DARROW SPEAKS AGAIN ON UNIONISM.

Large Crowds Meet Moyer and Darrow and Hold Big Demonstration.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Spokane, Wash., Sept. 12.—When Clarence Darrow and Charles Moyer reached Mullin yesterday they were accorded a clamorous reception. They were met at the train, and 800 people marched in parade in their honor. At the Auditorium 1,500 people assembled to hear the speakers. Moyer spoke first, thanking the people of Coeur d'Alene for their support in the defense of Edith Thompson. Darrow followed and himself. Mr. Darrow in his address said: "The formation of unions had only been for the benefit of the employer, which had been directed toward the formation of trusts. The present industrial system is one great grab for wealth, but I believe the day of strikes has passed, for the simple reason that the price of wages can not be raised as fast as the price of living." The solution of the problem, according to Darrow, was a political one, and lay in the ballot box, and he advised the people against voting for the Democrats or Republicans simply because their fathers did. He attacked the judicial system of the United States, and warned the people against voting for judges who enjoined them and sent them to jail without trial.

TRIAL OF DORCAS HAMBLETON SET.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Baker City, Or., Sept. 12.—The case of the state against Dorcas Hambleton has been set for September 19. Mrs. Hambleton will be tried for her life, as she is accused of killing her husband. She admits doing the shooting but claims that it was done in self-defense. As he struck her and threatened bodily injury, she fired. Her husband, Henry Hambleton, was shot in the vicinity where the shooting occurred and was at various times inflicted bodily injury.

FARMERS BUILD THEIR OWN ROAD.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Spokane, Wash., Sept. 12.—The farmers around Republic, Washington, have started a 30-mile road, which will run from upper Tunk creek to Republic via Hines valley. The work is very difficult on account of the amount of grading, and 60 teams and 120 men have been employed to do the work.
