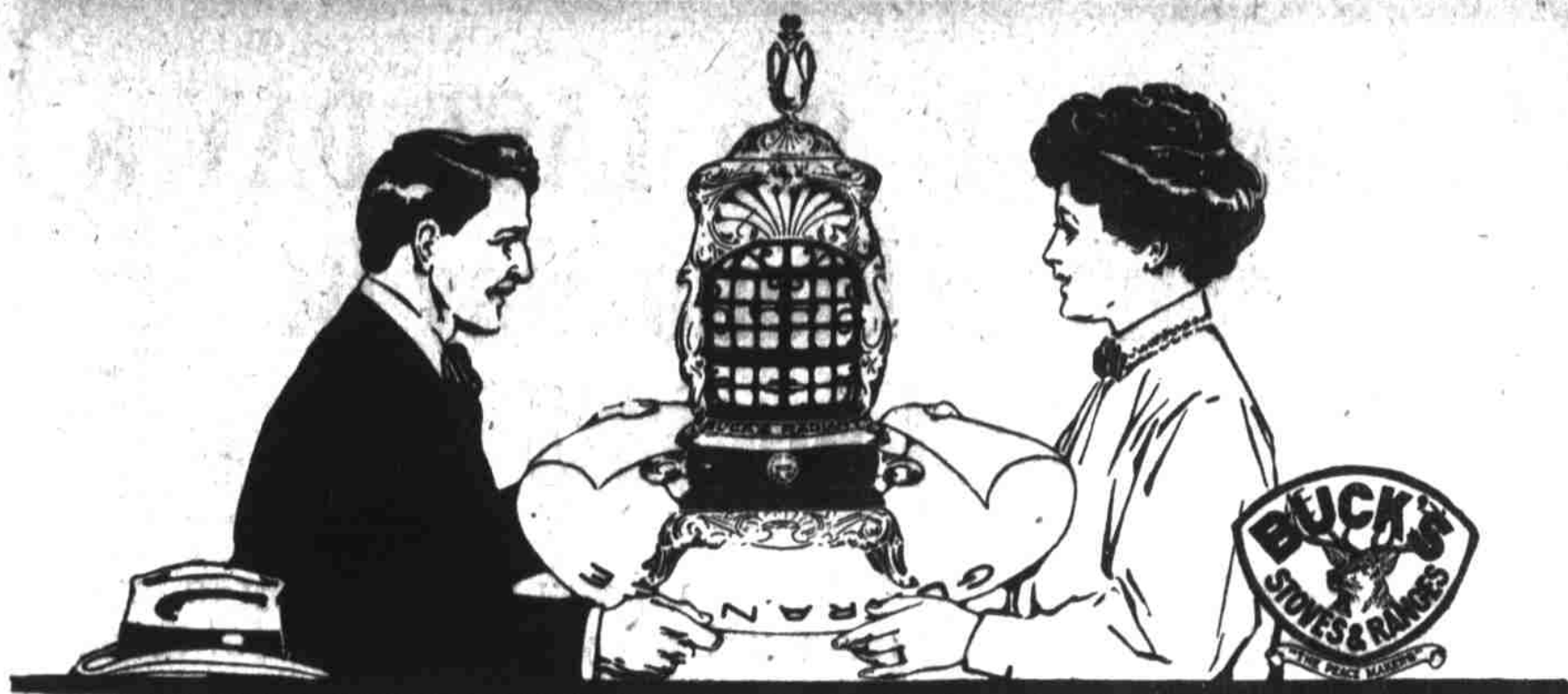

Informal monthly dinners of the Portland Commercial club will be resumed Tuesday, October 15, at 6 o'clock p. m. The occasion of the first dinner will be made a "University night," and there will be short discussions relating to the recent invoking of the referendum on the state university appropriation made at the last session of the legislature, and its effects on the educational institutions of the state. Prominent speakers will present their views on the subject in a manner that will make the occasion an especially interesting one. President Campbell of the state university, W. D. Fenton, H. W. Scott and others will speak.

