

COIL BOILS IN IDAHO WELL

Payette, on Oregon Line, Wild Over Oregon Oil & Gas Company's Geyser—Preparing to Control Expected Tremendous Gush.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Payette, Idaho, Oct. 19.—Following a great spouting of water from the oil well being bored here by the Oregon Oil and Gas company late yesterday afternoon, pure oil is boiling today in the mouth of the well. A big flow of oil has been struck at a depth of 725 feet, and as the gas forces itself through the oil it keeps the liquid in a turbulent state.

The strike was made when the drill bored through a hard stratum about three feet thick. When the crust was pierced water spouted from the well so quickly that the men had barely time to escape from the inclosure. The water spouted more than 100 feet into the air and continued to spout in great jets for nearly an hour, when the flow was gradually checked by sand packing about the drill, which remained in the well. It required two hours to withdraw the drill.

When the overlying was removed from the well this morning the oil was boiling near the mouth of the casing. Nothing is being done until the company can make preparations for handling the oil. It is feared that if the well is disturbed any there will be a disastrous blowout of gas.

The entire town is wildly excited over the strike.

Boise, Idaho, Oct. 19.—A steady stream of oil is today flowing from the well drilled by the Oregon Oil & Gas company at Payette. Late yesterday afternoon the strike was made, and gas, oil and water were thrown into the air 100 feet high. It later developed into an outpour of a good grade of petroleum.

Great excitement prevails and a rush is being made to Payette and vicinity to locate government lands in the oil belt.

NO WORD FROM MEN IN FEDERAL BALLOON

Va., Oct. 19.—No word has been received up to noon today from the signal corps balloon sent up from St. Louis and which was reported yesterday at Point Pleasant, W. Va. It is likely that the balloon has landed at a place where there are no means of communicating with the outside world.

CITY ENGINEER WILL DECIDE ON LAMPBLACK IN SIDEWALKS

At a meeting of the street committee of the city council this morning the ordinance approving the mixing of lampblack with cement sidewalks was amended so as to leave the kind of lampblack to be used to the discretion of City Engineer Taylor and reported upon favorably. This ordinance was passed by the council at a former meeting and vetoed by Mayor Lane, who objected to the measure because it did not specify the kind of lampblack to be used.

The ordinance was brought up this morning on a petition signed by about 20 physicians headed by Dr. L. Victoria Hampton, who volunteered to analyze all brands of lampblack offered to Engineer Taylor.

The petition stated the objections of the physicians, laying particular stress upon the injurious effects of refracted reflected white light upon the eyes.

CALIFORNIANS WILL PREVENT COAL FAMINE

Monterey County Will Furnish Domestic Supply for Pacific Slope.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Oct. 19.—While those closely interested will not discuss the project, it has been learned that great coal deposits in the southern part of Monterey county are about to be developed and the coal put upon the market within the next eight months in quantities sufficient to supply the entire Pacific slope with fuel for domestic purposes.

Behind the project are such men as T. H. Watkins of Scranton, Pennsylvania, who was appointed a member of the anthracite strike commission by President Roosevelt, John H. Hammond, one of the foremost mining engineers in this country and J. A. Chancelor of Los Angeles, a fuel oil magnate.

It is said that \$2,000,000 is to be expended in opening up the mines, installing machinery and building the necessary 25 miles of railroad.

The coal veins lie in the southeastern part of Monterey county, near the Fresno county line.

PAVING WAR

Ellis G. Hughes Appears Before Street Committee of the Council With Offer to Pay Cost of Survey of Property.

Members of the street committee listened to a large number of petitions at their meeting this morning in the council chamber of the city hall, including one from Ellis G. Hughes, who revived the subject of paving the district in Irvington extending 10 blocks between Thompson and Knott streets.

As a result of this morning's session Mr. Hughes agreed to pay the cost of survey of the property providing the council rescinds its favorable report on petitions asking that bituminous pavements be laid in the district. This was sanctioned by the committee this morning, and the paving war that has existed between the bituminous and bitulite companies for many months seems to be at an end. Mr. Hughes also agreed to lay a hard surface pavement other than the two specified in the district.

