

DEAD WIFE MUCH ALIVE

Supposed Suicide Is Charged in Complaint Sworn to by Deserted Spouse With Having Run Away With Another Man.

Mourning as dead by her grief-stricken husband who so implicitly believes that his helpmeet plunged to her death in the waters of the Willamette that he has caused a search to be made for the woman's body, yet being eagerly sought by the police on charges preferred by a deserted wife, is the remarkable case of Mrs. Grace M. Justice, whose hat and coat and incidentally a pathetic little note of farewell were found under the top dock at the east end of the Steel bridge about 10 days ago.

From all the circumstances surrounding the disappearance of Mrs. Justice, who is the wife of Joseph C. Justice, a grain handler of 727 Northwick street, the police, the heart-broken husband and two daughters were firmly convinced until Friday that the woman had committed suicide.

Complaint Is Filed.
On that day, however, Mrs. Lida Foster of 1410 Eighth street, Vancouver, an intimate friend of the missing woman, appeared at the municipal court and signed her name to a complaint against Mrs. Justice and her husband, Jacob H. Justice. The unexpected sequel to the supposed suicide caused a positive sensation in police circles where it was accepted as a fact that Mrs. Justice had accomplished her death in the river.

Justice, who has been almost distracted with grief since the finding of his loved one's garments and the letter, in which she declared that all of her earthly troubles would soon be over, has haunted the police station daily, anxiously awaiting some news of the finding of his wife's body. He is left that she had gone down to her death in the Willamette he engaged Hugh Brady, the veteran diver, to grapple for the remains.

Now comes Mrs. Foster with the sensational allegation that on the day of Mrs. Justice's mysterious disappearance Jacob Foster likewise dropped from sight and she claims to have evidence tending to establish that the latter woman instead of finding success from sorrow in the Willamette is basking in the sunshine of Foster's smiles somewhere in the northwest.

Couples Were Intimate.
When seen at her home in Vancouver last evening by a Journal representative, Mrs. Foster reiterated her story that she thinks that her spouse and Mrs. Justice have fled together. According to the woman's tale to Clerk Hennessy at the time of securing the warrant, the Justices were on terms of great intimacy with herself and husband. The two couples often attended places of amusement together and on many occasions, according to the complainant, Foster escorted Mrs. Justice while the grainhandler accompanied Mrs. Foster.

Some time ago the Foster family moved to Vancouver, and about the time of Mrs. Justice's disappearance Foster is alleged to have come to Portland, announcing at the time that he had secured employment in the terminal yards. Her husband did not return home. Mrs. Foster made a quiet investigation, with the result that she claims to have ascertained that he had never been working for the railroad company, incidentally that he was seen in the company of a woman thought to have been Mrs. Justice.

Believes Wife Is Dead.
With other facts in her possession Mrs. Foster laid the matter before the district attorney and the warrant was issued. Justice still clings to the theory that his wife committed suicide and cannot be convinced to the contrary. Chief Gritzmaier has detailed a detective to search for the couple, and gives it as his opinion that Mrs. Foster's story may be well founded. Mrs. Justice's hat, coat and note are still at headquarters, but whether she lies in a suicide's grave at the bottom of the river or is with Foster are matters for future determination.

CLARKSON KNEW HE WAS VIOLATING LAW

New York, Oct. 12.—There were several developments today in connection with the elopement and subsequent developed matrimonial entanglements of Miss Helen Maloney, daughter of Martin Maloney, multimillionaire Standard Oil magnate and pupal marquis. Mr. Maloney, Arthur Herbert Osborne, who was married to Miss Maloney "just for fun" two years ago, and William Fanning, Mr. Maloney's lawyer, held a conference in Mr. Fanning's office, at which young Osborne convinced the father and lawyer that his story of the marriage was true; that Samuel Clarkson, who eloped with Miss Maloney, one of her previous marriages and a second ceremony would be bigamous, as he consulted a lawyer on the subject the day preceding the elopement. Martin Maloney is in Montreal investigating the report that his daughter and Clarkson ever married in that city.

FRANK WILSON IS NOT MAN WANTED

One Named by Granite Hobo Proves to Be Peaceful Dweller in Linn.

