

CUT TRAIN ALL LIES, TIME IN TWO SAYS HIM

Completion of North Bank Will Slash Many Hours Off Time From Portland to Spokane—Fierce Competition Will Ensnare.

With the beginning of through train operation on the north bank road the Pacific northwest will witness the most sensational reduction of train time on record. The Northern Pacific will cut its present running time of 18 hours and 10 minutes between Portland and Spokane to about 9 hours and 30 minutes. The present time made by the O. R. & N. company's Spokane flyer will be beaten six or seven hours by the north bank road. It is believed that practically the entire through passenger business between these cities will be thrown to the shorter route.

Open Within Three Months.
It is expected that the new route will be open from Vancouver to Kennewick by January 1, and a few months later it will be opened through to Spokane. The completion of the Columbia and Willamette river bridges will not be waited for, but the trains will be operated from Vancouver until they can be brought direct into Portland. The Portland passenger can buy his ticket here from Vancouver to Spokane, and check his baggage there, take the streetcar from this city to Vancouver and there board the Spokane train.

A fierce struggle for business will be precipitated between the two railroads, and it is expected that the O. R. & N. Co. will carry on the fight even to the reconstruction and shortening of its entire line from Portland to Spokane. Already it has under way the rebuilding of the section from Portland nearly to Cascade Locks, where \$500,000 is being spent for track straightening, cuts, fills and tunnels.

North Bank's Palatial Trains.
While the opening of the north bank road the most palatial trains ever run over the Northern Pacific will come into service between Spokane and Portland, giving the traveling public every luxury from observation parlor cars and diners to bath, barber shop and pantatorium. These palace trains will be the crowning element in bringing Portland and the inland Empire together in the closest community interests, and will give Portland a great trade advantage in eastern Washington and throughout the Idaho region where the branch line of the O. R. & N. and Northern Pacific intersect.

Thousands of people who heretofore have been going to Tacoma or Seattle to transact business will come to Portland because this city offers the quickest and most luxurious transportation facilities. The run from Spokane to Portland over the north bank road will be 270 miles as compared to the present O. R. & N. line of 433 miles. The new road will have straight double tracks, and a practically level grade the entire distance. At its beginning it will have but few steps to make as the new towns along the road are not numerous.

Means Fierce Competition.
But the great feature that gives Portland the permanent advantage is that of competition. The rival roads will vie with each other in giving the best service and accommodations that can be given to the traveler, and this competition will be unceasing but friendly.

The old Northern Pacific line from Spokane to the sound will still be supreme in a limited territory. Having a monopoly it will quite naturally fall behind the north bank road in the high standard that the latter will be forced to maintain.

The Milwaukee road, while paralleling some portions of the Northern Pacific through Washington, will not be completed for some years, its branch lines are still on paper and it will be five to ten years before the completion of this road in eastern Washington and Idaho will be effective over a very considerable area. Meantime the two rival routes "Down Grade to Portland" will be carrying practically all of the business of those vast regions to this city.

Hurrying Construction.
"There is nothing doing in the matter of train service on the north bank line yet," said A. D. Charlton, assistant general passenger agent of the Northern Pacific, when asked today if trains were running. "The line is still in the hands of the construction department. We have no advice as to trains running, but I believe an effort is being made to get them running in time to handle some of the eastern Washington wheat and fruit to some point below Celilo falls, from whence it can be carried by steamboat to Portland."

"There's a Reason"

Chinese Imperial Representative Denies Emphatically That He Intends to Resign—May Take a Trip to China He Adds.

Moy Bak Hin, northwest representative of his august majesty Kwong Shue, son of heaven and head of the Manchu dynasty, is considerably ruffled over the report published that he is contemplating handing in his resignation as Chinese consul general.

When seen this morning by a Journal representative in his store on Yamhill near Third street, Moy Bak Hin made no attempt to conceal his indignation. "There is no truth that I will give up my position as the Chinese imperial representative for Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana," said the irate celestial with questioning relative to the announcement that he was about to resign in order to forestall his summary removal.

"That story is a pack of lies. There has been too much newspaper talk about me in the past. I do not intend to resign, but do not care to discuss the matter beyond that. I never told any reporter that I will give up my position. I may take a trip to China, however."

Notwithstanding Moy Bak Hin's emphatic declaration that he will hold on to the government position, his avowed enemies in the Chinese quarter tell another story. It is a well-known fact that several months ago a petition was circulated asking for his removal from office.

Man Hop, one of the wealthiest Chinamen in Seattle and one of Moy Bak Hin's bitterest foes, made a special trip to this city ostensibly to attend a banquet, but in reality to assist in encompassing the political downfall of the consul. Man Hop in an interview at that time openly accused Moy Bak Hin of having converted to his own use funds raised to ship decrepit Mongolians to China.

Much bitterness was also caused in the Chinese quarter by the alleged action of Moy Bak Hin in attempting to force his countrymen to move into buildings owned by him when the matter of moving Chinatown was agitated, by having a large price offered for the site selected in North Portland by the Six Companies.

Several mass meetings were held as the result of Moy Bak Hin's alleged double dealing and the consul became alarmed for his safety that he requested police protection from Chief Gritzmacher.

