Night of It at Hatton,
Washington.

TERROR TO PATRONS, RUIN TO FIXTURES.

Second Descent Happens to Be Upon
a Barkeep Who Knows the Real
Bad Man from the Bogus—
Two Disabled; One Flees.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Spokane, Wash., Oct. 12.—The times
of the early frontier seem to be return-
ing at Hatton, Washington. Last night
three cowpunchers attired in chaps and
spurs and looking tough entered the
saloon at Hatton, as they said, "to show
you fellows what a good time is." They
ordered the drinks and a deck of cards
and at the point of a gun demanded all
presents to enter the game. Those re-
fusing were made to sit in chairs along
the side of the room, faces to the wall.
Every now and then drinks were or-
dered. The "good time" ran on for
about two hours, when the proprietor
asked that they settle their bill.
"To hell with your bill! What do
you think we are, anyway?" spoke up
the ringleader. We're running this here
place now, and don't owe nobody. If we
did, we wouldn't pay it."

Leader Rides Into Saloon.
With this one arose and went behind
the bar, put the bartender out and pro-
ceeded to dash out the drinks. Another
pulled the gun across the bar and shot
at the bartender and the two of several
of the scared victims sitting against
the wall.

The ringleader rode his horse into
the saloon and went behind the bar and
shot all the fancy fixtures to pieces.
After turning everything upside down
and frightening all present they rode to
Holladay Bros. saloon, 10 miles distant.
They proceeded as before by
ordering drinks and cards.

MAGILL PROSECUTION PROVES TO BE WEAK

Case Against Banker and
Second Wife Looks Good
for the Defendants.

(Herald News by Longest Leased Wire.)
Decatur, Ill., Oct. 12.—Judge Coch-
ran at noon adjourned the trial of for-
mer Banker Fred H. Magill and his
young wife, Fay Graham Magill,
charged with the murder of Mrs. Pet
Magill, until Monday morning. There
was not a great deal of testimony ad-
duced during the morning of substan-
tial interest to the state in its attempt
to show that Fred Magill and Fay Gra-
ham administered the deadly poison
to Mrs. Pet Magill. Nor was the evidence strong
showing that they had conspired to put
the woman and wife out of the way.
Mrs. Fred Kline of Clinton testified
that between 9:30 and 10 o'clock on the
night of May 30, during which Mrs. Pet
Magill died, she saw Fred Magill three
blocks away from her home, coming
from the direction of Fay Graham's
home.

Mrs. N. P. Rundie, testifying as to
the defective eyesight of Mrs. Pet Ma-
gill, said:
"She told me she could not put on her
glasses without her glasses."
Dr. Myer, her physician, declared
that if she were without them for five
minutes their absence caused her vio-
lent wrenching of the stomach.
Mrs. Louis E. Blome, one of the first
callers at the Magill home the morning
after Mrs. Magill's death, when she
saw any one, replied that she had
not. "Neither Magill nor Fay
shed any tears," she said.
"What was Magill's attitude?" she
was asked.
"Oh, he walked nervously up and
down the parlor floor and now and then
exclaimed, 'Damn it all!'"
Mrs. Maud Feiner, the marriage li-
cense clerk at Denver, who issued the
license for Magill and Fay Graham,
testified that Magill under oath had
said that he was a resident of Decatur
and that the girl was a resident of
Chicago.

UNWRITTEN LAW CLEARS BOWLSBY

Jury Speedily Says He Was
Justified in Killing
Jennings.

Astoria, Or., Oct. 12.—The jury in the
case of J. H. Bowlsby, charged with the
murder of Steve Jennings, June 14,
aboard the steamer Alliance, tonight
brought in a verdict of not guilty, on
account of temporary insanity, after
being out less than two hours. The ver-
dict meets popular approval.

JONES' DRAFT COMES BACK FROM BROTHER

Indorsers at The Dalles Will Prob-
ably Let It Drop If Jones
Comes Through.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
The Dalles, Or., Oct. 12.—Sheriff
Levi Christman placed Clarence Jones
under arrest while the latter was en
route to Tacoma, between Mosier and
River. Jones was brought to The
Dalles, where he is held to appear in
the justice court for preliminary trial
October 22, on a charge of obtaining
money under false pretenses. He is un-
der \$1,000 bail and has not raised the
amount.
It seems that last June Jones drew

a slight draft for \$300 on a brother,
John Jones, of New York and secured
the money on it from the First Na-
tional bank in this city after he had
secured the indorsement of C. J. Strub-
ling and the late Frank Taylor. The
draft was honored by the local bank but
repudiated by Jones' brother. Payment
was demanded of the indorsers and the
amount was paid.
Jones was away from the city and
had not been heard of until a short time
ago. He was finally located by the
sheriff. It is understood that the in-
dorsers will not prosecute Jones if he
makes good.

Nose-Biter Breaks Jail.

Pendleton, Or., Oct. 12.—T. J. Burton,
who pleaded guilty of assault in biting
off Mark Shackelford's nose in a drunk-
en fight and was sentenced to 90 days