Albany, Or., Oct. 12.—The citizens of Brownsville have been somewhat excited over the alleged presence in their midst of one Frank Wilson, whom Frank Tucker, the Granite suspect, accused of having killed Harvey K. Brown at Baker City. About ten days ago this stranger appeared in a barber shop there and after getting a shave departed for the hills in the vicinity of Crawfordville. Afterward it was learned that the man was recognized by old residents in that section as having lived there years ago and as having been a laborer on a ranch near Crawfordville. He is said to have come to Oregon from Kansas some years ago. He has been in eastern Oregon but would occasionally return to Brownsville, attend to business affairs there and return to eastern Oregon. A description of the alleged suspect is as follows: Age, about 45; weight, 200; height, 6 feet, 2 inches; slightly gray; of rather quiet disposition.

The attaches of the Linn county sheriff's office immediately undertook to gain some information concerning the man and have been able to establish his identity to the satisfaction of themselves. For a time it seemed as if the guilty party might actually have taken refuge in the hill country of Linn county and was there endeavoring to elude his pursuers. In investigation it is learned that Wilson is residing with George Finley, a prominent farmer, and is a property owner and well known friend of the Finley family. Although possessing the exact name of the party named by the suspect Tucker, it is impossible to connect him with the crime, and the matter of his apprehension has been dropped by the local authorities.

CONFEDERATE IS FOR ROOSEVELT

Brigadier - General Helm Writes Open Letter Advocating Third Term.

Jackson, Miss., Oct. 12.—Brigadier-General George M. Helm, commanding the Second brigade, Mississippi division, United Confederate veterans, one of the wealthiest planters of the delta and a lifelong Democrat, has written an open letter in which he strongly advocates the election of President Roosevelt for a third term.

General Helm waives the question of precedent as too trivial for discussion and urges that party lines be dropped in order that the business of the nation may be benefited by the reelection of Mr. Roosevelt.

The chief reason he urges is the contention of a deep-water channel from the lakes to the gulf.

In a long letter General Helm makes an appeal to the voters of the south to send this message to the voters of the north:

"We assure you from the bottom of our hearts of our great confidence in the ability, honesty and integrity of Theodore Roosevelt, and will help you to elect him in 1908. His first occupancy of the presidential chair was by all deplored, by none more than himself, and he pledged himself for the balance of the term to carry out the McKinley policy, and he did. Who can say that the man who has acquired world-wide fame in the paths of peace cannot be trusted longer in his own household, and that he should not be given two terms with which to work out his own policies?"

