The funeral of Orson H. Lane, who died at his home near Woodstock last Sunday, will be held from the family residence at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Mr. Lane was nearly 64 years old, having crossed the plains to Oregon with his parents when 5 years old, in the summer of 1847. The family resided in the Columbia river slough country opposite Vancouver. They moved to the home at Woodstock, where they have since lived, in 1866. Mr. Lane was a member of the United Brethren church for 40 years and was a minister in that church for 30 years. He was also a sergeant in the Oregon Infantry, Company A, and met and became acquainted with General Grant when the general was in charge of the Pacific northwest division and stationed at Vancouver.

A communication from Marshall Brothers, a local contracting cement firm, presented to the council yesterday charges incompetent service from the cement inspectors of the city because of the low salaries paid them. The price of \$3 a day is less than a first class cement worker receives. Many of those appointed, the communication reads, are absolutely ignorant and inexperienced and there is an indefinite charge of graft against them which the firm will be asked to explain to the council more in detail. The matter was referred to the city engineer. An appropriation of \$2,000 from the general fund was made to the sewer repair fund because the extra expense this year has exceeded the regular fund.

A meeting of the United East Side Push club will be held this evening in the quarters of the East Side club, Hotel Sargent, Grand and Hawthorne avenues. This is the regular meeting and there are a number of important features to come up for discussion. The matter of city ownership and operation of a rock crusher will be taken up with the street program and it is expected other matters discussed at previous meetings will be acted upon such as the telephone company's attack on the initiative, the Bull Run reservation, the new Hawthorne bridge that will replace the present Madison structure, annexation of Woodstock and a number of other subjects of interest to the different clubs.

The new clubhouse of the Knights of Columbus at Park and Taylor streets was formally opened last night by the members of the order with a musical program and speeches by prominent members. The clubhouse, which was a twelfth story building, was converted at a large expense into a first class home for the order, and including the property, cost the order more than \$50,000. Among the entertainers last night were Archbishop Christie, City Attorney J. P. Kavanaugh, Ben Worley, Judge Mulkey and Tom Karl of the California opera company, who entertained the company with songs and jokes.

Free permits for street vendors will not be granted after January 1 by the city council. Heretofore such permits have been given to persons physically unfit for manual labor but so many applicants appeared at every meeting to be allowed to sell pencils, shoe strings and the like that it was hard to draw the line and now the streets are crowded with them. All vendors will after the first of January be required to pay the regular fee as a protection to the licensed dealers. The arrangement is made early enough to give them a chance to go elsewhere.

Twelve of the trial jurors out of the entire panel were excused from further attendance by Judge Wolverton of the federal court yesterday afternoon for various reasons. They were John A. Keller, Portland; Peter Held, Clackamas county; Frank Stout, McMinnville; Morris Johnson, Mount Lane county; D. P. Stapleton, Independence; W. F. Rice, Corvallis; Alvin S. Hawk, Portland; O. C. Clark, Houston; Robert J. Linden, Portland; T. J. Duckworth, Camp Creek, Lane county; J. J. Davis, Garfield; H. D. Butz, Dallas.

Auditor Barbours was yesterday instructed by the city council to make investigations concerning what furniture is needed and the cost of it for the city hall and the city hall. Heretofore furniture for these events has been rented but the prices charged are exorbitant and the rental paid amounted to an annual rate of \$5,000 per cent on the value of the furniture. The auditor was instructed to arrange with Multnomah county to meet a share of the expense for using the furniture for county elections.

The ways and means committee yesterday recommended to the city council the appropriation of \$54 for the purchase of three dozen chairs that visitors may not have to stand or go to the gallery. Some months ago an effort was made to exclude visitors, who did not have business to present before the council, from the main floor, but it was found impossible to draw the line, and the committee has adopted the alternative of making them as comfortable as possible.

Business men who have interests on East Burnside street and on Union and Grand avenues have petitioned the city court asking that steps be taken to keep a part of the Burnside street bridge open while repairs are being made. They declare that the closing of the bridge for 60 days as proposed will impose great hardship upon them, and ask that the same course be pursued as was followed when the Morrison street bridge was rebuilt.

The Knights and Ladies of Security held a large initiation of members at Odd Fellows' hall last night. The joint orders initiated 105 members. After the initiation speeches were made by G. H. Thomas, T. A. Bradley and others. Prizes were awarded to those doing the best work in securing new members, after which the company sat down to a banquet.

The ways and means committee yesterday recommended to the city council that the following salaries be raised in the police department: Chief, from \$200 to \$225 a month; captains, \$125 to \$150;

sergeants and detectives, \$100 to \$115; and Marvin Fugh, deputy city engineer, \$115 to \$130. There are now four captains and three sergeants in the department, and only two regular detectives, while the greater part of the detective work is done by the patrolmen as plain-clothes men.

MACHINERY PLANT FOR PORTLAND

Ground Broken for Large Structure at Grand Avenue and Ash Street.

A manufacturing industry that will be developed into large proportions and will be of great importance to the mining interests of the northwest has been located at the corner of Grand avenue and Ash streets, where the Modern Mining Machinery company has broken ground for a building. The dimensions of the structure will be 100x30 feet, and it will be built of cement blocks. As soon as the building is completed a plant will be installed for the manufacture of the Merrill ore pulverizer and other mining machinery.

Hundreds of miles of railroad extensions into mineralized regions of Oregon, Washington and Idaho are expected to open a great field for mining operations in the Columbia and Snake river basin, and from each of these mining regions almost without exception there will be a water grade to Portland. Ore reduction, it is said, is bound to become a great industry as a result of immediate developments in these mining regions, and the easy grades to Portland will make this city a great center for all kinds of mining equipment.
