WEATHER REPORT The disturbance yesterday over Vancouver Island has advanced southeastward to Wyoming, and the high pressure area off the California coast has moved north. Moderately heavy rains have fallen generally throughout the north Pacific states and in extreme northern California. The barometer continues high over the eastern states and in consequence fair weather prevails nearly everywhere west of the Mississippi river, with moderate and slightly above normal. On the Pacific slope it is cooler than usual.
