

REALTY MOVEMENTS MAINTAIN GOOD PACE

Sales in High Priced Residence District Features of Yesterday's Sales.

Realty transfers involving a total consideration of \$92,014 were filed for record yesterday. The volume of sales has held up remarkably well for the past few days. Two transactions in business property were reported, while the number of sales in the high-priced residence districts continues to grow.

Among the good-sized sales closed up yesterday was the purchase by Dr. Robert C. Yenny of a 50-foot lot on Jefferson street, between Front and First. The property belonged to Peter G. Carlson and was sold for \$10,500.

J. J. Kadderly has sold to Mrs. Mary Bohan a lot on the southwest corner of East Pine and East Seventh streets, consideration \$7,500. The property is improved with frame buildings.

E. J. Mansfield has purchased a 70 by 100-foot lot on Lovejoy street, between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets. The property was sold by Samuel E. Werthamer for \$5,200.

Peter Koppinger has purchased from the Fidelity Trust company a 30-foot lot occupied by a frame residence on Twenty-fourth street, between Thurman and Vaughn, consideration \$3,700.

Mrs. Nancy J. Paxton has sold to Mrs. Beattie W. Paxton a lot of 1/2 acre half interest in a lot fronting Ford street on Cedar Hill for \$6,500.

The transaction involving the sale of the Uncle Sam hotel property at Fifth and Couch streets, made last week by Charles K. Henry & Son, was closed up yesterday. The property was purchased by Mrs. Josie McDevitt of Washington county. The consideration involved was \$25,000.

The old Honeymoon property at the southwest corner of Front and Columbia streets, belonging to Martin Rosenbaum was sold yesterday for \$25,000.

GOVERNOR LEAVES TO JOIN PRESIDENT

Oregon's Chief Executive Will Float Down Mississippi With Roosevelt.

Governor George E. Chamberlain left this morning for Memphis, Tennessee, where he will visit with relatives for a short time. From there he will pay a short visit to Natchez, Mississippi, his old home. Following these visits the governor will join President Roosevelt on his trip down the Mississippi river and will return to Oregon after an absence of three weeks or more.

Governor Chamberlain goes to join the presidential party upon the invitation of President Roosevelt, and at the same time will represent the Portland chamber of commerce. It is expected that the presence of the governor on the trip will do much for the open-river question in this state, since he will be able personally to impress upon the president the great need in Oregon and the northwest of the opening of the Columbia and other river and harbor improvements.
