BOURNE STANDS BY FORMER VIEWS OF STATEMENT NO. 1

Reiterates Emphatically His Allegiance to the Principles of Electing United States Senators by the Vote of the People—Answers Direct Question

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Washington, Sept. 10.—In response to questions asked by the Washington correspondent of The Journal, Senator Bourne has reiterated in emphatic terms his allegiance to the principle of electing United States senators by popular vote, embodied in statement No. 1 of the Oregon direct primary law.

The questions propounded to Senator Bourne were these: "What are your views as to statement No. 1 and its bearing on the Oregon senatorial campaign in 1908?" "Do you reiterate the views you proclaimed in 1906 during your campaign?"

Senator Bourne replied as follows: "I most persistently and insistently reiterate my views as promulgated in my campaign of 1906. I then made and now most emphatically reiterate the following statement: "The election of 90 statement No. 1 legislative candidates must appeal to thoughtful men as the simplest, most honorable methods in United States senatorial elections. Certainly 46 men free from political, financial and official entanglements can more readily be found among 90 members than among a smaller number, if the election of senators be confined only to the members representing a dominant party. The state treasury will be protected from unmerited appropriations which in past United States senatorial elections have so often been made for the sole purpose of securing votes for United States senatorial candidates. Statement No. 1 completely enfranchises the people; it destroys the political boss, the corruptionist, and the special privilege class. It allows the people to select United States senators and forces the members of the legislature subscribing to statement No. 1 to elect the people's selections."

the rigid enforcement of statement No. 1, without any qualification. Thus a method is provided by which the people select their United States senators, and the members of the legislature must in honor, and their fear of public opinion, elect the senators the people select. "The basic principle of ideal citizenship is rigid obedience of the individual, and especially of the public servant, to the sovereign will of the people. The person afraid to trust the people should not be trusted by the people. "No candidate for the legislature or other office unwilling to pledge his rigid obedience and performance of the express command of the people should receive the support of the people. "I believe that Oregon's initiative and referendum and its recent primary nominating elections law have done more to advertise the state of Oregon than all her bureaus of information, and I congratulate the people of Oregon in the fact that today, among all the states of the union, she holds the foremost position in her practical demonstration as to the ability and intelligence of her people to govern themselves, having substituted a dictatorship of the people for that of the political boss, machine or special interests."

FIRST CIVIL WAR SURGEON VISITS HERE

General Charles Greenleaf Received His Commission from Lincoln.

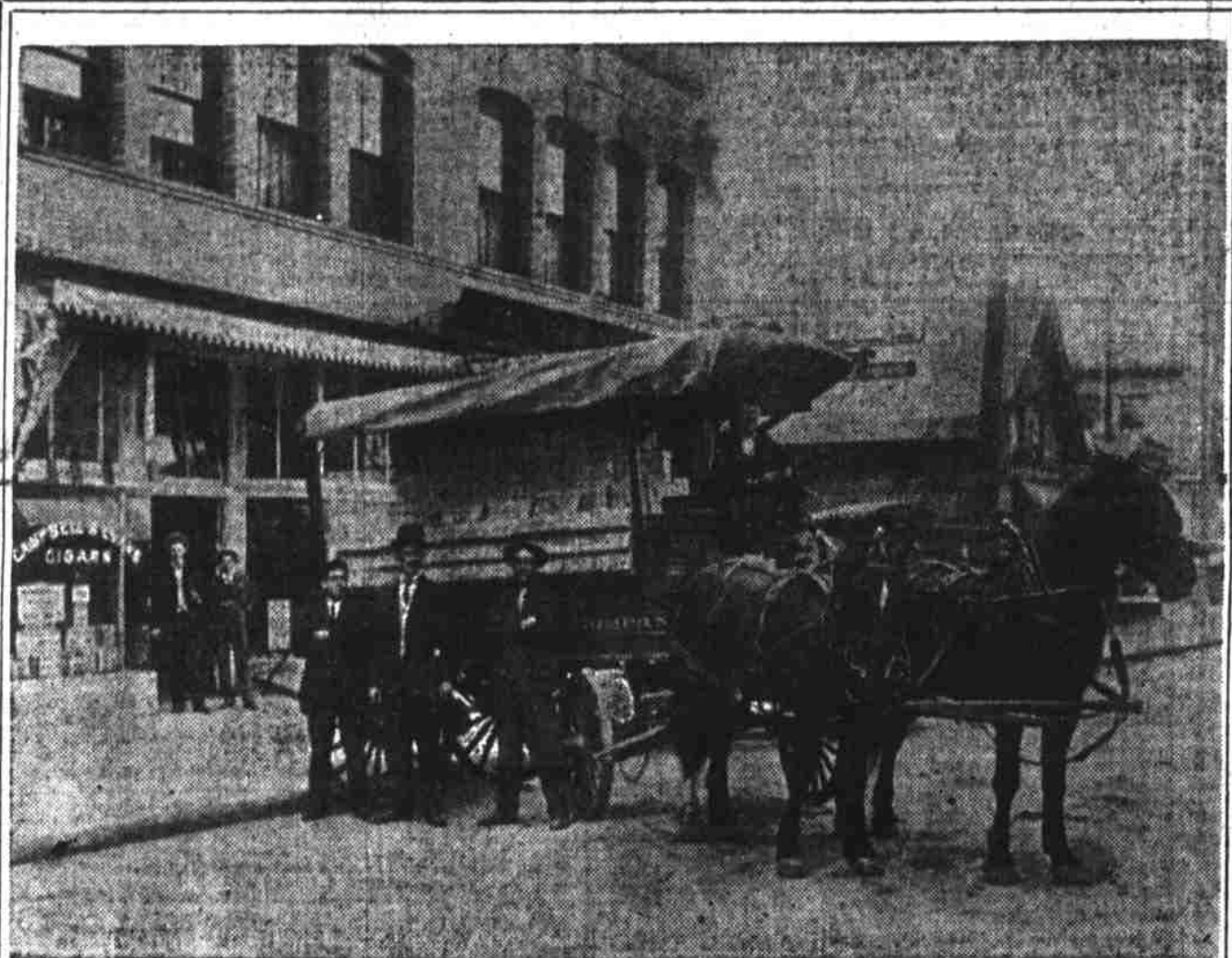
General Charles R. Greenleaf, the first surgeon commissioned in the civil war by President Lincoln, is at the Portland hotel, accompanied by Mrs. Greenleaf. General Greenleaf is on the retired list and resides at Berkeley. Before retiring he was the assistant surgeon-general of the United States army. General Greenleaf is a very entertaining talker and a pleasant man to meet. He is the author of numerous volumes, among which are "A System of Personal Identification" and "Organization of Red Cross Societies," besides a number of volumes dealing with army affairs and conditions.

