

COME BACK WITH CEMENT CARGOES

Tramp Steamers Now Leaving for Europe Expected Here Next Spring.

GROWING DEMAND FOR BUILDING MATERIAL

Condition of Affairs at This Time Will Likely Make Carriers More Easily Obtainable Next Spring—Coal Carrier Chartered.

There is said to be a strong probability of a number of the tramp steamers now being dispatched from this port for Europe with wheat, returning early in the spring with cement and building material, perhaps in time to take a second cargo of grain to the continent. That large quantities of cement will be wanted here next spring is considered certain and importers are on the lookout for carriers at all times.

It takes the ordinary tramp steamer about 75 days to make the run from Portland to Europe, so that those leaving here can easily reach home by Christmas time. Allowing them a month for discharging and loading they could be here in the latter part of April with a return cargo. That the steamers now making what might be termed a bee line for home are expected to follow this program is said to be quite certain because the trend of business will leave an unusually large amount of steam tonnage on the other side when they begin to arrive. Last year most of the tramp steamers dispatched from this coast went to the orient, with the result that it was late in the season when they finally got over to the other side.

Immense quantities of cement were imported here during spring and the early part of summer and several thousand tons are now in the hands of the merchants, Rotterdam and ports in England, but it is predicted that still larger quantities will be required the coming spring because of the rapid development of the country.

The steamers dispatched to the orient this fall will in all probability return to the coast with coal from Australia or Japan since there seems a good demand for coals even though the list headed for this coast already contains half a hundred names or more, most of them bound for San Francisco.

The coal fleet bound for Portland was increased yesterday afternoon when it
