Saturday night two special cars loaded with Woodmen from Portland visited Oregon City camp. They were received by the members of Willamette Falls camp and escorted to their hall, where 30 candidates were initiated. The following companies were represented from Portland: Portland 107, Webfoot 65, Prospect 140, Oregon City 140, a fine increase during the last two months. About 60 new members have been added to the roster. Addresses were made by the following neighbors: General Organizer H. L. Day, R. G. Morrow, O. L. Biddow, Professor Gerry, H. Shade, J. Walker, T. Barber, R. A. McCormick, E. Wallis, Captain Brown, Consul Commander Harry Stevens. The camp decided to attend the Multnomah county fair on October 18. Refreshments were served.

Fire destroyed the rock crusher at Flynn's rock quarry on the Sixth street road at 7:30 o'clock last night. Truck No. 2 and engine 4 responded to a still alarm, but owing to the distance of the quarry from the nearest hydrant, were of little avail in quenching the conflagration. After the fire had been in progress about 10 minutes an alarm was sounded from box 75. Second and Sheridan streets, bringing additional apparatus to the scene. The firemen laid about 3,000 feet of hose to the scene of the disaster but the water was not to be had until the plant had nearly been destroyed. Further impediment was added to the firemen when the road was blocked by tons of rock falling from the bunkers in the crusher. The plant was a total loss, being valued at about \$3,000.

Liberty was the chief theme of a supposed debate at Alisky hall last night during which J. P. McHenry and H. D. Ferguson discussed the superiority of Great Britain over the United States. It was contended that the fewer the laws the greater the liberty, and from this it was argued that the people of the United States were pretty badly law-bound. It was argued that America was trust-ridden, and that free speech was a thing of the past. The injunction statute was attacked as an instrument of monopoly. The debate did not materialize for the reason that both speakers took the same side of the question.

WHEAT KING HAS TO SAVE HIS OWN CROP

Condon, Or., Oct. 7.—Sandy Campbell, the well-known insurance agent of this city, has finished threshing the grain crop on his wheat farm situated about 10 miles west of town. He threshed the entire crop, consisting of 11,000 sacks, with his own threshing machine, and he himself from first to last, not because he liked to, but for the reason that he had to do on account of the extraordinary scarcity of good laborers.

Mr. Campbell bought his wheat land for \$5 an acre a few years ago, before the branch railroad to Condon was built.

UNION SUBSCRIBES FUND FOR STRIKERS

Typographical Organization Encourages Telegraphers With Increase.

Multnomah local of the International Typographical union yesterday expressed its confidence in the progress of the telegraphers' strike by voting an additional \$150 strike benefit, having already given the strikers \$250. Other unions are also cheerfully responding with additional contributions.

The funders also appointed a committee of three to work in conjunction with a like committee from the telegraphers to assist them in an advisory way, and also to visit other local unions seeking additional financial help to assist the operators in carrying on their struggle.

The showing made by the operators convinced the printers that the fight was still on and that the telegraphers are making one of the greatest fights ever made by any union, and especially so in view of the fact that their union is a comparatively young one when compared to others.

As time passes the feeling grows among the telegraphers throughout the country that a more determined stand than ever should be taken and the fight continued to the end. Local telegraphers are daily seeking and accepting employment in other lines, and very few are now without something to do. It is confidently believed that negotiations are now on at Washington looking to a settlement. For reasons best known to himself, President Small is making no announcements, but everything points to the fact that there is "something doing" and that a settlement may be reached within the near future.

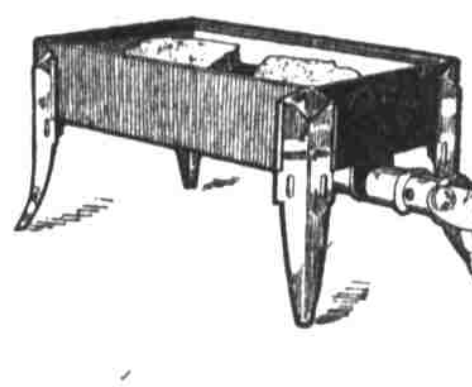
