HOWLERS PLAN BIG TENT CITY FOR NEXT YEAR

Noisy Religious Body Intends to Invade Mount Scott for Next Season's Bombardment—Leaders Like Ridicule, Which, They State, Attracts People.

"There are 60,000 languages in the world," said Brother Glasco, local leader of the "Tangled Tonguers," as he helped tear down the last pole supporting the big prayer meeting tent which has stood all summer on the vacant lot at Eleventh and Division streets.

"Yes, sir, we are done swine to abdicate for 'sure dis time,'" continued the negro. "But as I was saying, some of dem languages sound like jabber. De Eakimo can hardly be distinguished from a howling dog. De good Lord lets smart people talk in dem jabber-like languages; den he has some child talk in de most beautiful Latin and Greek, jes to confound dem professors and people wid great knowledge."

Campers were busy this morning getting effects together, and this afternoon most of the tents and household furniture had been removed. Officially the campmeetings of the "Tangled Tonguers" ended with a rousing final rally last night. Those who had charge of the last gathering stated that fully 1,000 people were in attendance last night.

BROTHER GLASCO WILL LEAD AS USUAL. THE HALL HAS BEEN UNDER LEASE TO THE "TONGUERS" A MONTHLY RENTAL OF \$35 FOR SEVERAL MONTHS PAST.

The 40 or 50 families who all summer camped on the vacant lot in connection with the religious exercises of the "Tonguers" have all secured houses or rooms in various parts of the city, and all will continue in the work here. The larger camping tents will be stored, and the lumber used for use again next summer. According to present plans, a large tent city is planned for next summer, near Mount Scott.

"We will have no less than 500 to 1,000 tents up next year," said one member of the faith. "This probably seems ridiculous from a newspaper standpoint, but the movement is growing faster right here than in any other section of the country."

There will be no meetings again until Sunday. For the time being all meetings after that date will be held in the hall at 224 Madison street, formerly used as headquarters of the Easterners' union. The building is at the corner of Madison and First streets.

It is claimed by Brother Glasco that the membership in Portland now numbers 600, and is rapidly growing.

"We propose in future to hold large street meetings," said one woman. "The Lord will not permit the police to interfere with us. Ridicule us as much as you desire, we like it because it brings people to meetings out of curiosity, and then we save them."

Among other things mapped out by the "Tonguers" here is the opening up of a mission at Vancouver. Other missions in near-by towns and cities will follow as soon as leaders can organize them.

HOMESEEKERS TO PAY FULL FARES

Railroads Are Going to Abolish Rate as Revenge for New Law.

(Journal Special Service.) Chicago, Aug. 29.—Reduced one-way rates in connection with homeseekers' excursions are to be abolished throughout the western territory on and after January 1 next. Originally these rates were put into effect to prevent the scalping of homeseekers' tickets.

Since the passage of the Hepburn act it has been held to be illegal to make these reductions without giving 30 days' notice and filing special tariffs with the interstate commerce commission, and this involves considerable labor and expense, to avoid which the Western Passenger association voted to abolish them provided the postage reductions would do the same. By a vote taken in the southwestern passenger bureau they have now agreed to do so.

Another change which will be brought about by the passage of the 2-cent passenger rate laws in several states is the abolition of the certificate form of ticket. Western and southwestern roads have voted to do away with it at the end of the present year.

WAHL FOUND, BUT CAN HARDLY RECOVER

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Lewiston, Ida., Aug. 29.—The chances of recovery of Edward Wahl, who was found Monday in his own barn after having been given up for dead, are considered very small.

Wahl disappeared from home August 12, was tracked to the banks of the Clearwater river by Harry Draper's bloodhounds and was supposed to have committed suicide by drowning. When found he was lying upon the hay in a terribly emaciated condition, suffering from a severe attack of typhoid fever, and delirious. How he reached the barn is a mystery, as at the time of his sudden disappearance the barn was overhauled from top to bottom and no trace of him was found. A physician is in constant attendance.

(Journal Special Service.) Budapest, Aug. 29.—An extraordinary military outrage is reported from Panat, Transylvania. The officers of the Twenty-ninth Heuved regiment, after a prolonged drinking bout, are accused of ordering the soldiers to organize and massacre the entire population
