(Continued from Page One.) were extremely quiet and attentive throughout the meeting. It was obviously a serious business upon which they were bent, and each face bore an expression that went for more than the ordinary interest or curiosity apparent at average public assemblages.

Carrying out the computation to show the entire solvency of the reorganized bank, he said that in a settlement of everything on the foregoing basis there would, as far as possible, the foregoing amounts, remain due to depositors a balance of \$275,000 in the bank, and this balance would be secured by all the Home Telephone and other uncollected resources of the bank, amounting to about \$225,000; capital stock of the Home Telephone company, having a market value of about \$31,000 at 25 cents per share.