Protestants from East Ninth street, who objected to paying the assessment for the street improvement, were overriden in the council meeting yesterday, when that body adopted City Engineer Taylor's recommendation that the contractors be paid for their work. The macadam improvement on the street, which is peculiarly situated, was laid

by Glebach & Joplin. Adjacent property-owners stated that the specifications had not been complied with, in that there were a number of sunken places in the street. The contractors agreed to make more fills.

Mayor Lane's reason for vetoing the slate-colored sidewalk ordinance, in which he was sustained by the council yesterday, was due to the fact that no particular brand of lamplblack was specified. The mayor stated that the best grade of lamplblack was worth 20 cents a pound, while certain brands could be purchased for 4 cents. Should people be permitted to use the cheaper grades the sidewalks would be sure to have a motley appearance. The street committee will submit another ordinance specifying the kind of lamplblack to be used.

By a vote of 7 to 6 the proposed increase in the salary of Police Matron Simmons from \$80 to \$100 a month was defeated in the city council yesterday. All of the other salaries were raised as recommended by the committee. Several months ago the salary of the police matron was raised from \$50 to \$80 a month and Vaughn maintained that at the time Mrs. Simmons had agreed not to request another raise. The chief, captains of police, sergeants and detectives will enjoy the increase. Recently the salaries of patrolmen were raised from \$30 to \$100 a month.

The United States civil service commission announces examinations to be held, November 12, to fill vacancies in positions as follows: Blacksmith and wheelwright, salary \$720 a year, at Mesacero agency, New Mexico; contracting engineer, forest service, \$1,500 to \$2,000 a year, service all over

the western part of the United States; assistant technical editor, \$115 a month, in the geological survey, clerk (male or female), \$1,200 and \$500 per year, in the bureau of trade relations, department of state.

Prizes will be awarded for vegetables and flowers grown from seeds distributed last April. There will also be prizes for other exhibits. Women's work will be on exhibition, together with canned fruits and jellies. Dinner will be served at noon. In the afternoon there will be a program. Addresses will be delivered by W. L. Piny and others, officers of the Audubon society. They will tell of the work of the society. In the evening a social will be held followed by a dance. The members of Oswego grange will welcome their friends from Malheur, Clackamas, Washington and other counties.

Ellis Whitman, a contortionist, who is serving a sentence of 18 months for larceny, made an effort to escape from the stockade at Kelly's Butte yesterday. While endeavoring to knock off a board with a sledge hammer he was detected by Guard Burke, who sent a bullet in his direction. Whitman had been surly during the day yesterday. This was not the first time he has made trouble for the officers, and Foreman Briggs ordered him into the dungeon on a diet of bread and water.

Herbert W. Gleason of Boston, the well-known artist and mountain climber, whose beautiful photographs of Pacific coast scenery have recently aroused so much enthusiasm in eastern cities, will give a stereoscopic lecture on the Canadian Alps under the auspices of the Mazamas, Saturday night, 8:15 o'clock, October 12, at Woodmen's hall, Eleventh street, between Alder and Washington. Tickets 50 cents.

The new vehicle ordinance, which provides for licensing all of the delivery wagons in the city, is now ready to present to the council and will be submitted at the next meeting. The ordinance provides an annual license of \$2.50 for rigs and \$5 for double rigs, with \$2 license for each additional animal. In view of the fact that all of the stores pay the occupation tax, it is believed they will strenuously object to the vehicle license.

A friendly suit for partition of \$60,000 worth of property has been begun by Isaac L. White against Gertrude White, Henrietta M. Tichenor, an eight-year-old girl, and the North Pacific sanatorium. The property consists of 13 lots at Twentieth and Olney streets, part of which is occupied by the sanatorium. The three parties in the case are tenants in common, each owning one-third interest.
