Reports Are in Effect That Market Is Being Undermined.

There is a strong feeling among hoprrowers in Kent in favor of a duty or mported hone.

For the last 20 years hop-growers have had their trade cut by the competition of cheap fereign hops, and, as Messrs, Le May state in their annual report on the crop, quoted in the "Express," there are 1,784 acres less depress," there are 1.784 acres less de-voted to hop-growing this year than last, while in the last generation the acreage has decreased to nearly half what it was. But this does not bring out the full damage that has been inflicted on the

English hop industry.

"It is a fair statement that for the last two years hop-growers have lost fill an acre on the average on hop-growing, which means \$500,000 on apgrowing, which means \$500,000 on approximately 50,000 acres, or a total loss of \$1,000,000," Mr. Le May said to an "Express representative yesterday.

"In 1905 there was a large crop, so that in that year and last year, owing to the foreign imports, prices were too low to pay a profit.

"In 1906 there was not the least need for any importation, but 187,685 cwt. were imported, and prices were cut down to 30s a hundredweight, which was barely the cost of picking, drying and marketing, leaving nothing for cultivation or profit.

vation or profit. General Loss.

"Altogether the farmer spends from 135 to 140 an acre on his hops, and 110 an acre is not too high an estimate of the average dead loss for each of the two years. In 1905 the growers lost heavily. In 1905 only those who sold out saved themselves from the general loss."

"This year—in the 11 months that have elapsed since the last official report was issued—229,546 cwt., or more have been imported, and than in 1995, have been imported, and prices have fallen from 18 or 17 a hundredweight to 13. At these prices it does not pay the farmer to grow hops. The result is that hops are being grubbed, and the land is being laid down in grass or fruit.

"There is only one remedy for the hop industry, and that is a 40s, duty on every hundredweight of foreign hops. That would just about enable our farm-That would just about enable our farmers to make hops pay.

"The 40s duty world not affect brewers or the price of beer, because as soon as foreign hops were shut out there would be an increased acreage of hops in England and they would be assured of a sufficient crop. Prices would not fall below 60s, but they would never rise above 16, whereas when the foreign importer gets hold of the market now he sometimes puts the price up to 116, 115, or 120 a hundredweight. With a larger area of hops in England there
