

### SOON TO OPEN FEATHERHEAD LANDS

Reservation Ready for Appraisers and Indian Commission Will Be Selected.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Helena, Mont., Sept. 12.—Major Below, agent of the Featherhead reservation, received word yesterday from the department of Washington that the work of preparing the immense reservation for opening has progressed far enough so that the work is ready for the appraisal board and instructions were given that the Indians be notified to select the two members of the commission to which under the treaty, they are entitled.

Messengers and riders were at once dispatched to all parts of the reservation and the Indians will be assembled in council next week to make their selection of the men who will represent them on the board.

### GENERAL BOOTH IS COMING TO AMERICA

(United Press Landed Wire.) London, Sept. 12.—For the second time within 12 months General William Booth, the venerable head of the Salvation Army, called for America today. Last spring he crossed the American continent in the course of a circuit of the globe. His journey was a hurried one and he made few public appearances. This time he expects to spend two months in the United States and Canada, during which time he will travel about 3,000 miles and speak at public meetings in a large number of the chief cities of the two countries. His tour probably will carry him as far as the Pacific coast, though the complete itinerary will not be arranged until he reaches the other side. Though at 78 he is one of the busiest men in England, General Booth apparently retains a large measure of the vigor and enthusiasm that characterized the work of his earlier years. When in the face of public ridicule and other discouraging conditions, he founded and built up the great organization which has since made its influence felt throughout the civilized world.

### CHILD THOUGHT DEAD NOW LIVES

Hatton, Wash., Sept. 12.—Emery Bailey, the two-year-old child of William Bailey, who was kicked in the face by a coil recently, is improving and the physicians believe he will recover. The little fellow was playing around the barnyard when he was kicked by a playful coil. It was thought the child was killed, and the parents were notified to that effect. The father was in Connell at the time, and hurried home as fast as possible. It was found, however, that there was life in the child, and a physician was immediately called, who soon revived the child and who has him on the road to recovery.

### LEWISTON ALARM SYSTEM ABOUT READY

Lewiston, Ida., Sept. 12.—The wire for the new fire alarm system has been strung and workmen are now engaged in installing pipes to lead the wires from the tops of the poles to the boxes. Ten miles of wire has been used to string the city, but the work cannot be completed until a new bell tower is built, which will take about 30 days. The system is to be in working order by October 15.

Miss Leah Desmond of New York City, who claims to be the original Gibson girl, has arrived in London in search of work—but not as a Gibson girl. She has many hard things to say about Dana's Gibson's work of art as it affects the picture in real life. To an Evening News representative at her modest, low-keyed, lower street abode she unfolded her troubles. "I sniff no more. I've stooped my last Gibson stoop," said she, "and I breathe again as an every day ordinary girl."

"I had my share of Gibsonian discomforts. Such a creature is physiologically impossible anyway. For eight years I struggled with the part. And my efforts to find favor were not confined to one country or display in one walk of life. ### APPORTIONMENT OF SCHOOL FUNDS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., Sept. 12.—The first quarterly apportionment for the school year 1907-8 was made today by Superintendent R. E. Bryan. The amount apportioned was \$567,874.22. The basis of apportionment was \$0.022 for each day's attendance as shown by the last annual reports of the county superintendents. The total number of days attendance for 1906-7 was 24,990,182 days, an increase over the preceding year of 873,442 days. The apportionment per day compared with the apportionment for the corresponding period of last year shows an increase of two tenths of a cent per day.

### NEW BOAT TO BE PLACED ON SCHEDULE

Lewiston, Ida., Sept. 12.—The gasoline boat which was built recently on the Snake river, will be placed on a regular schedule within a fortnight, or as soon as a pilot can be secured, and will run to up-river points. The boat will go as far as Pittsburgh landing, making two trips each week. A large shipment of ore is stored up the river awaiting shipment into Lewiston.

Paris, Sept. 13.—Probably there is not known to the whole range of human experience an occasion for the uttering of flub-dub nonsense, empty phrase, resounding platitudes and lies equal to a meeting between two European sovereigns. It has long been the superior privilege of our brethren abroad to condemn the sensational and untrustworthy qualities in the American press, but no subject treated by American newspapers ever produced such a boundless flood of rank mendacity as flows through the European and English press whenever a couple of kings get together.

For instance: The other day Kaiser Wilhelm of Germany and King Edward of England met and exchanged a few words at Wilhelmshafen. King Edward, proposing the health of the Kaiser, was graciously pleased to utter some gracious rubbish about the gracious affection he had always felt for Germany and Ger-

many's boss. Instantly the entire German and English press break out into joyous acclaim. Countless columns are devoted to printing out the invaluable good that will result from these gracious words. The strained relations between England and Germany are now, we are assured, brought into instantaneous and perfect harmony. All causes of friction are swept away. The peace of Europe—nay, according to many authorities, the peace of the whole world—is assured. Grim visage of war is with a word put out of business. The League conference may as well adjourn. Has any one thought of Germany and England as rivals or enemies? Absurd! From this time on they are revealed as twin brothers, going arm in arm down the corridors of time.

This is the kind of rot that with the utmost seriousness the German and English journals daily dish up for their readers.
