An injunction restraining the H. W. Lemcke company from collecting any money from the sale of real estate in Waverleigh or from paying out any of its funds, was issued by Judge Gantenbein in the circuit court yesterday. The action was taken in the pending suit of J. A. Curran against the Lemcke company upon the presentation of affidavits relating to the precarious condition of its affairs. Application was also made for the appointment of a receiver, but no action was taken in that regard. Another suit against the same concern was commenced yesterday, when J. M. Healy sued for \$1,500 on a deal in East Portland. He says this sum was to be paid him in addition to the regular purchase price of \$1,000, if the Lemcke company sold the property at a profit of \$5,000 or more. He asserts that the \$5,000 profit was made by Lemcke, but that he was not paid the additional amount.

She has been known to all the charity institutions of the country for more than a dozen years and appeared in Portland just eight years ago, when she went by the name of Gable. Revolutionary Days are commemorated

Patriotic Program Given in Celebration of Saratoga and Yorktown.

At the Seiling-Hirsch building last night the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution celebrated the anniversary of the battles of Saratoga and Yorktown with a public meeting. There was a large gathering present to hear the excellent program which had been prepared, and it was announced as the intention of the society to hold similar meetings occasionally in commemoration of great national events for the purpose of keeping alive the spirit of patriotism.

Perhaps the chief topic of interest last night was the address of George J. Williams, in which he took the stand that the nations of the earth are of fighting stock and that the efforts of the Hague will be futile for a long time to come as far as universal peace is concerned.

Judge Williams commended the work of the Hague and gave it as his opinion that it would make possible the arbitration of international monetary differences, but he did not believe that it would be able, through the deliberations and decisions of a few men to govern the armaments of the world. He said man was a fighting animal and would so continue until the millennium had come and the beings of earth were converted into angels.

General Adolphus W. Greely delivered a scholarly address on the subject, "Twentieth Century Patriotism." Bishop David H. Moore also delivered an eloquent and instructive address. The meeting was under the management of Colonel James Jackson, W. P. Chase and W. H. Chapin, Wallace McCamant presided. The program was as follows: "To Thee, O Country" (Eichberg), Lakme quartet.

TIMELY SPRAYING SAVED ORCHARD OF 1,000 TREES FROM DESTRUCTION

Bernard Lels of Beaverton has attained wonderful results from spraying in an orchard on his place containing upward of 1,000 trees. In one year Mr. Lels cleansed his trees of an aggravated attack of San Jose scale that threatened to destroy the orchard altogether. He never knew until he visited the Lewis and Clark exposition in this city two years ago what troubled his once fine orchard of 20 acres of apple trees.

While visiting the fair his attention was called to a mammoth effigy of the San Jose scale, done in paper mache. He at once decided that this was the plague that had seized his orchard and from which it was slowly dying. He obtained all the literature he could on the subject and the methods and treatment necessary to destroy the insect.

A lime and sulphur spray was used, and after one year the dead scale on the trees began dropping off. The year the spray was used the trees did not bear, but this year, the second, the fruit is of first class quality. The apple shown in the picture are Blue Parmanna, without spot or blemish.

Codlin moth is now receiving the attention of Mr. Lels. His efforts were first directed against the scale as he considered that the most dangerous affection. He expects to have no further trouble from either scale or codlin moth after this year. The solution used for the latter is arsenate of lead.

President W. K. Newell of the state board of horticulture urges early spraying. Inspectors are instructed to prepare for the approaching campaign against the scale in whatever part of the state any vestige of the destructive growth may be found. Gradually Oregon is being cleansed of the scale and it is hoped that it may be thoroughly freed in another year or so. Old fences must be inspected as well as trees of all kinds, not necessarily fruit or nut bearing trees.

A syndicate of local Chinese has taken a long time lease on the quarter block at Fourth and Flanders streets and will clear the site of the old frame structures now occupying it and put up a four-story brick to be occupied by Second street Chinese firms.

Work on the new structure will begin as soon as the lot can be cleared of the rubbish now on it. The Chinese merchants on Second street are beginning to realize that their time for occupying that thoroughfare north of Morrison street is short.

Several months ago, a number of Chinese merchants purchased 150 feet front on Second street, between Salmon and Main, which they are improving with a three-story building.

The present indications are that Second street north from Morrison, which has been Portland's Chinese quarter for the past 25 years, will be cleared of the greasy little shops within the next year.

The Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, which has been in existence nearly a quarter of a century, has had very few strikes. It has paid out over \$14,000,000 of insurance to its members or to their estates, and it has succeeded in a large measure in getting safety appliances used on all the railroads of the country.

The North East Side Improvement association, organized last night in the Woodmen of the World hall on Russell street, is the latest and newest east side push club to be added to the growing list of progressive bodies on that side of the river. The new club is fathered by Councilman R. E. Menefee, who takes an organization of the kind can greatly aid him in his work in the council.
