

LUMBERMEN BALKED BY RAILROADS

Rates to East From South Are Raised Despite Injunction Issued Here at Request of Shippers Who Are Affected.

Output of Mills Which Has Been Sent to Los Angeles at Heavy Expense Will Be Taxed at Same Rate as That Loaded at Home.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 11.—Injunction or no injunction, lumber shippers who thought they might ship their material through ports of Los Angeles from Oregon and Washington ports because of the shortage of cars in the north, will have to pay the advanced rate of 10 cents per hundred pounds on all lumber shipments from Pacific coast points to the east after November 1 next.

While the controversy was on in the north it became evident that the northern roads could not handle the traffic and the lumbermen began to arrange shipments to San Pedro and Redondo. They were willing to pay temporarily the extra 11 cents per hundred charged for the water haul, but they did not figure that the rail rates from southern California would be increased in common with those up north. Many thousands of feet of lumber had been shipped to this port in the meantime. Now the northern shippers find themselves handicapped here as badly as they were in the north as the advance in freight rates from this port now stares them in the face.

Officials of the railroads in this city declare the new advanced rates will go into effect November 1 from Los Angeles regardless of the injunction issued in Portland.

SILVERTON MARSHAL BOUND TO GRAND JURY

Silverton, Or., Oct. 11.—The case against A. G. McMillen, marshal of this city, charged with malfeasance while acting in his official capacity, was heard in Justice Webster's court at 10 o'clock. The justice bound the marshal over to the grand jury on his own recognizance.

McMillen's arrest was occasioned by his failure to serve a warrant on C. N. Matlock, a saloonkeeper of this city, who is alleged to have violated the Sunday closing ordinance a few weeks ago.

ONCE WEALTHY; EAST SIDE DIRT TO FLY

Philip Best Found Dead in Change Room of Butte Brewery.

Butte, Mont., Oct. 11.—Philip Best, formerly of Milwaukee, where at one time he was regarded as very wealthy, being a son of the original owner of the Pabst brewery, has been found dead on the floor of the change room in a Butte brewery. It was said that during recent years he had been a heavy drinker and that he was also addicted to the use of drugs. He was employed as a laborer in the brewery.

His body was found by the watchman on the floor beside a bench, on which his overalls were rolled to form a pillow. It is supposed that he had lain down on the bench to sleep and that during the night had rolled off and died soon afterward. His hands were in the bosom of the coat as if to keep them warm. One of the brewery employees in cleaning up the room found a package supposed to have contained morphine.

Best was about 55 years old and had been a resident of Butte for many years. He was at one time treasurer of the Butte Brewing company in Milwaukee and accounted a rich man. Family troubles and the use of liquor are understood to have caused his removal from that city to Butte. Here his brother Louis had brewery interests and he was given employment up to the time of his death. Louis Best died several years ago.

Philip Best received money regularly from his Milwaukee relatives. This was transmitted to him through the hands of a friend in this city, who passed it out in small amounts. The major portion of this went for liquor and drugs. It is said. The coroner will not hold an inquest.

NEW ROSEBURG DADS INTEND TO BOOST

Roseburg, Or., Oct. 11.—The city council met last night in what will be the last meeting for the majority of the members. Mayor Hoover appointed Charles E. Roberts city surveyor to take the place of Oscar Edwards, who has moved to St. Johns. Mr. Roberts recently returned from Panama. Frank Miceli was appointed city attorney. Both were immediately ratified by the council.

The vote of the city election, held last Monday, was canvassed. The newly-elected aldermen will take their seats at the next regular meeting November 4.

Reports of officials show the city is very prosperous. The new council will, however, try to add much to the good work that has been done and make the city better and more inviting to the prospective home-seeker.

BRAIN WEIGHS BUT TWENTY-FOUR OUNCES

New York, Oct. 11.—An autopsy performed on the body of Daniel Lyons, 46 years old, a Pennsylvania tunnel watchman, who was found dead yesterday, developed the fact that the man's brain weighed only 24 ounces. So small a brain is seldom found in a healthy man. Professor John Larkin, of the College of Physicians and Surgeons, who assisted at the autopsy, said that he had made 5,000 autopsies, but had never found a brain so small.

The case of the French statesman, Gambetta, was the only one he could cite. Gambetta's brain weighed 25 ounces.

Half Dozen Improvement Organizations Already Arranging Plans for Coming Year—Better Streets and New High School.

With the approach of cooler weather the dozen or more east side improvement clubs are getting together and effecting a general reorganization for the purpose of securing the desired and in many instances badly needed improvements in their various territories.

The general and special improvements that have been made on the east side in the past two years as a direct result of the activities of these organizations is very much greater than is generally supposed. The enormous amount of fill work in the central east side, the new bridge over Sullivan's gulch and much of the later street improvement on the other side of the river were all brought about by push club activity.

The Woodstock improvement club meets at 8 o'clock tonight in the Woodstock hall for the purpose of discussing annexation to Portland. The annexation question is a popular one in Woodstock, sentiment there being very largely in favor of coming into the city. A small strip of Woodstock territory adjacent to the car line is already in the city limits and it is now proposed to get ready to vote the remainder, which is more than four fifths of Woodstock proper, into the city at the next city election.

Residents of upper Albina will meet tonight in Woodmen of the World hall, corner Russell street and Rodney avenue, where an up-to-date push club will be organized for that part of the city. Councilman R. E. Menefee, who has seen the good accomplished by similar organizations for other portions of the city, has sent out over 100 invitations to citizens to be present and take part in the new organization.

