WEATHER REPORT

Portland, Or., Oct. 12.—The depression
over the plateau region is developing
in energy, and this evening the weather
is cloudy and threatening over the dis-
trict east of the Cascades. Traces of
rain fell during the day at Spokane and
Boise. Clouds skirt the last-named
western Oregon and western Washing-
ton. Light precipitation was reported
from North Head and traces at Tatoosh
Island and Seattle. The last-named
place rain was still falling at time of
observation. Temperatures were decid-
edly lower over Washington, western
Oregon and Nevada.

The indications point to rain over
western Washington Sunday. Over the
remainder of the Pacific coast, the ex-
ception of southwestern Oregon, where
fair weather is expected, cloudiness is
indicated with possibly rain Sunday.

with possibly rain; westerly winds.
Eastern Oregon, Sunday cloudy south,
cloudy with possibly rain north portion;
westerly winds.
