REAL SCARCIE; FAIRER RESULTS Supplies Shorter Than Ever Even for This Time of Year—Big Sizes Some.

Front street features: Veal scarcity worst in years. Salmon not in best shape. Eggs sell at various prices. Poultry demand is very stiff. Hop trade is exceedingly small.

Veal Scarcity Worst in Years. It has been many a year, perhaps since the veal trade of Portland was so furnished as at this time. The reason for the great scarcity of supplies is explainable to some extent by the great press of farm work all through the local territory.

Salmon Peaches Are in Market. Quite a large shipment of Salway peaches was shown on the local market today. Supplies were generally green, but were in the condition.

Small peaches are the burden of the commission trade these days. Prices received are not satisfactory to either the buyer, seller or producer. Fancy stock is rather scarce and for this reason top values are very easily maintained.

Weakness in Butter. I am willing to sell large blocks of Albany butter at 22c a pound in order to clean up. This statement was made by Tom Farrell of Everding & Farrell this morning.

Very Limited Call Shown For Apples. I have never before seen such a small demand for apples as at this time. The call is very limited and then only for extra fancy four-tier Gravenstein.
