Mops Will Be Generally Picked.

The short have won and the growers of hops have lost. The larger per cent of the Oregon hop crop will be picked this season if growers can be ore of the growers as high as 7c a few of the growers as high as 7c a few of the growers who had not flaured on gathering the crop have now determined to get pickers at once. It will be noted, however, that these 7c contracts are leng made in but a few instances and then only in widely scattered territory. Every one of these 7c contracts are eagerly given to the news papers and telegraphed everywhere so that those growers who have not yet decided to pick will change their minds. However, there is one drawback to the scheme of the shorts—the growers cannot get the money for harvest. Shorts will not advance the money to every grower who applies for it—only a few being selected as a test. The only way that the money can be obtained fa by mortgaing the farm, and several growers have of late put a "plaster" on their places so as to get a sufficient amount of money to gather their crops and then give it to the dealer at cost. At 7c a pound there is nothing in hop growers ing for the producer. That sum just pay the bare cost of picking, balling and delivering the hops to the railroads.

"Our local market remains in a dull, unsatisfactory condition and there has been just enough pressure to sell to keep values unsettled and weak. The few dealers who have been willing to operate would buy only when real bargains were offered, hence the business was made up quite largely of these "scalping" purchases. So far as state 1908 hops are concerned values are almost nominal, and while we make no further change the figures quoted would be difficult to realize.
