WHOLE CITY OF EUGENE JOINS BOOSTING MOVE

Largest Promotion Fund Per Capita Ever Raised in the United States Subscribed to Advertise Valley Town—Residents Enthusiastic Over Publicity Started.

Portland men who have just returned from Eugene say that Eugene has suddenly been transformed from a country town into a modern city, with paved streets, an up-to-date street-car line, a first-class brass band and more than one at others. Where formerly there were mudholes a beautiful paved street extends through the entire business district. An expert publicity promotion man has been engaged at \$5,000 per annum and an annual subscription fund of \$12,000 has been raised to advertise the city of Eugene in the eastern states.

"They are certainly doing things at Eugene in a substantial and progressive way," said Manager Tom Richardson of the commercial club, who returned from that city after a visit of two days. "Several months ago it was thought advisable to raise a goodly sum of money at Eugene for advertising purposes, and hands full at that time with a number of progressive movements, and it was deemed advisable to temporarily postpone the work. "During this time she has completed a first-class hard surface pavement from the depot entirely through the business district on Willamette street, and having realized the benefits of this splendid improvement they have plans out now which will pave the whole central portion of the city, and there is already under contract double as many blocks as are now paved. "Transformed Into Modern City. "When our train pulled into the depot on Thursday, there was a great multitude of people and three handsome up-to-date electric cars. There was a band on the first car that played all the time, because the members of the band live in Eugene and they are just as enthusiastic as anybody else. The pavements were crowded for many blocks, as we passed through the street amid rousing cheers, waving handkerchiefs and hats, in which the ladies joined with the men. It was really an inspiring incident, for it marked the passage from a country town into a modern city. "We visited the new library building at the University grounds, and returned to the Commercial club. At a meeting in the court house in the evening a subscription towards the publicity fund was opened, and the First National bank started the ball rolling with \$1,200, payable monthly, and from that time on there was no let up. "An active committee got out Friday and when I left the subscription was in the neighborhood of \$10,000, and with Senator Booth's subscription and what they have gotten since, I am advised that they have already reached \$12,000, or \$1,000 a month."

The promotion fund of \$1,000 is said to be the largest per capita of any similar fund in the United States, being nearly \$2.00 for every man, woman and child in the city. It is estimated that Eugene has 7,500 inhabitants, and this number is rapidly growing. "I walked down to the depot with Vice-President S. H. Friendly of the Oregon Development league," said Mr. Richardson, "and there we found General Manager J. P. O'Brien, Chief Engineer G. W. Boschke, General Superintendent M. J. Buckley, and Superintendent L. R. Fields of the Southern Pacific, arranging the details for the construction of a splendid depot and handsome grounds. "The people of Eugene feel deeply the temporary straits in which the university is placed, but they know that things are coming out all right and are glad to tell you that there is a larger attendance than ever before. They are working to make the people of Oregon proud of the university and proud of Eugene as one among the most beautiful small cities anywhere in the temperate zone. "Property has advanced new buildings are going up, a \$100,000 hotel is being planned and new brick blocks are under contract. The spirit of progress seems to have seized the city by the middle and is pushing it
