BANDON-BY-THE-SEA TO BECOME CENTER OF SHIPPING INTERESTS.

Sphinx Rock, on Beauden Beach, One of the Wonders of the Northwest Coast—Phot o by Lint. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Bandon, Or., Sept. 26.—Another thriving, hustling, rapidly growing town, western Oregon seaport is knocking at the door of Portland, ready to pour into the coffers of merchants and business enterprises of the Rose City its largest amount of trade. That city is Bandon-by-the-Sea.

This splendid little city of the Pacific is enjoying a splendid era of prosperity just now. At present five new buildings are in course of erection, all of them meaning additional important enterprises. Work is far more plentiful than labor, and other plants are ready to negotiate for buildings, but they cannot be secured. Two large plants, the Lyon & Johnson and the Cody Lumber company's new sawmills, are in course of erection on the coast.

One of the most important industries of the city is practically finished. That is Price's new shipyard. In a very short time the keels for three new ships will be laid there. With the completion of the new yard, together with the shipyard at Prosper, three miles above here, on the Coquille river, this section will be one of the greatest shipbuilding points on the Pacific coast. The United States government has a large force of men at work extending the jetty and otherwise improving the harbor, which will make this place a much better port for large vessels. The greatest need of the city is a modern line of steamships connecting with Portland.

Excubitant freight rates for the 17-mile haul over the Southern Pacific between Coos Bay and Coquille sends most of the trade now to San Francisco. The steamship Elizabeth runs regularly between this place and San Francisco, but the service is extremely poor and inadequate. One of the points of interest here is the Sphinx rock, famed all along the Pacific coast as the lights to be seen by tourists. It is one of the natural wonders of the Pacific north-west.

ROOSEVELT TO AGAIN VISIT WEST. Itinerary of Trip Which Begins Next Sunday—First Stop to Be at Canton. (United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, D. C., Sept. 26.—All arrangements have practically been completed for the coming trip of President Roosevelt in the west and south. According to the present schedule the president will leave next Sunday for Canton, Ohio, which city will be reached about noon Monday. In the afternoon of that day he will participate in the dedication of the magnificent monument to the late President McKinley, making the principal address of that occasion. The same evening he will leave Canton for Keokuk, Iowa, which city will be the starting point of his 700-mile journey down the Mississippi river. The members of the inland waterway commission which the president accompanied a few months ago, will meet him at Keokuk and accompany him on the river trip. The commission is expected to leave St. Paul today for an inspection of the upper Mississippi river. This inspection will occupy four days and the completion will reach Keokuk in time to meet the president next Tuesday.

Journey Down the River. From Keokuk the president and his party will journey down the Mississippi to St. Louis, which city will be reached Wednesday morning, October 1. At St. Louis the president will be met by the following governors of states: Burke of North Dakota; Folk of Missouri; Waterman of Tennessee; Bucher of Colorado; Chamberlain of Oregon; Toole of Montana; Brooks of Wyoming; Crawford of South Dakota; Davidson of Wisconsin; Fox of Illinois; Cummins of Iowa; Hoch of Kansas; Deneen of Illinois; Frantz of Oklahoma; Lindall of Arkansas; Blanchard of Louisiana; Broward of Florida; and Campbell of Texas. The president and the governors will be the guests of the Louisiana League when in St. Louis, and arrangements are being made to give the distinguished visitors a hearty welcome.
