### HISTORIC HOUSE TO BE PLACED ON MARKET

From the Westminster Gazette. The report that Orleans House. The report that Orleans House. Twickenham, is to be sold—presumably to the speculative builder—will be received with feelings of consternation by all those interested in the preservation of historic sites.

The present house, which is designed after an Italian model, was built by James Johnstone, secretary of state for Scotland, in the earlier years of the eighteenth century. The large octagon room at the end of the house was erected especially for the entertainment

room at the end of the house was erected especially for the entertainment of Queen Caroline, consort of George II. Mackey in his "Tour Through England," (published in 1720), says that "Secretary Johnstone had the best collection of fruit of most gentlemen in England, and that he had slopes for his vines, from which he made some hopsheads of from which he made some hogsheads of wine a year; and that Dr. Bradley, in his "Treatise on Gardening." ranked him among the first gardeners in the kinedom."

The house, after passing through a succession of owners, was rented by Louis Philippe, King of the French, on his arrival in England from New York in 1800. From Louis Philippe's residence it derives its modern name of "Orleans House." The estate was purchased in 1846 by Lord Klimorey, from whom it passed into the possession of the Duc d'Aumale, who added a picture gallery and library.
