

NEW FRISCO IS BUILDING FAST

Eighty Per Cent of Debris Cleared Away and Fine Structures Erected.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, Oct. 18.—San Francisco today celebrated the third semi-anniversary of its great fire. In that period not only has more than one third of the burned area been rebuilt, but it has been rebuilt better and stronger. In this work of reconstruction more than 80 per cent of the debris has been cleared away and the clearing away of the other 20 per cent and the rebuilding of the other buildings will follow with greater proportional rapidity by reason of the scope of the preparations that have been made.

ADMIRAL SELFIDGE, AGED SEVENTY-TWO, WILL WED OLD MAID

Washington, D. C., Oct. 18.—According to a story attributed to the son of Rear Admiral Thomas Oliver Selfridge, United States navy, retired, the admiral is to be married next Tuesday to Miss Gertrude Miles of Boston. Miss Miles is an old friend of the Selfridge family and is said to be 65 years old. The admiral is 72.

Although Admiral Selfridge has passed the allotted three score and ten, he is strong and active. His father, who was Thomas Oliver Selfridge, also, and like his son, a rear admiral in the navy, died a few years ago when he had nearly reached the century mark.

Rear Admiral Thomas O. Selfridge, the elder, was retired for age in 1882, and his son, the present rear admiral, was retired for age in 1898, thus preventing the remarkable example of father and son of exactly the same rank being carried on the age retirement list.

WATER FRANCHISE AT GRANTS PASS ASKED

Portland People Want to Substitute Spring Water for Present River Supply.

Grants Pass, Or., Oct. 18.—The Thompson Water & Power company, a newly incorporated company of Portland, presented by Mrs. Mary Thompson and Attorney Martin Holbrook of Portland, made application to the council last night for a franchise for a water system. The matter was taken under consideration.

The Thompson Water & Power company proposes to supply Grants Pass with an abundance of spring water. About four miles from town on the mountainside is a splendid system of cold springs with flow to supply a city many times the size of Grants Pass. These have been purchased by the company and will be developed. As the springs are 1,500 feet above the town the water will be delivered under high pressure.

Though the present water system has an ample supply, the new system is favored, the water being considered much purer than that from Rogue river. In recent years typhoid fever has been ascribed to this source.

If the Thompson company is granted a franchise to begin work at once on a complete system.

TERMINAL COMPANY FORMED AT TACOMA

MAGILL TELLS STORY OF DEATH OF WIFE

Testimony of Defendant Corroborates Tale Told on Stand by Daughter.

Decatur, Ill., Oct. 18.—Fred Magill yesterday took the stand in his own defense at the close of a dramatic scene in which his bride wept bitterly while her counsel was reading a letter supposed to have been written to her by Magill's first wife. It referred to the scandal started against the second Mrs. Magill by Magill's mother.

Magill testified that Fred Davidson told him that he had told his wife that if she did not stop using chloroform for headaches she ought to kill herself with a gun. He said he was afraid for some time that his wife would suicide. His wife he said always showed love for Fay Graham. He then told of the finding of his wife's corpse.

"We retired about 11 o'clock and I awoke about 6 o'clock next morning. Pet was missing and I found her in another bed. The room was filled with chloroform fumes and I opened the window. Pet's head was wrapped in a blanket which slipped through my fingers. I jerked it from her head and told my daughter, Marguerite that I feared her mother was dead."

This corroborates Marguerite's story.

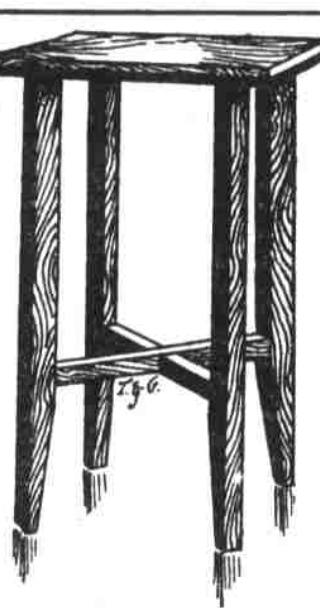
