Answering the complaint of the Heywood Bros. & Wakefield company against it in the circuit court, the Doornbecher Manufacturing company denies that it owes the plaintiff anything on a contract for furniture, but asserts that it has been damaged to the extent of \$2,724.47 because the plaintiff failed to take \$31,120 worth of furniture between April 3, 1902, and April 2, 1902. It is claimed that the plaintiff agreed to take \$150,000 worth, but fell short by this amount and that in consequence the defendant's furniture was not kept steadily at work, as it might have been.

A Young Men's Literary and Current Topic club was organized at the local Y. M. C. A. rooms last night, the purpose of this society is to discuss current literature and events, and it is the aim of the members to perfect themselves in parliamentary practice. The Wind River Lumber company is seeking to pass to the Frankfort Marine Accident and Plate Glass Insurance company a judgment for \$3,000 damages, awarded to David Westman, a 14-year-old boy. Westman was injured while in the employ of the Wind River company, and it alleges that the insurance company agreed to protect it against all judgments in damage suits for accidents. Suit to collect the \$3,000 has been begun in the circuit court.

Owing to the two-cent fare legislation in states of the middle west, the Transcontinental Passenger Association has discontinued the practice of granting half rates to ministers of the gospel, Salvation Army people, missionaries, and other religious workers. The association of charity and disabled volunteer soldiers and sailors. The effect will be to charge these people \$35 instead of \$25 from Portland to Missouri river points.

Deputy District Attorney Adams has decided to dismiss the charge of robbery against L. Williams, a colored man, who was arrested on complaint of J. J. Kelly. Another concern newly incorporated is the Timber Investment company, having a capital of \$250,000. It is formed by J. L. Hartman, Howard T. Rankin and George McCarty.

Invitations have been scattered over Albina asking the attendance of all who have the interest of the section at heart. Councilman R. E. Menefee of the Ninth ward is the principal mover.

In five minutes the jury that heard evidence in Judge Gantenbein's department of the circuit court in the case of Harris Georgopolis against the Oregon Water Power and Railway company decided that he is not entitled to damages for injuries sustained in falling to the bottom of a pit at Cazadero, in Clackamas county. Georgopolis sued for \$10,000.

CALL IN \$50,000 OF CITY BONDS NOV. 1

Bids Will Also Be Received Monday for New Issue of \$150,000.

The ways and means committee of the city will receive bids Monday afternoon for \$150,000 worth of city bonds. These are 10-year bonds subject to recall any time after one year. They bear six per cent interest payable semi-annually.

Much interest is taken in Monday's sale because of the bearing it has on the local money market. The Portland bonds always acquire a premium running from 3 to 10 per cent. The lowest premium ever noted was on the sale of some of the bonds last August when the premium amounted to only 2 per cent.

It is expected that Monday's sale will result in a larger premium on the bonds, indicating a general loosening of the money market throughout the country.

City Treasurer Werlein announced yesterday that about \$50,000 worth of bonds would be called in by the city, November 1. These bonds were issued November 1, 1904. They have run about the average life of city bonds, the time being anywhere from three to three and one half years.