KAISER'S OFFICERS ARE TIRED OF CHILE

Berlin, Oct. 11.—The Boersen Zeitung says that the Kaiser has sent a private communication to the president of Chile, Don Pedro Montt, requesting the cancellation of the contracts with the German official army instructors now in Chile, and conceding the permission to return to Germany. The Kaiser has taken this step because of numerous complaints of the insufficient salary and the lack of comradeship in the Chilean army.

REFUSED TO GIVE AID TO THEIR DYING SON

JAPAN PLANS BIGGEST WARSHIP IN WORLD

Yokohama, Oct. 11.—Japan is to have the largest battleship in the world, according to advices received here today. Instructions have also been given to construct a vessel similar to the new style of British destroyer, but much higher. The destroyer will exceed 1,100 tons, have a speed of 35 knots per hour and carry one five-inch, eight four-inch guns. It is to be designed for escort and reconnaissance duties.

TANANA RIVER WILL SOON BE FROZEN OVER

HOLY MEN AID MULAI HAFIG

Moroccan Pretender Will Secure the Throne Without Material Opposition.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Tangier, Oct. 11.—The power of Mulai Hafig, who has been proclaimed sultan in the south, has been greatly strengthened in this part of Morocco by the declaration of the tiemas or Holy men at Fez that he has more legal and moral right to the throne than has Abdul Aziz, the sultan of record. This, coupled with the march of Mulai Hafig's army upon Fez, argues a speedy capitulation of the northern capital.

Paris, Oct. 11.—A telegram has been received from General Druce, commander of the French expeditionary forces in Morocco, saying that one of Mulai Hafig's armies had arrived within 20 miles of Casa Blanca. The Moors have with them four pieces of artillery.

EXCLUSIONISTS PLAN BIG DEMONSTRATION

Northwestern Radicals Will Assemble at Seattle to Discuss Cause.

Seattle, Oct. 11.—Oriental exclusionists from all parts of the Pacific coast, Rocky mountain states, British Columbia and perhaps from other parts of Canada, will gather here for a demonstration December 15, according to plans now made by the Japanese-Korean Exclusion league. Last night the league appointed a committee to arrange the details. This meeting is to be followed a district convention of exclusionists which will be held here November 12.

FOWLER TAKES TRIP ON FISHING SMACK

Friends Believe Exclusionist Will Return From Voyage Sound in Mind.

Seattle, Oct. 11.—A. E. Fowler, the Japanese-Korean Exclusion league secretary, who escaped from the asylum Tuesday, is said to be now aboard a fishing schooner for a cruise to the Pacific halibut banks. He is stated to have been seen by labor leaders in Seattle Wednesday and advised to take a trip and it is believed that when he returns he will be in full possession of his mental faculties.

BULL DRAGS MAN BY ROPE ON THUMB

Lebanon, Or., Oct. 11.—Fred Richardson, aged about 60, who lives about 10 miles east of Lebanon, had an experience with a mad bull yesterday that he will remember. He had a rope on the bull and the animal became infuriated and started to run. The rope got wrapped around one of Mr. Richardson's thumbs and he was unable to get it off or to get the bull stopped, so the rope tore all the flesh off of his thumb and also pulled the thumb off at the first joint. He was dragged for some distance and was badly bruised besides having the thumb torn off. He was brought to Lebanon, where a physician amputated the thumb at the joint. He is getting along well.

SCHMITZ WILL APPEAL FROM HIS SENTENCE

San Francisco, Oct. 11.—The attorneys for ex-Mayor Eugene Schmitz, who has been convicted of extortion and sentenced to five years' imprisonment, will this afternoon file the appeal in the appellate court. It was not believed that the matter would come up for hearing until late in November or early in December.

AMERICAN AUTOIST IS ATTACKED IN FRANCE

Paris, Oct. 11.—Charles P. Baird of Philadelphia, a son of the manager of the Baldwin Locomotive works, was badly beaten and kicked by passengers and then locked in a country jail near Neuilly today because his automobile killed a boy. In attempting to avoid an omnibus the machine hit the boy.

MAGILL ACCUSED OF SLAYING WIFE

Prosecutor Mitchell Abandons Theory of Suicide Pact Between Couple.

Decatur, Ill., Oct. 11.—Prosecutor Mitchell, in opening the case for the state today, demanded the death penalty for Fred Magill, who with his bride, is accused of being responsible for the death of his first wife. Following an eleventh hour decision, Mitchell made a direct charge of murder, instead of the claim that Magill was responsible for his wife's death through a suicide pact. Mitchell argued that Magill killed his wife by administering chloroform, by strangling her and by wrapping blankets around her head. He was aided, he said, by Fay Graham, now his wife, who was present, either in person or incited him to do the deed. Before Mrs. Magill's death, the prosecutor said, Fay told her neighbors Mrs. Magill had bid her goodbye.

Magill told three stories that did not agree with circumstances of the case. One was that when he refused to take morphine at her request she swallowed a large quantity of the drug. The state contends that Magill murdered his wife, took the body to where it was found and placed it in a position indicating suicide.

FORMER CHAMPION TAKES LAUDANUM

Bellingham, Wash., Oct. 11.—Robert Schwab, at one time world's champion lightweight wrestler, last night attempted suicide with laudanum because his girl-wife, aged 16, was at a skating rink persisting in flirtations with other men. Schwab will recover.
