## SALE OF SCHOOL BOOKS ROUSES EAST SIDERS

Indignant at Book Firm for Selling Goods in the School Buildings.

For the convenience of students and chool children, the city board of education gave perfulssion to J. K. Gill & Co. to sell school books in different school buildings throughout the city. As a result many other book firms in all parts of the city as well as other retail dealers who sell books were indignant this morning when they learned of the permission. The legality of the action has also been questioned by the

action has also been questioned by the dealers.

Attorney J. V. Beach, a rember of the board, in speaking said this morning that the action was taken while he was absent or attending to other business or he should have used his influence to prohibit it. In regard to the legality or regularity of the proceeding Mr. Beach is doubtful. The only section he finds bearing on the point is one in paragraph 27 on page 46 of the school laws, which provides that school buildings shall be used for no other purpose except school purposes unless permitted by a vote of the people of the district. While this section is plain, Mr. Beach is undecided whether selling school books is not "school purposes."

The East Side Business Men's club is particularly aroused because the west side book firm has been allowed to step in and take business from them that side book firm has been allowed to step in and take business from them that they believe belongs legitimately to the members of their association who handle school books. They believe J. K. Gill should not have been allowed this privilege under any consideration, especially since the latter company pays no rents in the business districts of the east side. Members of the club say they would gladly welcome J. K. Gill or any other firm from the west side should they establish branches on the east side and pay their share of improvements and other expenses toward promoting the interests of the east side.


