

LOWITT HAS NEW PLAN

Offers to Place Additional Stock in Golden Eagle Leaving Latter in Hands of Assignee Until Bank Is Paid 40 Per Cent.

A new and definite proposition made today by Gus Lowitt, former manager of the Golden Eagle department store, to the receiver and depositors' association of the Oregon Trust & Savings bank, is under consideration, and will probably be accepted. Mr. Lowitt, with a view ultimately of regaining possession and continuing in business permanently, offers to place additional new goods in the store and leave the store entirely in the management of the present assignee until the bank has been paid 40 per cent. of its claim.

At a meeting this afternoon of Lowitt, Receiver Devlin, officials of the Depositors' association and representatives of the reorganization committee the proposition was formally received and discussed. The attitude of the receiver is not positively stated, but it is said he is desirous of doing what ever the bank's creditors regard as for their best interests, and that he will be largely influenced by the wishes of the depositors.

Settle Question Soon.
"We want to get the most that can possibly be secured from the store for the benefit of the depositors, but at the same time deal fairly with all other creditors," said Secretary Richardson of the Depositors' association. "The interests of all will be fully considered and we will try to do what is the best thing to do. The question will be settled tonight or tomorrow morning, and we will know whether it is to be done with the Golden Eagle and its liability to the bank."

It is said the store's stock involved \$111,000. Out of this it would be necessary to net more than \$50,000 in order to pay 40 per cent. to all its creditors. It is feared this will be impossible unless the stock is replenished and the store kept running for some time. In 17 days the store has taken in \$41,000 under the management of the assignee. This is an average business of \$2,400 per day. The expense of clerk hire is estimated at \$200 per day. Other expenses are not stated.

Eastern Creditors Under Contract.
Eastern creditors are said to be under contract to wait 60 days from date of their contract for a final settlement. It is represented by Mr. Lowitt that if the stock is kept up and the store properly advertised it will easily take in enough money in 30 or 40 days to pay the bank and all creditors 40 per cent. provided all will accept 40 per cent. alike as a final settlement.

The eastern creditors have agreed to accept that percentage, and it is now up to the savings bank people to determine whether their interests will be best conserved by accepting that percentage.

The store is now practically owned by the bank, which means the depositors in the bank. Acting together 16,000 depositors could become a powerful factor in the building up of an enormous retail trade for the Golden Eagle should they decide to throw all their influence and trade to it. They would have the immense advantage of organization and selfish interest, more effective than the ordinary cooperative store, and it would be considered that by trading there until the bank was paid back they would be practically keeping their money by putting it from one pocket into the other.

Bonds Are Being Taken.
Subscribers to Home Telephone bonds continue to come in and take a sure thing in exchange for an uncertainty by signing up for bonds in lieu of their deposit accounts. Yesterday the amount taken was \$21,000, bringing the total up to \$427,800. The total will reach \$550,000 by tonight. The workers have been

MEDFORD CLAIMS BANNER PRICES
New Record for Prices From the C. H. Lewis Bear Creek Orchard.

Medford, Or., Oct. 11.—The banner price in the history of the pear trade was received for fruit from the C. H. Lewis Bear creek orchard at Medford, when a carload of Doy du Comice pears sold September 30 at auction in New York by Rao & Hatfield for \$4,622.80 gross. Four hundred and five boxes sold for \$4.10 a box, or \$5.20 a full box, or at retail over 60 cents a pear.

As an illustration of the money there is in the scientific growing of pears, the Snow & Butta orchard, owned by Fred H. Hopkins, north of Medford, furnishes an example. From 16 1/2 acres of Winter Nellis trees Mr. Hopkins picked and sold \$13,000 worth of pears this month. The pears were sold for \$2.50 a box f. o. b. the orchard. The trees are 17 years old. Mr. Hopkins purchased the orchard, which is one of the finest groves anywhere, for \$100 an acre three years ago. Last year he netted \$9,500 from these pears.

Details of the sale of P. F. E. car 2,784 from Medford have just been received by mail. They show that 405 half boxes sold for \$4.10, 127 half boxes at \$4.05, 237 half boxes at \$3.95, 194 half boxes at \$3.90, 76 half boxes at \$3.80, eight half boxes at \$3.70, 16 full boxes at \$3.60.

On the same day Perkins Comices, car No. 2673, from Medford, sold by Scobell & Day, showed 72 half boxes of Doy du Comice from J. W. Perkins orchard, owned by J. W. Perkins, grossed \$4,454. Next to the record held by C. H. Lewis pears is that of F. L. T. V. Velle, whose Comices brought \$4.05 a half box, or \$8.10 a full box at auction in New York. Detailed report of P. F. E. car 5,089, containing fruit from several orchards, sold at auction by Scobell & Day, shows 72 half boxes of Doy du Comice from Tou Velle, at 40 half boxes at \$4.05; 241 boxes of d'Anjou pears from Watts orchard, \$3.60, and 50 boxes of the same variety from J. C. Jones \$5 a box. Several boxes of Beurre Bosc from W. Fridiger brought \$4.62 1/2.

This about winds up the Comice shipments from Medford for this year. Next year much more fruit of this variety will be shipped. Doy du Comice grow to perfection in the Rogue river valley and are superior to the namesake pear in France.

In another car sold the same day by Scobell & Day, which grossed \$3,206, 223 half boxes of Comices from E. J. DeHart's Oakeside orchard grossed \$3,775, or \$7.50 a full box, and 223 half boxes of Comices from D. R. Hill's d'Anjou pears from DeHart's orchard grossed \$5,423 1/2.

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EXHIBIT WILL GO TO GRESHAM FAIR
Vegetables Grown by Multnomah County School Children Displayed This Week

Instead of holding the exhibit of potatoes and popcorn grown by Multnomah county school children at the city hall, the authorities have decided to place the vegetables on show at the grand fair at Gresham next week. Notices to this effect have been sent out by the county school superintendent's office, and all exhibits which can be made ready by Saturday or Monday should be sent to the Gresham school.

The exhibit of vegetables and asters grown by the school children were on show in the city hall, and in order to avoid confusion it became necessary to notify teachers in the various schools of the change in place of holding the show.

It is expected that the exhibit of popcorn and potatoes will prove equally interesting with those of the sweet peas and asters which attracted hundreds of visitors to the city hall. Eighteen cash prizes will be awarded for the best exhibits brought in by the children.