GERMANY MUST ADD TO HER NAVAL FORCE

Berlin, Sept. 7.—At a recent meeting of the members of the Centre party at Rheinbach, near Cologne, Dr. Spahn, the leader of the party, spoke authoritatively on the extension of the German fleet. Germany dare not close her eyes to the fighting power of other countries' ships, he declared. America owned vessels of 23,000 tons that had cost nearly 40,000,000 marks. Germany would have to follow suit in building new ships, and their training ships would soon have to be all steamers and not sailing boats. Should the fleet of the Quirinal be extended to the North Sea and not the Baltic. Therefore the extension of harbors in the former and on the Elbe was necessary. Altogether, concluded Dr. Spahn, the fleet requires an annual increase in expenditure of 40,000,000 marks.

SCANDAL IN ITALIAN ROYAL HOUSEHOLD

Rome, Sept. 7.—A sensational suit is being brought against the authorities of the royal household at the Quirinal by the young Italian Countess Hercolani. She claims a large compensation on the plea that King Humbert, fascinated by her beauty at a ball, took her to be his companion when she was only 15 years of age. The countess alleges that the musical

career for which she was destined was materially and morally prejudiced thereby, while the provision which the murdered monarch intended to make on her behalf was not fulfilled through the king's untimely death. The Quirinal authorities have tried to settle the affair in a friendly fashion in order to avert a public scandal, but without avail, as the litigant's demands are deemed extortionate.

ARM SET WRONG AND DAMAGE SUIT RESULTS

Former Railroad Employee Asks Ten Thousand for Broken Wrist.

Alleging that surgeons employed by the O. R. & N. company were careless in setting his broken wrist, and that the bones only partly knitted together, Harry P. Walker this morning filed suit in the circuit court for \$10,000 damages from the company. Walker alleges that he was employed by the O. R. & N. as line repairer and paid the company 40 cents a month hospital dues. On August 3, 1906, says Walker, he fell from a timber, fracturing his wrist, and was sent to St. Vincent's hospital by the company for treatment. The surgeons set the break carelessly, it is charged, with the result that a large malformation has grown upon the wrist, rendering the arm useless, and permanently crippling him. He seeks \$10,000 damages from the company, alleging that the surgeons were employed by the railroad.

FEDERAL INSPECTOR ILL IN NEW JERSEY

Postoffice Inspector Riches has received a letter from Inspector F. M. Camp telling of the serious illness of the latter at his mother's home in New Jersey. Mr. Camp left Portland last month to spend his vacation with his parents. Upon his arrival in New Jersey he suffered from an attack of nervous prostration and has been ill for a month.
