

LIEUTENANT BABB IS TO BE CAPTAIN

Company A, Oregon National Guard, at Eugene, Elects Its Commander.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., Oct. 10.—At an election held by company A, Fourth regiment, Oregon National Guard, here last night First Lieutenant Raymond Babb was unanimously elected captain to succeed

Captain C. C. Hammond, who has been appointed major of the regiment. Captain Babb is a veteran of the Spanish-American war, being a private in company C, Second Oregon volunteers. Since the organization of company A in 1899 he has been a member, having elected first lieutenant four years ago. He is 30 years old, and is employed in a large hardware store in Eugene.

After he obtains his commission as captain he will appoint a first lieutenant. Second Lieutenant J. M. Rennie will doubtless be advanced to that position, and a man from the ranks will be appointed second lieutenant in his place.

DIRT IS FLYING ON NEW RAILWAY

Actual Construction Commences on Eagle Valley Road at Baker City.

Baker City, Or., Oct. 10.—Actual construction work upon the Eagle Valley railroad from Baker City to Eagle and Pine valleys, has been begun and a dream that has been cherished by the people of Baker City has come true. The \$100,000 which the eastern capitalists required before they would take up the project.

W. J. Patterson, who represented the Citizens' Development league, was one of the most active solicitors during the campaign for funds and much credit is due him for his unceasing efforts to raise the required bonus. He was given the honor of turning the first shovel of dirt which started the active operation.

The beginning of the road was not attracted much public attention because of the great calamity that has befallen the city in the assassination of Sheriff Harvey K. Brown. Before leaving for the east to consult with the eastern syndicate W. L. Vinson, the promoter of the road, arranged with John H. Washburn for his grading outfit, consisting of several teams and scrapers, to begin work on the Baker City end of the road. Surveyors have been at work for nearly a week mapping out the route and yesterday morning the grading outfit began operations and this force will be increased as soon as practicable. From now on the work will be pushed as rapidly as possible and before another year has passed Baker City will have rail connections with Eagle and Pine valleys.

With the actual construction work on the railroad, comes the announcement that a smelter will be erected in or near Baker City on the line of the new road. This will mean the development and operation of many mines in the copper and gold belt east of Baker City which are now only prospects but give promise of becoming rich producers. Baker county has one of the richest copper fields in the world and with the opening up and development of this area, a deposit will come an unbounded growth and prosperity for Baker City.

THIRD ANNUAL FAIR OPENED AT BAKER

ACTION OF BOARD ROUSES SUBURB

Sellwood People Hold Meeting and Refuse to Follow Plan of Authorities.

A mass meeting of Sellwood parents last evening at the hall over Knoff's store came to the decision that the school children who have been ordered to change from Sellwood to Midway school will not be permitted to go to the latter school. The parents by a unanimous vote determined to establish a private school in Sellwood or rent quarters near the present school and offer the use of the same to the school board if the board would furnish a teacher.

There were numerous spirited talks on the subject, and the school superintendent and school board we severally criticized for the policy of discrimination frequently shown by these school authorities in their arbitrary disposition of children who are sent away their full proportion of school taxes and who hold that they are entitled to equal advantages for their children.

Object to Methods. It was pointed out that people who pay equally for school advantages should receive the same advantages that other schools furnish. The practice of supplying manual training in some schools but not in others, and of maintaining kindergartens in specially favored schools while the children of other neighborhoods do not enjoy these modern features of education are examples of the board's policies and there were earnest protests against permitting to the dictation of the city school superintendent in the matter of separating the Sellwood children from the Sellwood school.

Shortsightedness of the board in the matter of furnishing recreation grounds for the school children is also a subject of sharp criticism. The Midway school is built among stumps and underbrush and no play grounds are provided for the pupils. Sellwood school with more than 600 pupils, is also without recreation grounds and the children must either play in the streets or spend their leisure moments in the basement. It is believed that the school board is making a serious blunder in postponing action to provide ample playgrounds for every public school in Portland, and it is demanded that all be treated alike liberally in this matter.

Need Recreation. Children who are provided with places for open air games and a pleasant hour at school during their tender years will, it is said, always be loyal to the American public school system as well as college men to their memories of pleasant days spent on the campus. But if the school child's only memories of school recreation are the cellar or the street they will not naturally grow up with much love of the school and its institutions.

The Sellwood parents voted to rent the old Baptist church on Umatilla avenue and offer it to the school board as temporary quarters for the dismissed pupils.

UNWRITTEN LAW CAUSES MURDER

Robert Curtin Killed by John A. Titus for Driving Wife in Auto.

(Pacific Coast Press Leased Wire.) Oakland, Cal., Oct. 10.—Robert Curtin, son of Callahan Curtin, one of San Francisco's pioneer fur goods merchants, shot and killed John A. Titus last evening while the latter was standing in the doorway of his home and in the presence of Titus' wife and seven children. Curtin declared that he killed Titus because he had alienated the affections of Mrs. Curtin. "I loved my wife and was determined that no other man should have her," declared Curtin to the police after his arrest, "and when I learned that Titus was tempting her to travel the wrong path I decided that he should die. I sent the bullet into his stomach, where they would do the most injury and kill him immediately. My wife told me last Tuesday that one week ago last Sunday she went to the Clear Lake lake and spent the night riding about in an automobile with Titus and making the rounds of the resort. I loved her even after she confessed her escapades to me and told her that I would forgive her. I did not

say, however, that I would forgive Titus and I did not.

Curtin was arrested by Captain of Police Brock, Detective Hodgkins and Patrolman Kelly. Titus was placed in an ambulance shortly after the shooting, but was breathing his last when lifted into the vehicle. Two bullets pierced his stomach.
