

MAY POSTPONE PETIBONE CASE

Judge Wood Will Investigate Illness of Former Federation Official.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Boise, Oct. 10.—Judge Wood will personally investigate the condition of George A. Petibone, who has been in an Idaho hospital for the past month and in case he finds that the trial set for next Tuesday would probably be interrupted by the defendant's illness, will continue the use of his own motion.

In open court this morning Clarence Darrow stated that the defendant was ready for trial and that he was ready to be taken back to jail at any time. The trial judge will report next Tuesday morning, but whether or not the trial will proceed depends on the result of the court's investigation.

PARLIAMENT OPENS; PARALYZES BUSINESS

People Want Universal Suffrage and Refuse to Work During the Session.

Budapest, Oct. 10.—With business at a standstill, fully 1,000,000 workmen are making demonstrations in 150 cities as a result of the opening of the Hungarian parliament today. There is unmistakable evidence that the people want universal suffrage and the business paralysis will continue for 20 hours.

It is necessary to have soldiers operate the gas and waterworks plants. No attempts have been made to run trains. Newspapers have suspended publication temporarily. Soldiers are under arms in all the cities, but are keeping in the background. Practically all the voting power is concentrated in Magyar landowners. The passage of universal suffrage will be a great victory for Emperor Joseph.

MILLIONAIRES SETTLE DISPUTE OVER STOCK

War Between Lindsay and Randolph Settled Without Aid of Courts.

Los Angeles, Oct. 10.—A settlement made out of court yesterday has wiped out numerous suits involving probably \$500,000, has ended a legal dispute that promised interesting disclosures and has brought peace where war was threatened among at least two prominent men of the southwest—Colonel Eps Randolph, railroad and mining king of Arizona, and Lyceus Lindsay, a prominent mining man of Los Angeles.

Through the settlement, Colonel Randolph is to receive \$100,000 and possibly more.

The case in this city was set for trial, but has been stricken from the docket. The same action has been taken with similar cases at Tucson and Tombstone, Arizona, Boston and Duluth, Minnesota. These suits grew out of the sale of the Cananea Central mines to Thomas F. Cole and his associates. Cole is one of the copper kings and following his purchase of the Cananea Central came the consolidation of that company with the Green Cananea company, forming the Green-Cananea company, which has a capitalization of \$60,000,000.

While the entire case is extremely complicated the main point is that there was a dispute between Colonel Randolph and Mr. Lindsay over the ownership of several thousand shares of Cananea Central stock.

BOWLSBY WILL DEPEND ON UNWRITTEN LAW

Astoria, Oct. 10.—The trial of J. H. Bowlsby for the murder of G. C. Jennings on board the Alliance while lying at her dock last night was begun in the circuit court yesterday morning. Up to 4:30 p. m. only ten jurors had been accepted and a special panel has been ordered by Judge McBride.

The defense will attempt to show that Bowlsby was temporarily insane through his promise being broken up by Jennings and that he shot him in self-defense as Jennings had threatened to kill him.

NEW TRIAL GRANTED JOSEPHINE BARUTH

Olympia, Wash., Oct. 10.—The supreme court today granted a new trial to Josephine Baruth, sentenced in Spokane county to 10 years' imprisonment and \$100 fine for killing her husband at Medical Lake. Reversal of the conviction is granted because the testimony was admitted as to statements made by the dying man to his friends respecting the shooting.

Mrs. Staub went to the porch where the bicycle always stood and found it had disappeared, but thought little of the matter and forgot the incident.

But the benevolent stranger had not forgotten his mission. The next day the same voice was heard over the long distance phone—again at the expense of Rev. Mr. Staub—informing the minister that he was certain he could get the lost bicycle.

Beginning to feel some curiosity regarding the identity of the stranger and because of his persistent offers the minister called up Detective Smith. Soon after the latter's arrival the telephone rang and the man with a mission was at the other end. Smith talked with him and made arrangements for the delivery of the wheel.

The engagement was kept, and the man on the wheel, who was not Oscar Bellar but Jake Levens, was taken in custody yesterday and booked on a charge of larceny. The bicycle was held before Judge Cameron this morning. He was found guilty and sentenced to four months in the county jail. Levens had been using several other names besides the two given in connection with the mysterious disappearance of the bicycle.

AITCHISON WINS A VICTORY FOR SHIPPERS

Washington, D. C., Oct. 10.—Clyde B. Aitchison won a signal victory yesterday before the railroad commissioners' convention when he forced the adoption of an amendment to report on changes desired in the interstate commerce law. The committee submitted a report citing that the law had been effective only one year and was not yet sufficiently amended to show it remained unchanged until proven inadequate. Aitchison offered an amendment recommending congress to alter the statute to provide that no increased interstate rate shall be effective or discontinuance of rate already effective shall be permitted, if shippers protest, and until the railroad shall have proved the proposed rate reasonable. This places the burden of proof on the railroad instead of the shipper, and the shipper to prove the increased rate unreasonable.

Aitchison was joined by the Washington commissioners in urging the amendment, which, although attacked by the New England commissioners, was adopted by an almost unanimous vote. Were congress to follow the recommendation embodied in the Aitchison amendment, the north coast shippers would have what they have fought for for years past.

Further conferences by northwest commissioners developed unanimous consent to the plan for forming an association of commissions of all states traversed by the Hill roads. It is likely that a plan will be adopted generally in all parts of the country, which it is believed will do much to bring nearer a solution of the problem of control of common carriers.
