Manufacturers of the various grades of sugar are not a unit. Beet manufacturers are gradually breaking away from the grasp of the cane refiners, and this may later result in some unpleasant happenings to the sugar trade and price. The beet men are mostly putting their interests into one strong firm, so that they will be able to better battle with the cane people when occasion should require. It has just been learned that Parrot & Co. of which Mr. Cochran, formerly with the Johnson-Lieber company of this city, is a member, has secured the accounts of most of the beet people, and the remainder are said to be Sugar Interests Apart. people, and the remainder are said to be ready to turn over their business when-ever it is acceptable to the brokerage people. Among the beet sugar people to turn their business over to Parrot & Company are the Pacific Sugar company of Visalia. California, the California & Alameda Sugar company and the Union Sugar company.

Interests Formerly in Conflict. This action puts the various interests under different directions. The Western Sugar Refining company is directed in the northwest by the Kelly-Clarke company, while the California & Hawaiian Sugar company is controlled in this territory by the Johnson-Lieber company. Both of these latter sugar companies are makers exclusively of cane sugar, and their interests are so far early that the companies deem it. far spart that the companies deem it but proper that the concern that handles the product of one should not conflict by handling the product of another.

It was reported in Liverpool that American exporters were buying back recent sales of No. 2 red winter and Dumm wheat. Had it not been for the larger primary movements today's wheat market would have in all probability closed with a greater advance. The shipments were the buillsh feature, the total showing \$20,000 bushels against 556,000 bushels a year ago.

The price of wheat is now on debatable ground. Local sentiment is bearlish, but these speculators are not willing to hammer the market downward any pronounced way. They fear the buils and believe that the latter are strong enough to run them in on short lines. The buils look upon the foreign situation as extremely bullish. Damage reports continue to pour in from western Canada and the price of wheat is likely to hang on conditions in the northwestern provinces for some little time. The further lowering of the condition during August of the spring wheat in the United States and the spring in Canada means considerable less wheat in North America this year than was harvested in 1906. There is no gainsaying the fact that Europe is short on breadstuffs and must import a much greater amount than under normal conditions. The southern countries. Argentine, India and Australia are shippins lightly and the new Argentine crop will not be available until the 1908 opens, so that Europe must depend for sometime on North America and that uncertain country, Russia. Between them they can spare as much wheat this season as the states exported on the 1906 crop.
