

BORAH WILL HELP CELLO

Idaho's Senator Now in Portland, Heartily in Favor of Government's Canal Project—Will Support Movement in Congress.

Help and earnest effort toward securing a continuing contract basis for the completion of the Cello canal above The Dalles rapidly can be expected from United States Senator W. E. Borah of Idaho when he takes up his public labors at Washington next December. Senator Borah stands for the open river from Lewiston to the sea and he is with the delegations from all the other northwest states in the campaign to be carried forward for the Cello canal project during the coming session of congress.

Senator Borah is at the Portland today on the way to San Francisco, where he is to appear in argument before the United States circuit court of appeals in that city. He leaves tonight for that city, but while here he talked of public questions and stated that he entered heartily into any plan which tended toward the opening of the Columbia at the earliest possible moment, thus making it the great waterway for the commerce of the inland empire.

Is an Idaho Project.
In evidence of his interest in the canal question Senator Borah placed himself in the role of a human interrogator point for a short time this morning while discussing the Cello project. He wanted to know what it really meant, whether it was the one great way in which the upper Columbia could be opened, and if the completion of the canal would in reality open the river to feasible navigation. He asked the cost of the project, how much had been spent on it and how much would yet be required to complete it, and then these things all having been settled to his satisfaction he said he would be one of those to help secure a continuing contract for the canal.

"Anything that will open the Columbia river from Lewiston down, and will help to regulate the freight rates charged on the railroads for the greatest traffic going to and from the inland Empire, of which Idaho is a part, is in itself an Idaho project and will have my support. If the congressional delegations from the other interested states unite in a campaign for securing a continuing contract for the Cello canal project at the next session of congress I will be one of them and will do what I may in working for the success of the campaign."

Speaks of Haywood Trial.
Senator Borah did not care to discuss his recent trial in Idaho for complicity in the land frauds of that state, saying that he did not think it would be meet for him to enter into a discussion of the trouble at this time. He did discuss the Moyer-Haywood trial, however, and expressed himself as much pleased with the manner in which the case had been conducted and the fairness and justice which had been accorded to the defendants.

"Idaho has had a rather strenuous history for the last year," said the senator. "The whole country was looking on, and whatever difference of opinion there may be as to some things, we must agree that the state in a most trying ordeal met in full measure the highest test of organized society. The trial was an absolutely fair and impartial hearing before an unprejudiced tribunal."

Plenty of Criticism.
"We had been criticized for the manner of bringing Haywood to the state, and it was freely charged that political murder was to take place. But the men who determined that no expense or effort should be spared to bring to trial those accused were just as immovable in their determination that no injustice should be done under the guise of law, and notwithstanding the stress, the excitement and feelings, Idaho gave to those strangers within her courts as fair a trial as could have been given to one of her own citizens."

"We wanted different results, but the people of Idaho arose to the full measure of responsibility and gave what all should have, guilty or innocent—a fair trial. We are very proud of that; it silenced even the lips of lawlessness itself. No one ought to have any doubt that Idaho's citizenship is of the highest type. Some of those eastern sentimentalists who early began to talk in all their reticent ignorance of well known facts in Idaho ought to come out and get an electric touch from the elbow of a genuine type of loyal and sturdy citizenship."

Senator Borah will also appear in the prosecution of the Pettibone case, but would not discuss it or its outcome, stating that such a course would not be proper at this time.

STUDIED CIVIC CONDITIONS EAST

Rev. W. G. Eliot Jr. Returns From Four Weeks' Trip to Atlantic Coast.

BEAUTIES OF BOSTON COMPEL ATTENTION

Dr. Stephen S. Wise Draws Immense Crowds in New York and Is Making Remarkable Progress in His Work in the Great City.

Rev. W. G. Eliot, Jr., has returned from a four weeks' visit east, where he went to attend the National Conference of Unitarian and other churches in Boston. Besides the 10 days spent in Boston, Mr. Eliot visited other cities in the east and was deeply interested in the study of civic conditions.

"Boston is a beautiful city in a beautiful state," he said. "Massachusetts is probably the most highly developed and organized state in our country. Besides being divided into counties it is divided into what they call towns, in different shapes in regard to convenience. In one city may be several towns."

"The whole state is connected by electric railways, and all parts of the state work together. An interesting feature of Boston is the town room, where civic problems of every kind are simply explained and illustrated with material collected from all over the country for the use of the surrounding villages. All civic improvements may be found illustrated there."

Wonderful Parking Systems.

"The parking system of Boston is beautiful and wonderful. The parks throughout the city are connected with beautiful boulevards. There are splendid forest reserves about the city for parking uses and something that strikes the stranger within Boston's gates is the courtesy of the streetcar conductors in such marked contrast to New York's system."

St. Louis, my old home, was an interesting spot to me. The city is making wonderful advances in civic progress. The Civic association has recently published a comprehensive plan, planning the growth of the city for years ahead. Park roads are mapped out, surrounding forest reserves are marked for parks, a grouping system for public buildings is planned, with schools, churches and fire protection grouped about certain squares, a plan being adopted in 25 other large cities.

"It is the most comprehensive work of the kind I have ever seen, and I shall try to obtain one for our library, though I do not know if they are for sale. Portland should follow such a plan in the near future, while the city is growing, and should employ experts to work out a growing plan."

In Touch With All Quarters.
"In New York I was interested in visiting the new School of Philanthropy and Social Service, under the direction of Professor Samuel McManis Lindsay, who was here for the civic congress at the Lewis and Clark fair. The school is affiliated with Columbia university and has the best of its kind in the United States, and is situated in the General Charities building, so that the students are in immediate touch with all the charities of New York."

"The school educates men and women for philanthropic and institutional work, probation officers, or any other branch they may choose with all the special phases."

"I saw Dr. Stephen S. Wise in New York and he was progressing in his work, and draws immense crowds. The meeting of the executive committee of the committee of 100 for the promotion of national health was interesting. Their direct purpose is to secure a national bureau of health and their work is just beginning to be felt."

Visits Alma Mater.
"In St. Louis my interest chiefly centered about my alma mater, Washington university, where I spoke three times; first before the manual training school, the best of its kind in the United States, then before Smith academy, where I was a pupil and a teacher, and before the undergraduates and faculty of the college."

"All the world's fair buildings have been removed and the grounds turned into parks. The art museum and the British embassy buildings alone remain for the use of the college. Recently David R. Francis has given money for cement walls and seats for the stadium, the athletic field. A splendid woman's dormitory has just been completed, and the college is growing rapidly."
