OPENING OF BANK NOW LIES WITH DEPOSITORS

Oregon Savings Will Resume Business as Quickly as Those Holding Accounts Subscribe Few Remaining Thousands of Telephone Bonds.

A grand total of \$653,000 of Home Telephone bonds and new bank stock subscribed by depositors of the suspended Oregon Trust and Savings Bank was reached last night at the close of the campaign of the depositors' association for the week just ended. The aggregate includes about \$74,000 of subscriptions for stock in the proposed new bank. Yesterday's subscriptions amounted to \$2,500. Negotiations by Gus Lowitt, former manager of the Golden Eagle department store, looking to a 40 per cent settlement of the bank's \$100,000 claim, have been broken off. Mr. Lowitt having failed to bring forward an acceptable proposition. The receiver has during the last week been considerably cheered by receipt of \$500 from the Order of Washington, in payment of a part of the interest due on its loan. There is a possibility that the order will make further interest payments during the coming week. The future success of the effort to secure dollar for dollar for the depositors devolves entirely on the action that

is taken by the depositors themselves. If they subscribe to practically \$1,000,000 of the negotiable bonds that are in possession of the defunct bank the ultimate victory is virtually certain. It is said by those who are best informed on the situation, A. E. Reames, attorney for the reorganization committee, made the following statement last night regarding the public's attitude toward the reorganization plan and the bond subscription campaign: "The hope of the depositors in the reorganization plan is lodged chiefly in the support which is coming from Portland's business men. There is very little, if any, knocking on the part of any of the business institutions, so far as we are able to learn. The banking and other business institutions of the city realize that it would be a great thing for Portland, as well as for our depositors, if the bank could be put upon its feet again and the people saved any loss. "I believe that the support which we are getting from Portland's business people is reasonable in a way for the good humor shown by the depositors in discussing and considering the question of taking bonds on account of their deposits. "This plan for reorganizing the bank is a unique one but it is perfectly sound and is capable of making a strong and solvent institution. It was found when the bank failed that among the assets of the bank were practically \$1,000,000

worth of bonds, which if purchased by the depositors, would in time bring them dollar for dollar on their deposits. This has made it possible to attempt reorganizing along the present lines. There is at hand ready for investment in bank stock something over \$300,000, provided those bonds are subscribed for by the depositors; in other words, provided \$1,000,000 worth of liabilities were taken care of in this way. "A very small proportion of the depositors have filed their claims with the receiver. Many do not realize that this is a legal requirement. However, few appreciate that if they fail to file their claims, they could not be paid, even if the receiver had the money on hand. Less of them appreciate that those claims must be filed within the time specified in the court order. The fact that so many have not filed their claims and that we have already sold to the depositors over \$50,000 worth of bonds, leads us to believe that these bonds will be readily subscribed. "Depositors Delay Bank's Opening. "The bank had a very large number of out-of-town depositors and many of the resident depositors were absent when the bank failed who are returning. There are almost universally unadvised as to the bond question and many of them do not know that they have to file their claims and that they have an opportunity to take the bonds. Hence, we expect that the matter of subscribing for these bonds may drag over a

She reached for the phone. Her hands missed it about three feet. Still the little woman didn't give up all hope.
