ROY HEATER TO
TRAIN AT O. A. C.

Famous Athlete Will Take
Place Held by "Dad"
Trine.

USED SAPLING TO MAKE
RECORD IN POLE VAULT

In Accepting Position at Corvallis
Former College Star Leaves Place
Open as Director of Willamette
University Athletics.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Corvallis, Or., Oct. 16.—Roy E. Heater, former holder of the northwest pole vault record, and in his college days one of the best all round athletes in the west, has resigned his position as physical director at Willamette university to accept a better one as physical director at the Oregon Agricultural college. He has been in Corvallis this week to look the ground over and will return shortly with his family to assume active charge of athletics here.

Heater, in his day, was a remarkable athlete. Some believe that if he had had the care and training of Dan Kelly he would have been the equal of the former champion sprinter. Heater began his athletic career at Pacific university when he electrified the spectators by winning all of the short sprints, the two jumps and the pole vault. Heater's pole that day was a primitive affair. Not being able to secure a "store" pole in time for the meet, he went out and cut a sapling, trimmed it down and vaulted over 10 feet.

The next year he entered the state university and reached his greatest development. He was a first-place man in the 100 and the 200-yard dashes, the broad and high jump and the pole vault. He held the pole vault record of 11 feet and 4 1/2 inches for the northwest until 1904, when Gilbert of Pacific university vaulted 11 feet and 7 inches.

Heater will take the place made vacant by the death of William "Dad" Trine, who trained the O. A. C. athletes for many years and who successfully developed many champions. He is well known here and under such favorable circumstances ought to develop winning teams.

During today's practice "Dud" Clark punted 75 yards. The first team had been forced behind the line and was compelled to punt. Coach Frost later complimented Clark.

