze, but having their outer petals of black velvet. Pure white hats are trimmed with these, and the whole veiled with black Chantilly lace, the effect being extremely smart.

German Fried Chicken.—Cut the chicken into quarters and season the pieces with pepper, salt and mace; flour