Councilman Menefee is determined to secure much needed improvements for his ward and believes that an improvement club will give him valuable aid.

A meeting of the Waverly-Richmond improvement club will be held tonight at the residence of M. J. Morse, East Twenty-eighth and Taggart streets. Street improvement for that district will be the main topic of discussion.

The proposed new high school building for upper Albina will be discussed at the meeting tonight of the Noita improvement club, which will meet at the club's rooms on Killingsworth avenue.

MAY ADOPT STATE OF WASHINGTON PLAN

NEW CHARGE MADE IN WAYMIRE CASE

Information Filed This Afternoon Drawn Under the Common Nuisance Law.

The Radding-Waymire badger game case made its appearance in the office of the county clerk this afternoon, when an information was filed against the two conspirators by Deputy District Attorney Haney. The case has not yet been set down for trial, but will be in a short time and brought before the court at the earliest moment possible.

The old charge of attempting to extort personal property from the mayor brought against the two defendants, and upon which they were bound over from the municipal court, has been changed by the district attorney's office. In the new information filed against Radding and Mrs. Waymire this afternoon they are charged, under section 1936 of the code, with having conspired to ruin the good name and reputation of Mayor Lane by a plot to bring charges of immorality against him, which were not founded in fact.

The statute under which the new information has been drawn is known as the "common nuisance statute," and is the same law under which the suits against the gambling and pool games were brought and convictions had.

Investigation is still being made into the plot laid against the mayor and a number of new witnesses have been examined by the district attorney. It is not known just when the case will be tried because of the congested condition of the circuit court docket.

Some of the cases have been settled out of court and perhaps will be continued until the next term, so it may be possible to bring the Radding-Waymire case to trial in the immediate future. It may be possible, however, that it will have to be postponed until after the close of the present term.

SCHOOL INSPECTION WILL BEGIN MONDAY

Volunteer Corps of Medics Will Look After Health of the Children.

Medical inspection of the city schools will commence next Monday by the volunteer corps of physicians organized by Dr. Esther C. Pohl, city physician. A meeting of the special committee appointed to outline the method of inspection at the general assembly of physicians, met in the Columbia building last night.

Decided upon last night the inspection of the schools will not be done collectively. The health officer will supply the principals and teachers of the various school buildings with circulars showing the symptoms of the various diseases. If any are detected by those having charge of the children, they will immediately notify the physician inspector, so that an examination can be made. Should the pupil be found afflicted with any infectious malady, he will promptly be sent home and the family instructed to call a physician to attend the sufferer.

Unhealthy conditions will also be reported by the inspectors wherever they exist. An effort will also be made to keep children out of the houses, so as to allow them the liberty of the lawns for playgrounds.

A number of communications have been received from heads of the different schools asking that the inspection begin immediately and lauding the volunteer physicians for their previous efforts to protect the public health.

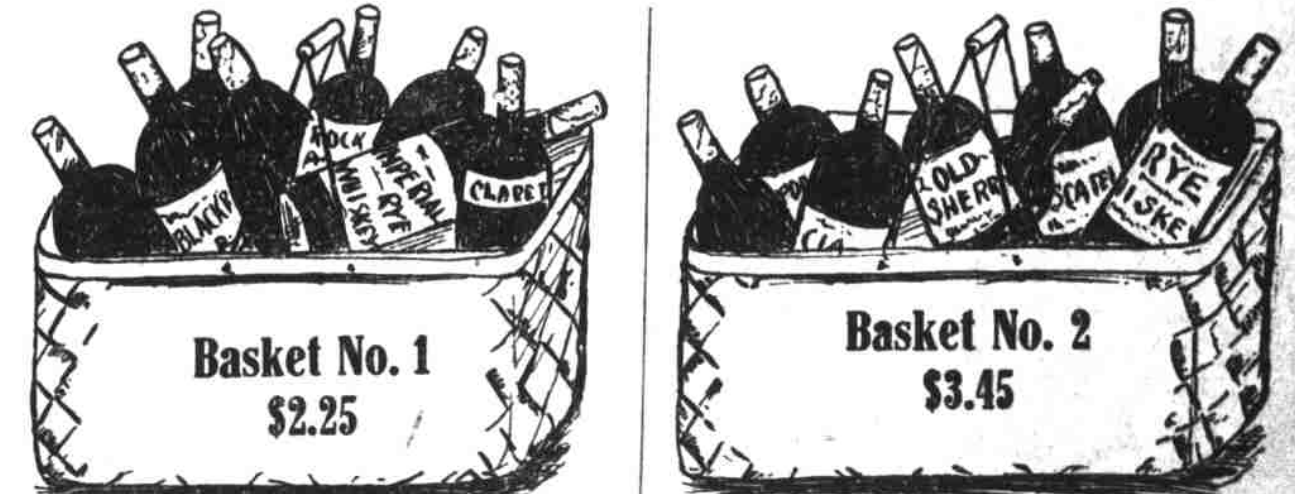

"BOO-HOO" Shouts a Spanked Baby.

A doctor of divinity, now editor of a well-known religious paper, has written regarding the controversy between Collier's Weekly and the religious press of the country, and others, including ourselves. Also regarding suits for libel brought by Collier's against us for commenting upon its methods.