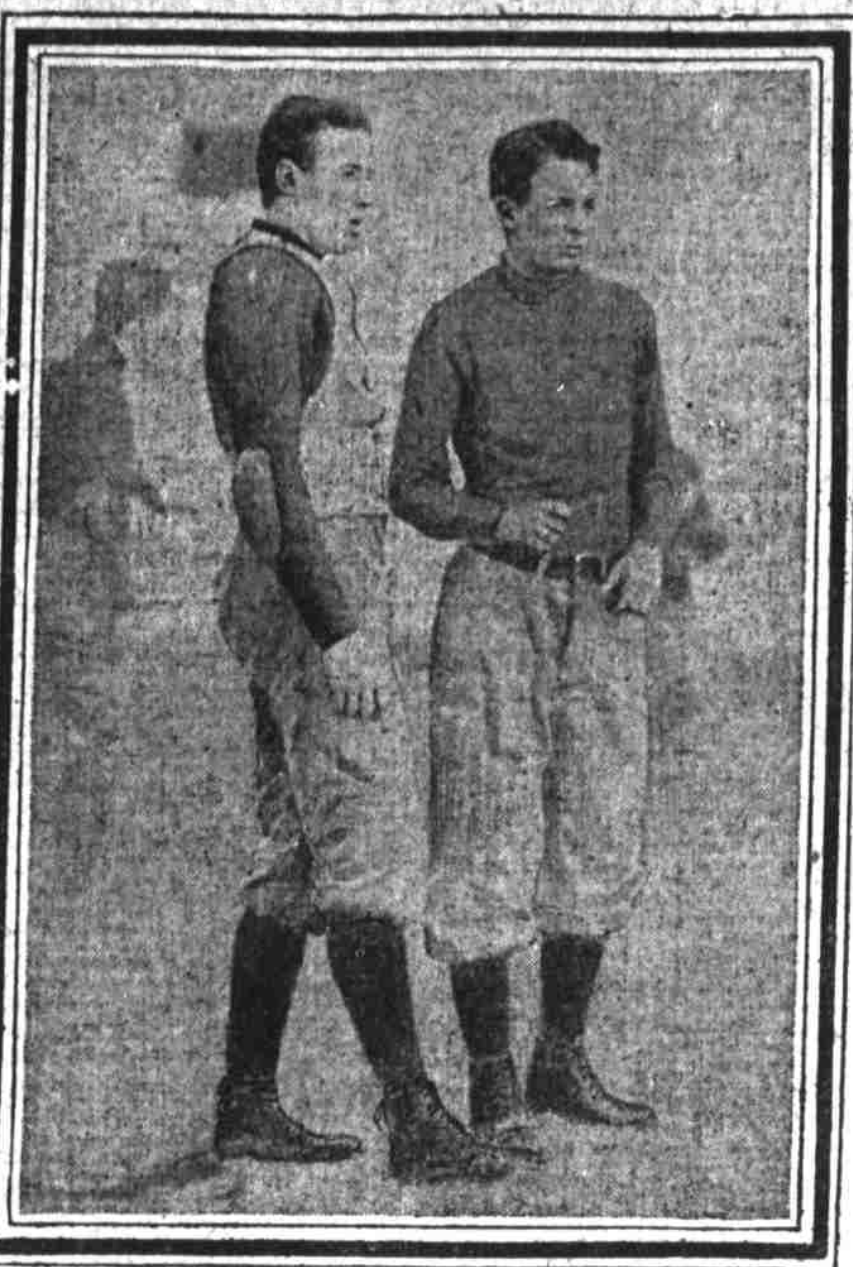

BAKER CITY HIGH
HAS MANY GAMES

Baker City, Or., Oct. 16.—The Baker City high school football team, which last year won the championship of Oregon and Idaho, by defeating the teams of both Portland High and Boise High, is again rapidly getting into condition and the prospects for another winning team are very bright. Forty candidates are turning out every evening on the Valley avenue grounds for practice.

This work this year is under the direction of James H. Nichols, who has coached the locals for the past two years, during which time their goal line has never been crossed. The first game of the season will be played in Baker City on the 19th of this month, at which time the high school team from La Grande will line up against Baker.

Schedule a Hard One.

The schedule this year is the hardest one that the local school has ever attempted and includes games with Walla Walla High school, Pendleton, and the Thanksgiving day game with the West Side High school of Portland. The team this year will average 145 pounds and, while not the heaviest, is certainly the fastest aggregation of football men that Baker City has ever had.

Quarterback McKim, who was last year's star, is the man who saw his way to be the fastest and surest high school player in the state, will again hold down his old position. McKim weighs 155 pounds, runs a hundred yards in 10 2/5 seconds and has a record of going through three games in succession without making a fumble.

Oscar Endberg, the '06's full back, has again entered school and is a strong addition to the team. Endberg weighs 175 pounds and is one of the fastest men on the eleven. Altogether, this year's prospects are very bright.

SPANIARDS EXCITED
AGAINST GOVERNMENT

Madrid, Oct. 16.—Excitement against the government is increasing throughout the kingdom, led by the liberal members of parliament, who are violent in denouncing the frauds they allege to have been practised in the last elections. Davila, in the chamber of deputies, said: "We are ourselves at the head of a government ignorant of the road it ought to follow, to resolve the grave problems of the nation, and which appears to be an profound stupor in its presence. Its disobedience and contempt of the laws and the support it gives to the theocracy, have accomplished its complete unpopularity."

At a reception in the palace lately, the king, appearing frightened, noticed and called attention to the presence of some of the liberal leaders, and demanded to have explained the presence of men who had not been sworn. Their spokesman, Romanones, replied: "We all respect the crown and offer it complete adhesion." He further declared that they would support it.

Both the National and American leagues will have new umpires to try out next season.

The finish of the season in the Pacific Coast league shows Los Angeles first, San Francisco second, Oakland third and Portland fourth.

Honus Wagner's injury, which kept him out of the game during the last 10 days of the season, doubtless cost him the batting championship of the major leagues.

The best hitting team in the country would be made up of Orth, pitcher, Shreck, catcher; Chase, first base; LaJoie, second base; Cobb, Crawford and Flick in the outfield, all of the American league, and Wagner, shortstop, and Stiefeldt, third base, of the National league.

The sawdust checkerboard known as Multnomah field is getting a hard workout these days. The West Side High school boys are practicing there every afternoon, and about three or four times a week it is the battle ground of the Hill military gridiron candidates. One of the other teams in the city league practice on their own fields.

Charles Ellison, the tall blonde plunger, put through one of his occasional coups when his colt Temacoe cantered home on the victory lap. The Fairview selling stakes at Belmont Park, Ellsboro, cleaned up over \$20,000 on the result, and Dave O'Leary, a well-known Chicago gambler, was reported to have \$10,000 when Temacoe crossed the finish line.

Portland followers of the ponies will be pleased to learn that Jockey McClain, who was seriously injured last Saturday in a spill while up on Elota, during one of the running races at the Lowell-Clarkston fair, is out of danger. McClain is one of the most promising riders on the northwest circuit and if he decides to undergo future dangers, will rise with the best boys in California this winter.

Expert billiardists across the Atlantic are taking kindly to the newest thing in tables, made on the oval plan. When this novelty was introduced a few weeks ago it had the immediate effect of bringing the famous old English champion, John Roberts, back from retirement. He has remained in the game over a year. After some experience in practice the veteran decided he had found a fresh field for his skill, and a match was arranged between him and the Australian champion, F. H. Weiss.

Marshfield, North Bend and Coquille will be represented in the Coos bay football games this fall and teams representing the three towns are now practicing daily for the contests.
