It seems a most unbusinesslike thing for a shipper to send supplies to market that are not . wanted, and yet when they are wanted he will not sell. For instance, at this time there is a . very large amount of heavy yeal arriving along Front street. Suppiles of heavy veal are increasing while demand is decreasing.

A short time ago this veal would have been in perfect marketable shape and a better price—2c a pound at least—could have been at this time obtained. Even at this time small veal commands a big premium, but it is likely that producers will continue to hold them as of old until they are just opposite from what the market wants. This is the usual occurrence.

DOCUMENT EASES DEFENDANTS' MINDS

Judge Cameron Introduces New Complaint Form for City Court Practice.

A decided innovation in the form of complaints and warrants, which will undoubtedly meet with popular approval, has been introduced in the munici-

al, has been introduced in the municipal court by the city attorney at the special instance and request of Police Judge George J. Cameron.

During his vacation spent in the Puget sound country, Judge Cameron visited Seattle and studied the methods in vogue in the police court of that pity. He ascertained that instead of having two separate forms for complaints and warrants, the Seattle authorities combined these two documents thorities combined these two documents on one sheet, the complaint occupying one side and the warrant appearing on the reverse,

on the reverse.

Always on the lookout for anything tending to reduce the expense of operation of the court over which he presides, and incidentally simplify present methods, Judge Cameron secured several of these forms and submitted them

eral of these forms and submitted them to the city attorney for an opinion as to their legality.

City Attorney Kavanaugh found nothing in the codes prohibiting the combining of complaints and warrants on one form and recommended the change. It will now be possible for the defendants at the time of arrest to ascertain from the complaint the specific nature of the crime charged. 
