Judge Cleland in the circuit court this morning granted an application to dissolve the injunction against the transportation of beer kegs of the Olympia Brewing company by the Northern Pacific railroad. This action follows as a consequence to the decision of the court last Saturday dissolving the attachment in the case of the Olympia Bottling company against the brewing company. The bottling company had obtained the attachment in an action claiming nearly \$40,000 damages for alleged failure of the brewing institution to allow it to recover for five years a contract as agent for the brewery's product in Oregon.

In Judge Gantenbein's department of the circuit court the trial of Mrs. Ada L. Clark's \$10,000 damage suit against the Portland Railway company was resumed this morning. The case for the plaintiff has not yet been closed, many of the employees of the James Printing company, where she worked prior to the accident, being called to testify to the state of her health before and after the three-car collision in which she was injured. The defense will rely largely on a release which she signed, absolving the company from damages in return for medical attention.

Because of the fear that diphtheria might be lurking about, City Health Officer Eather Pohl this morning ordered one of the rooms of the Oskay Green school closed while it was being fumigated by Deputy Health Officer M. P. Seelard. One of the children attending the school was stricken with the malady last week and in order to prevent possible spread among the other children, Dr. Pohl ordered the room disinfected.

Mayor Lane will be one of the speakers at the laying of the cornerstone of the Mt. Olivet Baptist church next Sunday afternoon. His subject will be, "The Negro as a Citizen." The cornerstone will be set by Dr. Brougher, pastor of the First Baptist church, to whom a silver trowel will be presented by Dr. Merriman. ASK RAISE AT SESSION TONIGHT

City Teachers Will Present Claims for Increase in Salaries.

All teachers employed in the Portland public schools will be represented by a committee of five leading educators before the board of education's meeting tonight in a demand for higher salaries.

A week ago it was decided by the teachers of the city to ask for an advance of 20 per cent over the schedule now paid, and accordingly a committee, headed by Professor C. M. Higgins was appointed to present the matter to the board tonight. The teachers allege as a basis for their contention that the high price of the necessities of life, and rents, has made it impossible for them properly to maintain themselves at the present scale of wages. It is further contended that the teacher in comparison to all other skilled labor is very much underpaid.

What action the board will take is uncertain. The teachers will be able to show that their fellow-workers in Seattle and Oakland, California, receive higher pay, while the same holds true of the larger cities of the coast. Some members of the board are known to favor the increase, but whether they are in the majority is unknown. The teachers, however, are hopeful that their showing will be so strong as to convert those members of the board who keep up to this time unfavorable to their requests.

FILE DEMURRER IN RADING CASE

Defendants Through Their Attorneys Take Steps to Avoid Trial.

E. E. Radding and Mrs. Belle Waymire, under indictment for having attempted to blackmail the good name of Mayor Lane, were arraigned in the circuit court this morning and asked to plead. The defendants were not present in the courtroom, but appeared through their attorneys, Seneca Fouts and W. R. McGaughey. They waived the reading of the information and asked for time in which to plead, at the same time filing a demurrer to the complaint.

The attorneys set out in the demurrer that the complaint did not set forth grounds sufficient upon which to allege the commission of a crime and also that the information asked for time in which to plead, at the same time filing a demurrer to the complaint.

If the court, after hearing the arguments, overrules it, the district attorney will ask that the case be set down for trial at the earliest possible moment. The whereabouts of both Radding and Mrs. Waymire are not known at this time, but as both are out on bonds it is practically certain that they will be in court when their trial comes up for hearing.

It is uncertain just when the case will be finally heard by the court because of the congested condition of the circuit court docket. It is very probable, however, on account of the peculiar circumstances of the case that a place will be made for it and that it will be tried at an early date.

The attorneys for the defense asked that the bond of \$500 given by each of the defendants be reduced to \$200, that being the maximum fine that could be imposed under the information filed against them. Judge Cleland refused to grant the request.
