WEATHER REPORT

The high area that made its appearance over the Washington coast last evening has moved inland and its crest is now centered about Klamath Falls. It has undergone a marked development, both in energy and extent, during the last 12 hours, and now exercises its influence over the entire western half of the country, fair weather prevailing this morning from the Pacific eastward to the Mississippi valley. The depression noted over British Columbia yesterday morning advanced eastward to Manitoba. It appears to be almost completely devoid of energy, no rain occurring during a course extending a moderate amount at Edmonton. The extensive disturbance of yesterday morning over the central portion of the country is now being felt in the New England coast. Moderate to heavy rains have marked its path. The indications point to fair weather over the entire Pacific coast tonight and Wednesday. It will be cooler tonight and western Washington, Oregon and Idaho, with probably frost in eastern Oregon, eastern Idaho and Utah. L. LIDHOLZ, Local Forecaster, Temporarily in Charge.