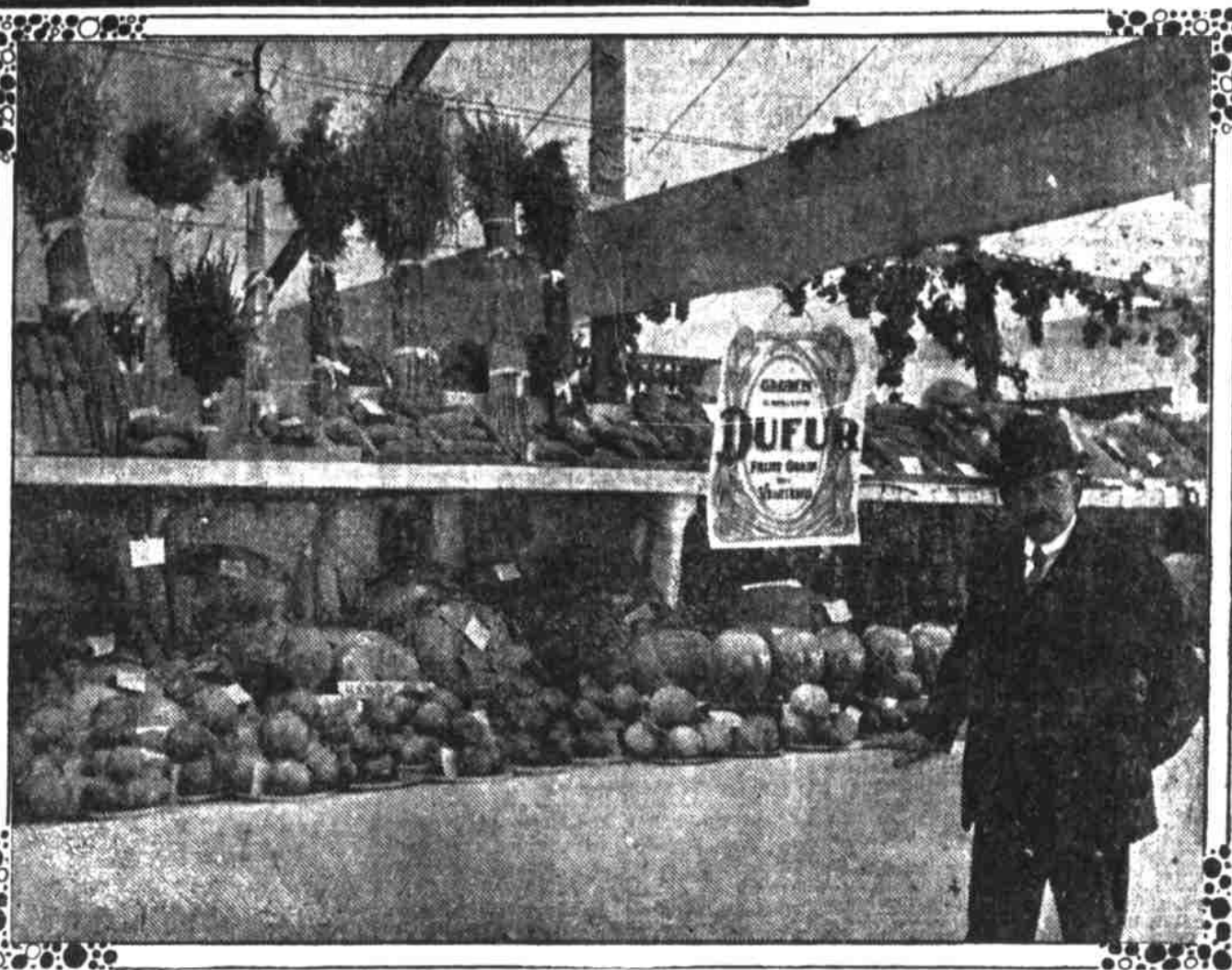
Corvallis, Or., Oct. 12.—Secretary C. T. Hurd of the Y. M. C. A. at the Oregon agricultural college has been authorized to proceed with the purchase of material for the erection of the walls of the partially-completed "Y" building at the college. A shed has been completed this week for housing the material and Secretary Hurd will order as much as he has funds on hand to pay for. This building is badly needed but whether it will be completed this winter or not is problematical.

Much work is being done on the college grounds just now. Alpha hall, the girls' old dormitory, is being remodeled to fitting it up into a hall for the pharmaceutical department.

Gas tanks are being put in the old blacksmith shop, now deserted, preparatory to fitting it up into a hall for the mining department.

Work on the handsome new mechanical arts building is being rushed and roofing is now being put on the south wing. The college printing office will be moved into this wing at the earliest possible moment.

An effort is being made in the east and middle west to form an industrial peace congress to devise ways by which strikes may be averted whenever a dispute may arise between employer and employee.

VOTERS ASK CHANGE IN PRECINCT LINES

County Commissioners Besieged by Petitioners Who Want Bounds Changed.

The county commissioners are almost daily receiving suggestions as to changes desired by citizens in the rearrangement of election precinct lines, made necessary by the excessive number of voters in 21 precincts of the city. These suggestions are coming not alone from the city, but from country districts, where some of the voters would be pleased with changes that will lessen the inconvenience of travel on election day.

One of the aggravated cases in this regard is in the extreme eastern section of the county. At Palmer's mills are about 150 voters, who have to descend a long, steep hill to reach the voting place at Bridal Veil. This involves a journey of about three miles, and as a result many of the workmen stay at the mill when election day comes. It is proposed to include in the New Palmer's mill precinct a section of farming country near by that would also be benefited by the change.

A situation similar to that at Bridal Veil is said to exist at Latourelle. The commissioners are considering these complaints while inspecting the city map, where 10 or 12 precincts will have to be created.