Mrs. Preston C. Smith appeared before the committee and asked if she be granted a deed to a strip of property on Portland heights which had been vacated to her husband in return for a roadway to give access to the city. Mrs. Smith's action was based upon an effort to clear the title to the property and an opinion of the supreme court, which cast a cloud on the action of the city in its terms with Mr. Smith.

Although the petition was filed and referred to the judiciary committee, it came up this morning and the street committee recommended that an ordinance be passed granting Mrs. Smith's request.

When the question of railroad gates for East Eleventh street and Grand avenue came up Councilman Rushlight asked that the matter be passed over until he could examine into automatic opening switches which the railway company wish to install with its request was granted, although Councilman Vaughn and other members of the committee expressed a desire to have the gates installed as soon as possible. The committee appointed the following men as viewers for Gladstone avenue: T. Dineen, Walter Kerns and W. W. Terry. Viewers for Sandy road were named as follows: R. E. L. Simmons, H. J. Morrison and J. Menefee.

COMRADES BURY VETERAN JULIAN

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The Dalles, Or., Oct. 19.—The funeral of John Julian, aged 10, was held yesterday under the auspices of the local G. A. R. post. Interment was in the old soldiers' cemetery. The services were held at the Crandall undertaking parlors, Rev. D. V. Poling officiating. John Julian was a veteran of the Civil War. He was born at Addison, Champaign county, Ohio, August 1, 1877. His father was of French descent and the mother was of Scotch. He lived in Ohio until the call for volunteers at the beginning of the civil war. He enlisted in the three months condition, re-enlisted and served the remainder of the war. He was corporal under Captain D. C. Ellis, company D, fourth regiment, Maine volunteer infantry. His five surviving children are Irvin F. Julian, of Portland, Mrs. Lizzie Valdes, of Indianapolis, Mrs. Charles Lambert, of Stockton, California, Charles Julian, of Memphis, Tennessee, and Mrs. Mary Mercer, of The Dalles.

ON GOES THE LID IN LEWIS COUNTY

ST. HELENS PROUD OF NEW CHURCH BELL

UNKNOWN FIGHTS TO END HIS LIFE

With Blood Streaming Would-Be Suicide Battles With the Police.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 19.—An unidentified man early this morning shot himself through the head in his room in a lodging house and then with blood streaming from a fearful wound, walked down the hall and entered a room occupied by a man and his wife. He threw himself upon his bed.

When the police arrived on the scene the would-be suicide fought them desperately. He finally was overpowered and taken to the receiving hospital, where it was necessary to tie him to a table before beginning an operation. Still he struggled and made frantic efforts to escape. Surgeons at the hospital say the man may live for several days. Every vestige of evidence that might lead to the man's identity has been destroyed before he shot himself.

BURGLARS GET BUSY WHILE GUESTS SLEEP

Frohmman Trading Company in the Portland Hotel Robbed of \$2,000.

Something like \$2,000 worth of oriental jewelry is missing from the Frohmman Trading company in the Portland hotel as a result of a burglary early Thursday morning. The thieves gained an entrance to the rooms by using a "jimmy" to break the iron grating in one of the windows on Yamhill street. Acting Detectives Price and Hellyer were detailed on the case.

The burglars made special effort to take nothing but the most valuable stuff, and consequently passed up much silk and other material of great value. Jade rings, gold bracelets, watch cases and stickpins made up the principal articles taken by the robbers. The police have no clue to the perpetrators. Chief of Police Gritzmacher, however, believes that the work was that of professionals.

O. R. & N. CATCHES ALLEGED CAR THIEF

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The Dalles, Or., Oct. 19.—Detective E. B. Wood of the O. R. & N. railroad captured George Casey, said to be the leader of a gang of notorious box car thieves, at 1 o'clock this morning on Front street. Casey, the railway officials charge, has been operating in Portland and other places on the O. R. & N. lines and has stolen quantities of silks, shoes and merchandise. He is 40 years old and is said to have spent 22 years in state prisons. He has been in Oregon about a year. He is in the county jail and may be tried here.

RAILROAD FILES NEW MAP OF ITS ROUTE

To correct omissions in its first maps filed with the interior department, the Oregon Trunk Line Railroad company has completed a new survey of its Deschutes river line from the mouth of the river to Madras, and today filed corrected maps. The company's officers are considering plans for beginning construction next spring. Their course will be contingent upon the improvement of the money market and the attitude of Portland capital toward the enterprise.
